

Throughout the month of August, we will hear readings from the Gospel of Luke. In these readings, Jesus gives us a number of warnings through a series of parables he tells to his followers (and, so, to us), as well as to the Pharisees who are carefully watching him as he goes about his ministry. He draws a stark contrast between those who follow his commands and those who follow worldly wealth and prestige.

Jesus warns against greed – being rich towards ourselves rather than towards God. He tells us not to worry about where we will get our food or clothing or other necessities, telling us how He provides the birds of the air with what they need and clothes the flowers of the field in beautiful colors. Why would he not also feed us and clothe us? Indeed, he has given us much more than food and clothing. He has given us the promise of his Kingdom. But not everyone will enter God's Kingdom (Luke 13:24). He warns us to always be prepared for his return by always following his commands to the best of our ability, to do what we know is the right thing. Jesus tells us that he has not come to bring peace, but division (Luke 12:49-53). We, his followers, will be in conflict with those who do not follow his teachings – maybe even with our family and friends.

In all of these passages Jesus urges us – indeed *commands* us – to stay faithful to His teachings; to be ready for his return; to not fall prey to the temptations of this world. In this way will we reach our ultimate prize of eternal life with Jesus.

The prophet Micah writes, "He has shown you, O man, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6:8)

May God give us the grace and strength to do all these things.

The Staub Family - Featured Family for August

Cherry Staab and her husband Bob came to Cincinnati in 1964 after graduating from the University of Florida. Bob was employed as an analytical chemist for Procter and Gamble. They rented a house in south Greenhills where new neighborhoods were developing. They became familiar with Messiah through Interim Pastor Nordieck's son, Herb, and within the first week, Pastor Kettner visited. Cherry has been a member of Messiah ever since! If you want to know anything about the history of Messiah, ask Cherry!

Cherry is particularly fond of the organ, and attends the traditional service on Sundays at 8:30. As a musician herself, she appreciated the many superb musicians blessing Messiah's worship services. She sang in the choir for many years and accompanied the Sunday School.

In past years Cherry served as president of Messiah's Women's Guild, Sunday School and VBS teacher. When Messiah started a preschool, Cherry was one of the first teachers, and taught for 10 years. Additionally, Cherry produced the Sunday bulletins for Pastor Kettner and was typist, interviewer and editor of the Messenger.

Cherry says "the old saying that 'you retire to go to the doctor' is very true." Medical appointments and therapy sessions consume a lot of her time following recent surgeries. Although retired, she enjoys many activities, including the Cincinnati Ballet and the Broadway performances, and Museum organ concerts as well as membership in the Cincinnati Woman's Club.

Cherry was born in Kentucky and lived in Bardstown, the town today known as the "Bourbon Capitol" of the U.S. Upon moving to West Palm Beach, Florida, she graduated from West Palm Beach High School where she played clarinet in the band and was piano accompanist for the Girls' Choir and the school's Broadway production each year. On campus at the University of Florida, Cherry was in the Gator Band and worked student jobs as typist and secretary. She graduated with a B.S. in Business Education and after moving to Cincinnati reared two very active daughters, both Messiah members (Leslie Schultz and Carole Baldwin). Cherry worked for two attorneys (Al Mangels being one) and then 16 years as Secretary to the Dean of the College of DAAP at the University of Cincinnati. Currently Cherry is cleaning out "stuff" that has accumulated over 60 years in the house she and Bob built in 1966.

Cherry's interests include family activities (5 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren), travel (49 countries and all 50 states), needlecraft, music, art, photography, reading, gardening, Chihuly glass, Russian history and Native American Indian history and culture. Cherry is her real given first name- named for the founder and president of Kentucky Western University, John Cherry. Not only is Cherry a wealth of experience, she is an example of faithful service to Messiah.
