	The foe is stern and eager, The fight is fierce and long;

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Through the cross and His resurrection, Christ conquered Satan and his power over us. He also provided the Holy Spirit to remind us how we can rely on the might and strength of God to fight the fierce and long battle. And at the proper time, He will help us resist the devil and give us the firm faith we need to stand, just as Martin Luther states in His victory song, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God":

This world's prince may still Scowl fierce as he will. He can harm us none. He's judged; the deed is done; One little word can fell him.**

With that victory in mind, we hear the comforting words of Jesus:

"And whosoever cometh,
I will not cast him out."
O patient love of Jesus,
Which drives away our doubt,
Which, though we be unworthy
Of love so great and free,
Invites us very sinners
To come, dear Lord to Thee!*

Acceptance! Acceptance is what He offers and what He gives freely. No matter the length of time, the doubts that plague us, or how unworthy we may feel, His love conquers all! He calls aloud to all: Here I am! I stand at the door and knock ... To him who overcomes, I will give the right to sit with me on my throne, just as I overcame and sat down with my Father on his throne (Revelation 3:20–21 NIV).

Our grief, our burdens, and our weariness were placed on Christ crucified. In return, He desires that we embrace His Word daily, simply out of love for Him. His righteousness, peace, and joy become ours. And even though burdened with life and feeling weary from it, He will not let us suffer, even one moment, more than we can bear.

Closing Prayer: Father in heaven, thank You for granting me the freedom to cast all my cares upon Jesus, who carried those concerns to the cross. Even in my weariness, You use Your grace to guide me gently through the steps of being lifted higher for You. Open my eyes to all that Jesus did in releasing me from the burdens that He bore. In Jesus' name and for His sake, I ask this. Amen.
