Counselor's Corner

Staying on God's mission

Working together with him, then, we appeal to you not to receive the grace of God in vain. For he says, "In a favorable time I listened to you, and in a day of salvation I have helped you." Behold, now is the favorable time; behold, now is the day of salvation. 2 CORINTHIANS 6:1-2

Workplace drama can be more than just a little discouraging. I have sat with people seriously considering changing professions, moving to new locations, and even stepping out of the workforce entirely based on the atmosphere in their places of employment. I know that following COVID-19, "the drama" was one of the main reasons many people were reluctant to return to the office.

Working with people can be a challenge, there is no doubt about it. There are personal interests, passions, pet projects and, of course, the stress from personal lives that often bleed into workplace interactions. In fact, it can poison them. We can become so overwhelmed by the

things that surround our lives that we become unable to efficiently do what we ought to be doing. Those times of distraction are too often the times when mistakes, accidents and missteps take place and only lead to greater frustration and dysfunction. This is why Paul in 2 Corinthians appeals to us to keep our focus as we work with God in this present age to proclaim the day of salvation, which is now.

At church we can become distracted by cliques, mission initiatives and who's missing from the clean-up party after the last big event, that we forget how we have been called to share the mission and ministry of Christ, not our self-interest. We begin to feel threatened as we look at attendance numbers, bank balances and external pressures from the world. As we forge ahead in our mission in our communities, our head spins in many directions focusing on things of the world, all while losing sight of the cross.

We must always remember that we work together for the Gospel — that Jesus Christ came to seek and save the lost, to bleed and die for them in order that He might emerge victorious over death and the grave by the power that enables Him to subdue all things to Himself — so that those who are hurting around us may have an eternal relationship with the God who loves them.

Satan works tirelessly to get us to lose sight of our true mission so that we trip over each other, make mistakes in the form of harsh words or make hasty decisions. The world places new hurdles in front of us every day, and the sin we all possess continues to erupt in our relationships. Therefore, we must encourage each other every day.

It wasn't only Paul who had to remind the church of this. To paraphrase and adapt words from Peter, "We must not lose sight of the one who called us out of darkness and into His marvelous light, that we may declare His praises to the world."

Take a moment in the coming days and weeks and try to identify ways you may have been caught up in the drama of life instead of the narrative of God's mission. Run toward reconciliation, strive for unity and extend grace. The challenges may seem insurmountable and our task heavy. But remember, the one who raises the dead is with us, and the battle for salvation is won. All we must do is boldly proclaim it and root out the worldly divisions among us, that more may come to know the comfort we ourselves have been comforted by in Christ Jesus. To Him be all the Glory.
