
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The Christian Church keeps a calendar. It's a calendar somewhat out of sync with the world's calendar, which is no doubt of significance. But as we turn the page on the Church Year once again, and welcome the season of Advent, it seems fitting to consider a bit of the "why?" behind this particular way of counting the days and seasons.

We humans are designed by a God of order, who created us and the entire world in time – 6 days, to be exact, and rested on the 7<sup>th</sup>. It is God who set in motion the Earth's rotation around the Sun, the Moon's rotation around the Earth, the seasons, the tides, and all of the orderly temporal workings of our cosmos. Science continues to discover more of the wonders inherit in His design, and we observe that if even small details were ordered differently, life as we know it would not, or could not exist. There is a "Goldi-locks" phenomenon. Everything is "just right".

He is a God of order, after all, and not of chaos. This orderliness informs many aspects of our life as Christians, both individually and corporately. He orders our lives by his commandments. He establishes the institution of Holy Marriage, the vocation of Father and Mother, and the office of the Holy Ministry. He ordains the day of our birth and death. He even governs the rise and fall of nations, and establishes every earthly authority that there is (Romans 13).

So it is no surprise that the Christian Church orders its time also in a very careful way. We take our cue, first of all, from the Old Testament people of God

That you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name. —John 20:31 – the Israelites. Already from Mt. Sinai the 12 tribes observed a very orderly system of time – with appointed sacrifices, festivals and observances in their cycles. The three main feasts of Passover, Pentecost, and the Feast of Tabernacles were marked each year. Jewish observance in Jesus' day continued these and many other customs. Jesus' own family, we are told in Luke 2:41, "Now his parents went to Jerusalem every year at the Feast of the Passover." Of course that's when 12 year old Jesus stayed behind in "His Father's house."

Early on, the church moved her usual day of gathering and worship from the Old Testament Sabbath (Saturday) to the "Lord's Day", Sunday. This was done to honor Christ's resurrection, and thus makes every Sunday a "little Easter". But it also confesses that in Christ, we know an "8<sup>th</sup> day" of the week, a New Creation as we are reborn and renewed in Him.

While the Church Calendar has changed and developed over the millennia, the chief festival has always focused on the death and resurrection of Jesus (which coincided with the Jewish Passover). The Triduum of Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday is seen as a single unit. Jesus' death and resurrection go hand in hand.

While Christmas wasn't celebrated in the earliest years of the church, it has joined Easter and Pentecost now for a New Testament triad of festivals to mirror the three of ancient days. The preparatory and penitential seasons of Advent and Lent also became widely accepted through the years.

Yet, even in the LCMS today there are some differences in how the seasons are counted, whether a congregation follows the 1-year or 3-year (as we do here at Messiah). These are, of course, matters of Christian freedom. But it is also a question of wisdom to receive the helpful traditions the church has handed down.

Ordering our time in such a way also helps us to teach and learn the "whole counsel of God" and to "observe everything I have commanded you" (Matthew 28). We consider, during the "festival half" of the year, the life of Jesus – from the anticipation of his birth in the Advent season, through Christmas and Epiphany which flesh out the wider Christmas cycle. Then, Lent prepares us to observe his passion, suffering and death, followed by the joy of Easter, his Ascension and the sending of the Spirit at Pentecost. Holy Trinity Sunday marks the beginning of the "non-festival" or "regular time" in which we focus on the Bride of Christ, the church. Some mark these Sunday after Trinity Sunday, or as we do the Sundays after Pentecost.

We use different colors, also, to symbolize the themes of each season or occasion. White for purity and righteousness (Christmas and Easter), green for growth and life (regular time), Advent blue for the sky – from which we await Christ's return, purple for penitence and preparation in Lent, red for the flame of the Spirit's work in the word, and black for the darkest days of Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Throughout the year there are also commemorations and minor festivals, remembering various saints, or important events or themes like Reformation Day and All Saints' Day. You can find a roster of these in the front of our hymnal. The hymnody of the church is also organized according to the calendar and the seasons, with an appointed "Hymn of the Day" for each Sunday.

And many Christians also bring the observances of the church's days and seasons into the home – marking Advent with a calendar or a wreath of candles, Christmas with a tree and various decorations, and so on. Sometimes the secular culture appropriates and de-Christianizes these customs, but that doesn't mean we Christians can't continue to make use of them.

Just as the world marks the years, months, even the minutes of our lives for various purposes – so does the church consider the times and seasons as gifts from the Lord. As the years roll by and we continue to anticipate the conclusion of time at Christ's return, let us continue to grow in the fear and knowledge of God and each day, each season, each year – remain in His life-giving Word.
