

LCMS Stewardship Ministry – July 2023 Go ... Sell All You Have?

"What must I do to inherit eternal life?" asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, "You know the commandments." And he replied, "All these I have kept from my youth." And Jesus said to him, "One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me" (Luke 18:18–22).

When we hear this story, this question comes to mind: is Jesus speaking to us also, or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor?

As good Lutherans, we answer, "No!" But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor? The simplest explanation is this: if we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, every-thing we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn't excuse us from using our money for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family and society. We are members of all three of these by birth. We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from our Baptism into the church. We are born into a family, and our du-ties to others stem from our birth into that family. Finally, we are born into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other members of society come from either our own birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are ought to be pressed into service for the church, the family and society. If we were to sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and we would falter in fulfilling our duties.

So, consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help those in society. You save for college for your children, and provide food, clothing and shelter for the members of your family.

But the station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits, from off the top, the best, even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought. It means that you sit down and make a plan of what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems that there are other more immediate and pressing things.

And this is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time where giving is low due to high unemployment or where restrictions on meeting in church limit opportunities to give. If we love God and His gifts of forgiveness given through the means of grace, which we receive at church and only at church, then we will support it, just as we love our country and our family. For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son to death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What's more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of church, family and society are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three at birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be an afterthought or even ignored. It is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation through Word and Sacrament.

A Dollar for Missions

The basic idea is simple: Every week each member of your congregation contributes one dollar, over and above regular church offerings. At that rate, in a year's time each member will contribute \$52. The congregation tracks these monies separately from all other offerings, and sends them to the District. At the end of a year, a congregation of 100 people will contribute an extra \$5,200.

Even if only half of the members of CID churches contribute, this kind of ongoing offering would yield almost a million and a half dollars every year to support mission projects. Which missions? As the District recently resolved, "well-conceived projects in the following order of priority: first, brand-new church plants; second, mission-focused augmentations to existing ministries (e.g., adding a new ethnic ministry to a present congregation); third, established CID missions including maintenance and upgrades to facilities (e.g., Ministry in Spanish, Campus Ministry, Deaf Ministry, Prison Ministry)" (Res. R2022-03).

The District's resolution asks congregations to begin gathering DFM funds in January, 2023. For further details, see the Stewardship page of the CID website, http://www.cidlcms.org/ministry-stewardship.html

The Current Project: Amount to be funded: \$35,000

Project: University, Champaign, for purchase of 12-passenger van

University Lutheran is the LCMS Campus Ministry congregation at the University of Illinois Urbana–Champaign. We bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the students, faculty, and staff, as well as others in the area and community.

The van will have two major uses. First, we will use it as a shuttle for students on Sunday mornings. It will drive a pre-planned route, picking up students at specific stops. We hope that this especially will help on days of less than ideal walking weather. We also hope to help students overcome the hurdle of getting to church on a campus where residences are usually a lengthy walk, and bringing a car to campus is difficult and expensive. The second major use will be for transportation to various activities, retreats, and service projects throughout the year. Though we don't travel great distances, the ability to transport many or all of the attendees at once, and not rely on students to provide rides, will be helpful. We plan to make use of the van as a help for the upbuilding of the faith of the LCMS students here, as well as an instrument of outreach for students who want to come but might have difficulty otherwise. In dependence, we trust that God has us and our nation and every generation to come in His Sovereign power.

Strive to live in dependence, looking to the One whose greatest desire is to bless and redeem for Himself often wayward, wandering children.
