

As most of you have seen, Messiah has indeed been assigned a vicar for the 2021-2022 year. Jeremy McDonald of Memphis, TN will be starting here as of July 1st (installed on Sunday, July 4th). He will be joined by wife Dana, who works from home for United Healthcare, and children Madlyn, Connor and Nathan, who will be attending MLCA in the 4th, 3rd, and 2nd grades, respectively.

Jeremy is a former insurance salesman who later in life has entered into seminary training. But his path is a little unusual. He became ordained as an LCMS pastor through a special program called "SMP", which stands for

"Specific Ministry Pastor". To make a very long story short, this is a sort of fasttrack to ordination that the LCMS instituted fairly recently in order to serve congregations in special circumstances. Rather than have laymen performing the role of pastor, it was decided to ordain and train men somewhat more quickly than the usual residential seminary track. An SMP pastor has about 1/3 the formal training as a traditionally trained pastor. SMP pastors are also limited in the breadth of their service to the church, and are supposed to serve under the supervision of a "regular" pastor (called a "general ministry pastor"). There are some other limitations and provisions.

I'll let Jeremy tell the whole story to you sometime, but the short version he told me is that after being ordained through SMP he quickly realized he needed more training to serve as a pastor. And so, with the encouragement of some faithful pastors and professors he had gotten to know, he decided to go with the traditional seminary course after all. He enrolled at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, and has now completed his first two years of classwork and is heading our way for a traditional 3rd year vicarage assignment. But in this unusual wrinkle, he is already ordained and rostered as an LCMS pastor! The seminary vicarage director told me this is the first time he's had a situation like this.

So what does this mean? It means, for Messiah, that we are still getting a vicar, but with some "bonus features"! Normally, a vicar has minimal experience in the field, but Jeremy comes with some measure of experience serving as a guest/ pulpit supply pastor already. Also, normally, a vicar, who is not ordained, is not

permitted to consecrate the Lord's Supper. However, in this case, the church has already ordained and recognized him to do so – and he may do so here.

Likewise, I would not normally send a vicar to visit someone at home and bring them the Lord's Supper, but in this case it would be permissible. Normally a vicar preaches (up to half the time), and Pastor McDonald will certainly be coming to us with a measure of experience in this realm as well, ready to hit the ground running.

But on the other hand, **Pastor McDonald** (as we will address him), is still coming here as a student. He will serve under my supervision and will act as my assistant. The term "vicar" means "stand-in", and so he will server under the authority of the pastoral office in this place, and with my blessing in what I assign him to do. So this is a very different thing from an Associate or even Assistant Pastor role. He will be evaluated periodically by myself and certain members of the congregation. He will be given certain tasks and projects that are meant to expose him to different aspects of life in the congregation. He is at all times a student. And like a "normal" vicar, we will treat him with the same kindness, patience, and forbearance we would an un-ordained man in the position. He will make "rookie mistakes", and we will give him room to do so. He will grow in his skills. This is part of the program, and we will bear with one another in Christian love. If you have any questions about the vicarage program, or the particulars of it here at Messiah, please let me know and we can discuss it!

Please join us for Pastor McDonald's **installation on July 4**th (both services). Be on the lookout for further details about the welcome we are planning for him and his family. We are excited for the year ahead, and the chance to serve the church at large in helping with the formation of a pastor. We thank the Lord for the blessings Pastor McDonald will surely also bring into our midst.

Messiah Lutheran Church – Stewards Under The Cross May 2021

St. Paul teaches us: "Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches" (Gal. 6:6). And again, he says: "Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way, the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:13–14). In other words, ministers of the Gospel are supported by the offerings of those who are served by them. And this is how the church lives even now. It is standard practice. But this deserves closer examination. For it instructs us not just *that* we are to give but also *what* we are to give. And it does so with four little words: "In the same way ..."

St. Paul is building his case for supporting the preachers of the Gospel with the sacrificial giving of individual members on the example of the Old Testament people who supported the Levites with their offerings and sacrifices. We're to support the Gospel ministry "in the same way." But how did the Old Testament people support the Levites? Moses records this: "You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always" (Deut. 14:22–23). The Levites were supported by the tithe, 10 percent of all the yearly yield of that which was harvested.

Does that seem like a lot? Does it surprise you that St. Paul instructs us that we are to support the New Testament Gospel ministry "in the same way?" If it does, ask yourself: Is the church's job in the New Testament bigger or smaller than the Levites' job in the Old Testament? Back then, there was one Temple, and the ministry was almost exclusively located in one nation among the descendants of Abraham. In Matthew 28, Jesus calls us to teach and baptize all nations, and there are churches and ministries all around the world! How could we support this new Gospel ministry with anything less than the Israelites supported the Old Testament ministry?

Of course, we are free to give more, for we have received more than those in the Old Testament. We have received the fullness of God's revelation, the fullness of His salvation, and the fulfillment of everything that God promised to do. For we have received Christ, God's own Son, in the flesh, who took upon himself our sins and in exchange gave us his righteousness. The Father claimed us as his own in Holy Baptism. He gathers us together in the place where his name dwells to feast on the first fruits of the resurrection, the risen and living body and blood of His Son – our Lord Jesus. He reminds us that we are His, that all things are ours because we belong to Him. He blesses us here in time with physical and spiritual gifts.

In the same way – and in response to His fatherly divine goodness and mercy – we gladly give to those who proclaim to us "the excellencies of him who called us out of darkness and into his marvelous light." For once we were not a people, but now we are God's people; once we had not received mercy, but now we have indeed (1 Peter 2:9–10).








Life Team—Tool Kits Now Available!
