December 2020

Christmas Carols?!?! Already? What is going on?





Some of you may have noticed a few early invaders in our song selection during the month of December. Christmas isn't here yet, doesn't start for several weeks, and goes for precisely 12 days starting on the evening of the 24th. So why are we singing some of the songs of *that* season instead of devoting our full tuneful attention to the delightful and important hymnody of Advent at this time?

Well, have you ever stopped to wonder what makes the difference between a *Christmas* hymn and an *Advent* hymn? It's the label in the upper corner of the hymnal, right? According to the Lutheran Service Book, hymns 331 – 357 are "Advent," and 358 – 393 are "Christmas." Simple enough, right? ...but who decided which hymns went in each section, and how did they make that determination?

To a certain extent, the exact season a hymn "belongs" to can be a little arbitrary. "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" is certainly appropriate to sing year round, not only in Lent, and while "A Mighty Fortress" is particularly appropriate for Reformation Sunday, it also serves well for numerous other occasions. "Silent Night" could be an awkward pick for Pentecost, just as "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded" may seem out of place on Transfiguration. But many hymns are "assigned" to a particular season due to the themes they address, as well as any biblical allusions they contain which align with the assigned readings.

Did you know that "Joy to the World" was not, by its author, written for Christmas? For all its talk of the "coming of the King," it never specifies which coming of Christ it is referring to! The reason for this is that Isaac Watts actually wrote it as a loose paraphrase of Psalm 98. As this passage is sometimes assigned to particular Christmas services, over the years the hymn began to be associated with the season. However, it is also appropriate to sing on Sundays where celebrate the second coming of Christ. In fact, some hymnals actually include it in the Advent section of the hymnal, as rejoicing is a continually recurring theme of the season, reminding us that we await the promised savior with eager anticipation and excitement, rather than agony and despair, because the comfort of the promise is itself a food for our souls. It is particularly appropriate for the third, "pink" Sunday of Advent, in which "rejoicing" is the main theme of the day.

"Savior of the Nations, Come" is often considered specifically an Advent hymn. It has been sung as the chief hymn for the first Sunday of Advent since the time of Luther! For many, this exact melody signals the beginning of the new church year. This one HAS to be for ADVENT, because we certainly have not been singing it at the wrong time for 500 years!

Well...Take a closer look at the words. Rather than an emphasis on waiting, rejoicing, and preparing, the hymn is actually a meditation on . . . the incarnation! The eight stanzas specifically explore what it means that God became man as the baby Jesus. It would seem we're spoiling the story early singing that four and a half weeks before Christmas! How is this not a Christmas carol? Not to mention, the first Sunday of Advent, for hundreds of years, was about the triumphal entry of Christ on Palm Sunday. What is going on with this mixing of messages?

Some of the hymns with ancient associations to particular days of the church year attained their status not for specific correlation with the appointed readings (which have variously changed throughout the centuries), but rather, for their general appropriateness for the season. "Savior of the Nations, Come" however, is not a hymn for just the *Advent* season, but rather, it captures the overarching themes of the entire Advent-Christmas-Epiphany cycle, all in one song! In other words, it serves as an introduction to the entire extended season of awaiting, and finally celebrating, the birth of Christ. And thus, it is simultaneously a Christmas carol and *not* a Christmas carol!

If you were watching closely, you may have even noticed we began singing several Advent hymns early, in the month of November. Waiting for Christ is waiting for Christ, whether it is the first or second coming! In a certain sense, the seasons of the church year often blend into one another, and thus hymns for one season are often appropriate for other seasons as well. "Lo, How A Rose E'er Blooming" is traditional to Christmas Eve, but references passages from Isaiah which are read during Advent!

And thus, there is no specific day, time, or service before which a crime has been committed if the Christmas repertoire commences. We probably will not sing them in July. But whenever you see a hymn being used outside the season to which our hymnal assigns it, take a minute to reflect on its message and ask yourself how it fits with everything else happening in worship that day. After all, 12 days is FAR too short a time to sing some of the most important music the world has ever known! *Now* Sing We, *Now* Rejoice!

STEWARDS UNDER THE CROSS December 2020

Christmas is coming. It is a joyous time of feasting. The Church feasts upon the Word of God in sermon, song, and sacrament.

We hear the proclamation of the message of the angels: "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:10-11). We mingle our voices with theirs as we sing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased" (Luke 2:14)! We receive the proclaimed Savior, Christ the Lord, not wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in manger but wrapped in bread and wine placed into our mouths for the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. We feast in great joy indeed because of this great blessing from our Lord and God.

God's people in ancient Israel also feasted with great joy. The Lord showered His abundant blessing on His people. And He commanded them to feast upon it (Deuteronomy 16). The people were to go to the place appointed, where the Lord would make His name dwell, and give offerings, each man as he was able, according to the blessing of the Lord that He had given them (Deut. 16:10, 15, 17).

And there the Lord would bless them with joy as they feasted upon what the Lord had provided. They ate of the choice parts of their offerings. They enjoyed the company of all the people of God as they together heard His promises of blessing, sang of His bountiful goodness, and partook of what He gave.

We feast on the Word who became flesh to dwell among us, not just during Christmas but throughout all the year. We feast not just on the salvation He has wrought for us in His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, but we feast also on all the temporal blessings that God gives out of His fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. We enjoy the rich bounty that God provides, not only in Word and Sacrament, but also in house and home, property and income, family and friends.

Let us then, as did our brothers in the faith from ancient Israel, give as we are able, according to the blessing of the Lord our God that He has given us. Let us, like them, give generously of the first fruits of our income, which He gives, so that all may know and enjoy the salvation He gives and the joy we have in the Savior born in the city of David, who is Christ the Lord.

Another quarter of seminary has ended and soon the next will begin. I learned a lot this quarter in each class. I already miss reading through the *Gospel of John* with Dr. Weinrich and reading *The Bondage of the Will* with Dr. Ziegler. Of course, like much of life right now, Covid-19 continues to offer some challenges in our daily lives. The family spent two weeks this last quarter in quarantine. So the kids and I had to take some of our school work online during that time. Those who read last month's newsletter closely may have noticed a glitch in the "music update." I mentioned I hate three announcements, but I only provided two! Here is the missing update:

You may have noticed some slight differences in the music program at Messiah over the fall. For one, the ensembles have gotten smaller, but on the other hand, we do hear from them more often! Our accommodation to the age of COVID has been to divide up our volunteers into smaller ensembles, which has resulted in us having more of them. Our worship schedule now has a bell quartet or small vocal ensemble scheduled for every worship service for the remainder of the fall! As such, we have been unable to do some of the "larger group" things we have done in the past, but it is my hope to return to that as soon as we can. In the meantime, we have re-
