On Halloween and Meat Sacrificed to Idols!

I grew up getting dressed up and painted up and being excited to celebrate Halloween. We would trick-or-treat at Grandmas and our neighbor's and show off our outfits. Some years we even had costume parties at our Lutheran school, and we always brought enough candy to school to share with everyone. The fact that many of us who grew up "normal" celebrated Halloween doesn't make it a good idea or a bad one. It's just an observation. My parents and Lutheran school teachers likely never new or cared where the day originated. Its origins were lost in ancient history so far as they were concerned. What they received and passed on was simply the fun of kids in costumes and candy. It was a night for kids and adults to enjoy one another.

There are no definitive beginnings to how we receive Halloween. It's a hodge podge of different traditions. The name itself is of Christian origin and derives from All Hallow's Eve, but many of the histories, if they may be taken as reliable, trace it back to the Celts 2000 years ago. For the Celts it was the festival that signaled the end of fall and start of the cold winter months. October 31 was thought to be the night the ghosts of the dead returned to the earth. (BTW, there are not ghosts, only angels and demons.) Some of the rites associated with the Celtic practice have echoes in some of our modern observances, bobbing for apples, etc.

In thinking through, Halloween and what would become my hermeneutical approach, I didn't want to simply do it because I did it as a kid and it was fun, and the good memories of showing off outfits for grandma. Neither did I want to throw out the practice because some ancients practiced something similar that may or may not have been an antecedent to modern practice. I do want to think through it Biblically, but this is a difficult subject to take chapter and verse back to Scripture.

The nearest parallel I can conjure is 1 Corinthians 10 and Paul's discussion of how a Christian should receive or reject meat that had been offered to idols. Here, Paul is pretty nuanced in the discussion. On the one hand, Christians are called to flee from idolatry, and that meat sacrificed to idols is in fact sacrificed to the devil (demons v.20), whether pagans realize it or not. Since the meat has been used in demonic worship, a Christian cannot share the table of demons with the unbeliever.

That brings us to the question of meat that having once been part of a demonic ceremony might find it's way onto the table. Paul's advice here is to eat unless someone tells you about it, then abstain for the sake of the other person's conscience. Paul's point here is: these false gods are nothing, but the meat is still able to be received with thanksgiving when it's disentangled from the demonic associations.

Again, Paul says if you are invited to a home, don't ask about where the meat came from, receive it with thanksgiving. If you become aware of those connections to pagan practice, avoid for the sake of becoming a stumbling block to Christians who might have scruples against eating meat offered to idols. But whether you eat or drink, Paul said, do it all to the glory of God. If it scandalizes your conscience, avoid. If you receive with thanksgiving (and it's not a stumbling block to a Christian brother who is more scrupulous in the matter), eat to God's glory.

Now the question: How to receive Halloween? Should we trick or treat or is that sin? My answer is an attempt to apply Paul's spirit in 1 Corinthians 10. But it's important to note, Paul's advice was about something that was very current in his day. All the readers of the letter would have wondered about how to receive or not receive that meat offered to idols. The objectionable practice of meat offered to idols was in their face every day and every time they went to the market. The aspects of Halloween, so far as they can be known accurately, are lost in the mists of ancient history. Very few Christians, including my parents and school teachers, drew any connection between dress-ups and exchanging candy and the worship of false gods. Though they didn't let us dress up like devils and demons.

If Paul dealing with a very current question of meat offered to idols could give the advice he gave, I would suggest that he offers us a way of thinking about Halloween... whose origins are nearly impossible to say with certainty, and I imagine few Christians who trick or treat do so because of any ancient Celtic practice. Paul seems remarkably practical in his advice. He doesn't encourage any prolonged investigation of the meat source. He seems to say if you can receive it as a gift from God and to God's glory, participate. If it scandalizes the conscience of a brother in Christ, abstain.

My own thought on Halloween runs this direction. Most people who hand out candy I dare say do it because they enjoy doing something nice for kids. Most parents, because they want to have a fun night for their children. I think Christians ought not glorify demonic things or engage in it in a way that is obviously sinful... cruelty, tricks and vandalism, cheap and immodest outfits.

So, this has been my thought from Paul: If it is a scandal to someone for whom Christ died, I will abstain, and I will not argue someone should ever embrace something that contradicts their conscience. If they can't do it with assurance and act from faith, it's sin (Rom.14:23) and I don't want to be the cause of leading another astray. However, stripped of those associations by two millenia, I don't think any parent needs to feel guilty visiting neighbors or family who are inviting them to come, because they want to do something nice for those children. If your first thought of Halloween is the murky (and really unknowable) rites of ancient peoples, it's probably a good idea to avoid it. If you love Jesus and love your neighbors and love good sweet fun, buy some candy and hand it out or take littles to trusted neighbors and friends. Paul's advice in Romans 14 may serve us well, "Whatever you believe about such things keep between yourself and the Lord... whatever does not come from faith is sin."

Now, realize I'm not telling you what to think or do. I will not let my conscience be your guide. If you dress up as your favorite 16th Century Church Reformer, I think you're just fine. But if the murky, dark history lingers in your mind, you do well to avoid it, and let neither party be too hard on the other. "All things are lawful," but not all things are helpful. All things are lawful," but not all things build up. Let no one seek his own good, but the good of his neighbor" (1Cor.10:23).
