March 17<sup>th</sup> is St. Patrick's Day. Here in the United States, St Patrick's Day is a celebration of being Irish or a day to wear green or a day to eat corned beef and cabbage. All of that has very little to do with who Patrick was and why it matters to us in Christ's Church.

Patrick actually wasn't Irish. He was born to Christian parents in Britain around 389 A.D. He was kidnapped and taken to

Ireland as a slave and forced to be a herdsman for about 6 years, and then he escaped and ended up at a monastery in France. Eventually, he became a priest and then a bishop, and he returned to Ireland sometime after 432. There, he spent his time organizing the Church, preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ, and teaching the biblical truth about the Triune God. At that time, there was division in the Church about the teaching of the Trinity, but Patrick taught clearly that there is one God in three Persons – the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. There are several legends that Patrick used the shamrock with its three leaf clover to teach about the Triune God, but it's probable that those are legends and not historical accounts. Patrick died around 466, and tradition says he died on March 17. That's why St Patrick's Day is celebrated on March 17 each year.

That all makes for a nice history lesson, but for us in the Church today, it's more than a history lesson. This year, there are two things about Patrick's service in the Church that are helpful for us to remember. First, the identity of the Church and our identity as Christians is tied to who God is. The truth of our Triune God is central to the Christian faith and to who we are as Christians. Confessing that the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are the three Persons of the one God is vital to our faith, especially as it confesses that the Son – Jesus Christ – and the Holy Spirit are God. If there is a difference in how a Christian talks about the Trinity, there is also a difference in how that Christian talks about who Jesus is. A confusion about the Trinity leads to a confusion about if the Son is fully God. Any teaching that diminishes our Lord Jesus is a dangerous teaching indeed!

The other important lesson for us today about Patrick is the way that he courageously served God where he was called. After he was ordained as a bishop, he was sent to Ireland, the land where he had been a slave. Ireland was a land that was not overly Christian, but did have a strong influence from the Druids. Druidism is a sacrificial, nature-based religion, and shares some characteristics with other nature based-religions. Patrick confronted the Druids and their religious teachings that opposed the gospel of Jesus Christ. He served as both a missionary and a Church leader at the same time.

So this year, as you drink your shamrock shakes and eat corned beef and cabbage and wear green and think about being Irish for a day, pray that your Triune God gives you the faith and faithfulness that He gave to Patrick. Confess your faith in the Triune God, and courageously proclaim the Gospel of Jesus to those who need it!

## STEWARDS UNDER THE CROSS March 2021

"I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8:8-9).

Without commands or even arm-twisting, St. Paul encourages, even challenges, the Church in Corinth to demonstrate the sincerity of their faith by their generosity in giving. He does this because giving generously is a gift of the Spirit given to us through the Gospel.

St. Paul wrote: "But just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving" (2 Corinthians 8:7). In other words, just as we grow in faith and speech and knowledge of eternal things by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God, so also do we grow in giving from the same Spirit through the same Word.

The problem is that the grace of generosity often grows cold in us. It's not so much that we stop giving, but we don't put it first. We treat it like all the other bills that must be paid. It becomes a chore, just one more thing to check off a list of things to do. That empties it of its spiritual power and robs us of the joy that Christ and the Scriptures assign to it. On top of that, since this generosity is linked to faith and knowledge of divine things, a lack of excelling in giving is sure sign that our faith and knowledge of God are under attack as well.

Thus St. Paul points to the foundation of generosity: the generosity of Christ Himself. Even though He was rich, He became poor so that we who are poor might become rich. Thus, the incarnation, suffering, and death of our Lord on the cross is the reason, source, and driving force for our generosity in giving to the church.

And since Christ who was rich became poor so that we might be rich in His grace—of which generous giving is part—so we also who are rich in His grace can excel in pressing His grace into service toward the gracious work of the church.

Pay attention to what you give to the church so that you may excel at it. And if you find that your heart has grown cold or indifferent toward it, immerse yourself in God's Word. Read it at home. Attend Bible Class. Hear and listen to it preached in the Divine Service. Be reminded of what Christ has done for you in His incarnation, suffering, and death. For this will strengthen your faith and knowledge. And where that excels, so will the grace of giving excel also.

#### Is it STILL Lent?

If you remember back to when the pandemic began, it was the middle of Lent 2020 when everything went on lockdown. With churches and schools closing or going virtual, everyone who was able to work from home, with great fear and uncertainty for the future, may have felt at the time that Lent never really ended. To be unable to join our voices in the sanctuary, tuning in virtually from our computer screens at home, really made the conclusion of Holy Week seem somewhat anticlimactic. And while the streaming service did contain the "Alleluia," we did not shake the walls with our joyful shouts together. Here we are again, in the season of Lent, a year later, and many of the same trials are yet before us. Times of separation from our community, loss of friends or family, and heightened vocational uncertainty have burdened our hearts and minds for so long that they have become "normal." And so, as the seasons return to the Lent it seems we never left a time where many traditionally take on a spiritual practice or abstain from a particular comfort to devote oneself to prayer, there is one thing I suggest we all give up for Lent this time around: hope.

I know that seems unnecessarily dreary and dismal. Things have gotten better, schools and churches are open, and there is light at the end of the tunnel which seems almost in reach. Why now? Do we not have many more reasons to be optimistic than we did seven months ago? Isn't it finally time for things to go back to the way they were before, you know, *normal? The life to which we were accustomed and in which we were more comfortable?* 

The thing is, we were never meant to be comfortable. As we see in our journey through Lent how Jesus is making his way to the cross, we are reminded that we follow a Savior who embraced the path of suffering – with joyfulness. As he drank the bitter cup, Christ himself relinquished all hope that there would be an easier way.

Maybe the world will recover, or maybe what comes next will be worse. Tomorrow is promised to nobody. This world is cursed, and it is time for us to gaze deeply into this truth until we understand that we, too, had better just give up.

Because no matter what happens, our life is hidden with Christ on high, where the saints who have gone before us eternally rejoice on another shore and in a greater light. This is our true home, where our higher citizenship lies, the kingdom to which we are ultimately loyal.

No matter what happens here, for better or for worse, we can face it with the confidence that as surely as God in Christ has joined us miserable sinners in our suffering, he will also bring us into his kingdom where no trace of it may be found. Come, let us fix our eyes on Jesus, as we learn from him in the midst of trials and temptations to pray, bear the cross, and die. For though we, too, will most certainly endure these things, we joyfully follow in the footsteps of Him who went before us, because we know exactly where they lead.

May heaven be ever in your hearts as we respond to Christ's call to be ambassadors for the justice, peace, and joy of His kingdom, shining the redeeming light of true hope into the ruins of this hopeless world. Though weary from all the changes, we will yet celebrate the triumph of His unyielding life at the end of these 40 days with a new thankfulness in our hearts. He has brought us this far, and he will see us safely to the end. Take heart and lift up your eyes.
