

Jesus Is My Confidence!

Confidence! It's great stuff! It makes us feel good. We all want it in every aspect of our lives. But the truth is we often do not feel confident. Sometimes we do okay, but if we are honest with ourselves, many times we are pretending and yearning for confidence that we just do not feel. Where to go? Where to look? What to do? Who will help? How can we get this precious confidence that we so much desire? We look to Jesus who became our Brother taking on our flesh, blood, and bone as a tiny Child so He could take our guilt and sin to the cross and bury it in the grave forever. This confidence is referenced in the Christmas hymn, "Break Forth, O Beauteous Heavenly Light." Although it may not be Christmas, it is still appropriate as we are often like the shepherds shrinking with fright in the various aspects and challenges of our lives.

Break forth, O beauteous heav'nly light, And usher in the morning. Ye shepherds, shrink not with affright, The day of grace is dawning. This Child, though weak in infancy, Our confidence and joy shall be, The pow'r of Satan breaking, Our peace with God now making. LSB 378

- 1. What does the world offer to bolster confidence?
- 2. What is the ultimate destroyer of confidence?
- 3. What is the answer?

Hebrews 10:19-25 presents a summary of the Christian's life of confidence. This confidence begins with the forgiveness of sins in the blood of Christ. It is given to us in our Baptism. Nourished through Word and Sacrament in the Divine Service, it then flows out in love to others until our Savior comes to take us home.

¹⁹ Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, ²⁰ by the new and living way that He opened for us through the curtain, that is, through His flesh, ²¹ and since we have a great priest over the house of God, ²² let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. ²³ Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful. ²⁴ And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, ²⁵ not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near (Hebrews 10:19-25).

- 9. What is meant by "house of God"?
- 10. In verse 22, what is meant by a "true heart"? See Psalm 51:1.
- 11. In one word, what is meant by "hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water"?

What benefits does Baptism give?

It works forgiveness of sins, rescues from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe this, as the words and promises of God declare.

Which are these words and promises of God?

Christ our Lord says in the last chapter of Mark: "Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned" (Mark 16:16).

- 14. What is verse 24 encouraging?
- 15. What does it mean "to meet together" in verse 25? See Acts 2:42.

- 16. Why is it important to connect verse 24, "love and good works," with verse 25, "not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some"?
- 17. According to verse 25, what is "the Day drawing near"?
