Empowered Through Compassion



Sixteen miles east of Onida, a town of 750 in a very rural part of central South Dakota, stands a cemetery in the middle of a field. Abandoned for many years, the graveyard had been reserved for people, mostly young children, who had died of diphtheria.

Encouraged by their pastor, Rev. Brian Lemcke of Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Onida, the teens rallied 'round to manage the upkeep of the cemetery. Each summer they loaded up lawn mowers and weed wackers and headed out to the cemetery, where they would spend the day mowing, picking weeds, extracting rocks, and filling holes in the ground.

As time went on, the teens decided it would be fitting to provide grave markers for those who had been laid to rest in the cemetery. After holding fundraisers, the teens had enough money to purchase supplies necessary to make grave markers. Even though they thought that it was unlikely that anyone else would ever visit the graves, the project gave the teens an opportunity to serve others and demonstrate compassion in the name of Jesus.
