### Here am I, send me

Dear members and friends of Mt. Calvary,

Greetings in the name of Jesus! I don't know about you, but for me, the summer has flown by. It seems that we should have at least another couple months of warm weather, vacations, family reunions, and the like, but alas, when you receive this newsletter, it will be September 1st.

I actually don't mind the cooler weather, the football, and the changing colors, but it seems as though there is a seismic shift that happens as the calendar turns the page from month 8 to month 9. We go from mostly care-free to resuming a vast number of responsibilities. This seems to be most pronounced when a person is still in the process of formal education.

With school, there is often a day of orientation, a first day of classes, and perhaps, a move in day that marks a sharp cut off and the beginning of something new. As parents know, feelings can start to well up within their children when they realize that the day is near. I remember well the butterflies that I used to get. Thankfully, I can say that I almost always looked forward to school starting. At the same time, I know that there can also be feelings of fear and dread.

A few weeks ago, one of my aunts reached out to us cousins concerning her son, who will be starting college this fall. She said that moving him in was very emotional and he was having a bit of a tough time coming to grips with being so far away. Although she said that he was having a difficult time, I think she herself was struggling with the baby of the family doing something so grown up. She asked us if we, as his cousins, could pray for him, send him a message, write him a letter, or call him. Although I'm sure that she had already told him, she wanted him to know through us that it was normal to feel this way. Everybody gets scared, nervous, and homesick sometimes. And, in the end, things turn out okay.

As soon as the message came through, I thought about the times that I had felt the same way. Probably the toughest one was the move to Missouri for Seminary. I remember being really sad for about a week afterward. Soon, I was distracted by classes and friends and exploring a new city, but being in a place that was so foreign, you can really start to doubt yourself. I'm sure every Seminarian has wondered, at one point or another, what they were doing there. There must be some mistake. God couldn't really want you to do this. Get out now.

There's a German word that Martin Luther liked to use: anfechtung. Although there is not an exact English equivalent,

in one biography of Martin Luther, it is described as "all the doubt, turmoil, pang, tremor, panic, despair, desolation, and desperation which would invade the heart of man." Basically, Martin Luther was keenly aware of his unworthiness due to his sin. Luther said "I am dust and ashes and full of sin." To Luther, the fact that God would love him and use him in His kingdom might have often felt like a mistake.

The prophet Isaiah felt the same way when he saw a vision of the Lord. With his eyes, he saw that the train of the Lord's robe filled the entire temple. He saw heavenly creatures with wings, saying "Holy, Holy, Holy!" This caused Isaiah to say "Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!" In response, the angel takes a burning coal from the altar and touches it to Isaiah's lips. The angel tells him that his guilt is taken away and his sin is atoned for. With his guilt taken away and his sin atoned for, Isaiah was able to say "Here am I! Send me!"

This text is often used at the ordinations or installations of pastors and I am pondering it again as I am considering a call. In many ways, it applies to the people of the congregation as well. It applies to those who bring the Gospel, who may often wonder "what right do I have to carry the Word and bring it to others?" Yet, Christ has cleansed and purified us through the blood of His cross. Because He rose from the dead, we will be eternally around the Lord's throne, singing His praises. Though there is no merit or worthiness in us, God uses us as instruments in bringing the Good News. For this reason, we can joyfully say "Here am I! Send me!" in whichever place that the Lord puts us.


Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

#### "We Preach Christ Crucified" -- LCMS National Convention Report from Pastor Sattgast

On July 29 through August 3, nearly 1,500 voting delegates, advisory delegates, advisory representatives, and special guests met in Milwaukee, Wisconsin for the 68th National Convention of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. The theme for the convention was "We Preach Christ Crucified" based on 1 Corinthians 1:23-24.



Throughout the convention, the worship services, the devotions, many of the reports and even some resolutions to be voted upon focused on the convention theme "We Preach Christ Crucified." That is at the heart not only of our Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, but of the entire Christian faith. From the time of the fall into sin, all of us and all people are affected by sin, both the original sin we have at birth and the sins we commit against God and one another. We continually see the results of sin in the world around us with so many rejecting God's Word, God's will, God's plan of salvation, and God's design for who He has created us to be. Yet God, in His grace and mercy, has sent Jesus to be the Savior and take the guilt of all sin on Himself on the Cross so that we and the world may have forgiveness and salvation. Now the mission of the Church is to preach Jesus Christ and Him crucified to all people so that by the power of the Holy Spirit they may believe. Ultimately, this affects everything we do as the Church and how we live our lives of witness as God's people, even in a world that often doesn't want to receive our witness. Nothing less than eternal life is at stake.

Over 1,000 "voting delegates" to the convention were selected from the circuits of the 35 districts of the LCMS. From the time that our Synod was founded in 1847 (176 years ago), the voting delegates have been equally divided between pastors and laity for the specific purpose that in conducting its business, the Synod is neither clergy-dominated nor lay-dominated. Each circuit, therefore, elects one pastoral and one lay delegate. The South Dakota District sent a total of sixteen voting delegates from its eight circuits. 160 "advisory delegates" to the convention represented the 10,000 "commissioned" workers of our Synod. Those include Lutheran School Teachers, Directors of Christian Education (DCEs), Deaconesses, and a few other categories of church workers. An additional 161 "advisory representatives" attended. They included district presidents and individuals who serve on various boards, commissions, or other "agencies" within Synod. I attended because I serve as the chairman of the Commission on Handbook which is responsible for maintaining the Constitution and Bylaws of Synod.

Prior to a convention, Synod's congregations, circuits, districts, seminaries, universities, boards and commissions all have the right to propose "overtures" for consideration by the Synod in convention. Over 250 overtures were received for this convention. Overtures that have similar content are combined by "convention floor committees" into "resolutions" that actually come to the floor of the convention for debate and voting. Over 75 resolutions were presented and adopted ranging in topics from establishing partner church relations with Lutheran denominations in Sudan, South Sudan, Uganda, Finland, Ukraine, and Sri Lanka to addressing social issues such as human trafficking and addressing our society's disregard for God's design for marriage, family, and sexuality. Other important resolutions addressed pastoral preparation especially recognizing the shortage of pastors, and strengthening the Lutheran identity at our Synod's universities. Sadly, Concordia University Texas has chosen to sever its connection with the Synod, thereby breaking the Bylaws of Synod under which it is supposed to operate. One resolution called for that university to repent and reestablish its relationship with the Synod. I expect that in a coming issue of The Lutheran Witness there will be articles which will also provide a report of this and other resolutions that were adopted.

Each convention also involves the election of the president and other officers of the Synod, along with members of various Synod boards and the boards of regents for our seminaries and universities. A very extensive nomination and vetting process is done prior to the convention. Rev. Dr. Matthew Harrison was reelected to a fifth term as Synod President and all of the currently serving vice-presidents (including Pastor Nabil Nour from South Dakota), along with the current secretary of Synod, were reelected.

One of the observations I have with this convention is that while there are always differences of opinion on various topics, on those areas where the Scriptures and our Lutheran Confessions speak clearly there is great unanimity in our Synod. Several resolutions passed with not a single dissenting vote. That, to me is amazing. And on many other matters, most of the resolutions passed with over 80% to 90% majority votes. That, also, is amazing to me because I've seen many conventions when the voting on major issues often passed or failed because of divisions like 48% to 52%.

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Special highlights of the convention, for me, were presentations by leaders and members of recently established Biblically faithful Lutheran Churches in Finland and Ukraine. Rev. Serge Maschewski, the "Bishop" (President) of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine (ELCU) spoke of the challenges facing that church body and its members not only in the midst of the war with Russia, but also with the pressure in Ukraine to embrace the LGBTQ agenda. Likewise, Bishop Juhana Pohjola of the Evangelical Lutheran Mission Diocese of Finland (ELMDF) and Dr. Paivi Rasanen, a member of the Parliament in Finland and also a member of the ELMDF, spoke of the persecution they have faced, including being charged with "hate speech," because they have published writings that defend the Bible's teachings of male and female and the sanctity of marriage. In each case, these individuals and their churches are committed to upholding the teachings of the Bible in spite of the opposition and persecution they face.

Relief for Human Need Worldwide

Where there is poverty, there is hunger. Poor nutrition and hunger are responsible for nearly half of the deaths in children under the age of 5 because their bodies lack basic nutrients. The majority of these deaths occur in regions of Asia and Africa. Orphan Grain Train (OGT) is compassionate about the hunger crisis and this past Fiscal Year more than 5.1 million fortified rice meals were shipped world-wide. The monetary gifts from Orphan Grain Train donors make these shipments of life-saving food possible.

In the Fiscal Year ending May 31, 2023 OGT shipped 274 shipping containers of donated relief supplies to 38 states and 71 countries worldwide. 27 regional OGT locations collect and distribute food and reusable goods. Our nearest OGT warehouse is in Norfolk, NE. We have had youth and Lutheran Women in Mission volunteer there and in Milbank packing Mercy Meals and clothing for shipment.

We continue to collect used clothing for needs worldwide. We thank you for the clothing and for monetary gifts to support these humanitarian efforts.

#### **PRESCHOOL**

Some exciting news for our preschool this year...for the first time in a very long time both our morning and afternoon classes are full, and we have a waiting list! What a blessing! Ashley and Krysten are both excited about welcoming our new students and returning students, preparing for the school year. This year we will not only be teaching letters, numbers, shapes, and colors but our students will be learning about Jesus through Bible stories/songs, memorizing the Lord's Prayer as well as learning the 10 Commandments. We are excited about our new curriculum and bringing our ministry into the homes of every student. Our first day of school was Monday, August 28.

We are also starting an after-school program operating Monday-Friday from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. With the recent loss of funding for TAP in our public schools there was a need for aftercare.
