• Parenting actually begins before you ever hold your newborn. It begins the moment God places that tiny life into your care, even at conception. And God has been preparing you for parenthood since the moment you started observing your own parents. Spouses come from very different households and parenting philosophies should be discussed from the very beginning. Once these are discussed and you are expecting your child, prepare for your child by staying healthy and going to the doctor. Cover your child with prayer continually! Read 1Thessalonians 5:16-18.

• Split into groups and have them discuss this sensitive topic. Keep in mind that one of the major battles as a parent is consistency. Read Proverbs 14:26; 19:19; 29:15.

"In early childhood, while the children are still dependent upon the parents for care, nurture, instruction, and training; nature itself, not to speak of the Fourth Commandment, teaches that absolute obedience on the part of the children, within the limitations of Acts 5, 29; Ephesians 6, 4; Colossians 3, 21, must be required. Discipline given by either parent during the period of early childhood must be given immediate and unquestioning attention on the part of the children. If either the father or the mother permit disobedience, unwillingness, stubbornness, and other sinful manifestations to gain the ascendancy at this time; fondly and fatuously hoping, meanwhile, that the children will change for the better when they have reached the age of reason and discretion; such a parent is undermining his own position and paving the way for misery and heartaches in the future. The words of the Lord, Ephesians 6:1-3; Colossians 3:20, and elsewhere, are too plain and emphatic to be disregarded with impunity." (OBEDIENCE — ABSOLUTE AND RELATIVE., The New Testament, Vol. 2, The Epistle of Paul the Apostle to the Colossians, Kretzmann's Popular Commentary)

God's Word is our guide and rule in life. In Scripture, God calls parents to discipline their children. Scripture also helps us understand that discipline is about more than punishments. Parents are not called to punish because they are angry. Instead they are to teach and discipline their children so that they learn wisdom, what is good, what is sin, and what serves God and mankind. Sin deserves punishment, yet in Christ there is forgiveness. Let the children hear you ask for and give forgiveness willingly and lovingly. Consider saying, "I forgive you," instead of "That's okay." Read Ephesians 6:1-4 and Colossians 3:21.

- Remind the participants that a preteen or teen needs encouragement, as much, or more than as a younger child who demands the attention in a positive way. Romans 15:4-7, 1 Thessalonians 5:14

In their formative years, you have the responsibility to NOT let your child make decisions that will be bad for him/her. How do you handle materialism, as well as friends and their refusal to attend church? Here are suggested verses to guide these discussions: Ecclesiastes 4:13, Mark 9:37, Proverbs 4:1-6, and Proverbs 19:18.
