"Put not your trust in princes, in a son of man, in whom there is no salvation."

Psalm 146:3



It's no secret that we are in the last month of a presidential election. I know many people who are exhausted by it all – and it seems to get worse every cycle. The constant barrage of advertising is one thing. But now we also have the flood of social media political content, and the strife it either creates or reveals among people who might otherwise get along. Of course I won't be endorsing a candidate or party, but permit me to offer some biblically shaped guidance. Let the Word of God shape our thoughts about these

current events, the world in which we live, and our place in it.

Government is a good gift of God. As much as we joke about politicians, governments, taxes, and the like, Christians must acknowledge that earthly government is a good gift of God. Romans 13 teaches us that any authority that exists has been established by God, and is God's servant to do us good. He is also to bear the sword and punish wrong-doers. The government functions to protect us, promote good order, and to curb gross outbreaks of sin (the first use of the law). If you think the government is bad, imagine a world with no government (anarchy). Some tyrant would surely come to power soon and fill the void. Therefore Christians also pray for our leaders and those in authority, that they would do their job well, and that we may therefore live in peace and serve the Lord in freedom.

Likewise, especially in America, we citizens are blessed to be a part of the political process – to vote, to participate in the process, to voice our opinions about public policy, etc. A Christian does these things, and ought to do these things, especially, in service to our neighbor. These are good works in our vocation as citizens. We are, in a way, a part of the government. But we should also do these things as peacefully as possible, remembering that even our neighbor in the other political party is someone for whom Christ shed his blood, and is dearly beloved by God.

Like any gift of God, we can make government an idol. It is always the inclination of sinners to take a good gift of God and twist it, corrupt it, or make it into an idol. And you really can see, with some people, how their "religion" is their politics. They spend so much time, energy and attention on the governing of our nation that it becomes their one true god. But shouldn't we fear love and trust in God alone? Ought we not be wary of glorifying, or even worshipping any man as our savior except for Jesus Christ alone?

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That you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name. —John 20:31 **Trust in God, not princes.** The Psalmist writes, "Put not your trust in princes, in a son of man, in whom there is no salvation." (Psalm 146:3). One of our hymns, "Praise the Almighty" (LSB 797 v. 2) keys in on the Psalm and puts it this way:

Trust not in rulers; they are but mortal;
Earth-born they are and soon decay.
Vain are their counsels and life's last portal,
When the dark grave engulfs its prey.
Since mortals can no help afford,
Place all your trust in Christ, our Lord.
Alleluia! Alleluia!

There is only one savior who can help us escape the real, ultimate, most pressing problem of sin and death – Jesus Christ, our Lord! A king who will never disappoint you. A ruler who is always just and right and good. A leader who has charted us a course through death and to life again – even life eternal.

This world is passing away. Our true citizenship is in heaven. All the problems that politicians promise to solve - and hardly ever do – will not matter in the end. Jobs, the economy, taxes, education, immigration, health care, the supreme court, and whatever other issue of the day – while they may be important for this world – ultimately pale in comparison to what awaits us. St. Paul says it well, "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us." Romans 8:18



**So if your guy doesn't win** the election – have no fear, for Christ still reigns, and your future in glory is still secure. **And if your guy does win** – don't put all your trust in a mortal prince who cannot save this fallen world. Rather look to Christ, the one who deserves all honor and glory.

**Keep your perspective**, Christian – an eternal perspective – informed by the Word, rooted in the faith, and secure in the hope which anchors the soul in Jesus Christ. To him – with the Father and the Spirit - be all glory forever, Amen!

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### STEWARDS UNDER THE CROSS

Newsletter article - October 2020

We celebrate the Reformation at the end of each October. The Reformation began on All Saints' Eve in 1517, which was when Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. So, let's hear from Luther himself on the topic of giving and stewardship.

In the Small Catechism under the Table of Duties, Martin Luther gives specific Bible passages to help Christians know their duty in their various vocations as members of their family, society at large, and in God's family, the Church. Under the heading "What Hearers Owe Their Pastors," Luther lists five passages from the Bible, three of which have to do with giving to your local congregation. They are these:

"The Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel." (1 Cor. 9:14)

"Anyone who receives instruction in the word must share all good things with his instructor. Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows." (Gal. 6:6–7)

"The elders [presbyters, i.e., pastors] who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of double honor, especially whose work is preaching and teaching. For the Scripture says, 'Do not muzzle the ox while it is treading out the grain,' and 'The worker deserves his wages.' "(1 Tim. 5:17–18)

Luther comments on these passages in his 1535 Lectures on Galatians. He wrote:

"When Paul says 'all good things,' this is not to be taken to mean that everyone should share all his possessions with his preacher. No, it means that he should provide for him liberally, giving him as much as is needed to support his life in comfort. ... The apostle is so serious in advocating this topic of support for preachers that he adds a threat to his denunciation and exhortation, saying: 'God is not mocked.' ... All this pertains to the topic of support for ministers. I do not like to interpret such passages; for they seem to commend us, as in fact they do. In addition, it gives the appearance of greed if one emphasizes these things diligently to one's hearers. Nevertheless, people should be taught also about this matter, in order that they may know that they owe both respect and support to their preachers. Christ teaches the same thing in Luke 10:7: 'Eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages'; and Paul says elsewhere (1 Cor. 9:13-14): 'Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the Gospel should get their living by the Gospel.' It is important for us who are in the ministry to know this, so that we do not have a bad conscience about accepting for our work wages ... it happens when those who proclaim the glory of God and faithfully instruct the youth derive their livelihood from them. It is impossible that one man should be devoted to household duties day and night for his support and at the same time pay attention to the study of Sacred Scripture, as the teaching ministry requires. Since God has commanded and instituted this, we should know that we may with a good conscience enjoy what is provided for the comfortable support of our lives from church properties to enable us to devote ourselves to our office." (LW 27:125–126)

**Elders** – Organ project completed. Sound system may be updated. Continuing to monitor COVID situation and consider worship service changes. Handbells have been refurbished. Updating Benevolence Policy.

**Evangelism** – Swaddling Clothes is now serving by appointment – Families in September. Working on guidelines for supporting church workers, missionaries, and other outside missions.

**MLCA** – School has re-opened August 19. Enrollment at 62, down from last year, but many hopeful signs for increase throughout the year. Continuing to receive inquiries and give tours. "Classical Ninja Warrior" was completed and we had he dedication September 18th.

**Stewardship** – Continuing to monitor investment account (monies from Heidorn estate). Currently valued at \$191,000

**Trustees** – Ongoing repairs (toilet, ceiling leak, sprinkler system)
