Test the Spirits

Dear members and friends of Mt. Calvary,

Greetings in the name of Jesus! As we seek to serve the Lord and our neighbors this month, may we always remember that our crucified and risen Lord has given us a spirit, not of fear, but of power and love and self-control. Those are Paul's words to young Timothy as Timothy sought to serve the members who were entrusted to his care. It certainly applies in the context of pastoral ministry, but it has a wide variety of other applications within the life of the laity as well.

Notice how Paul tells Timothy what this good spirit looks like, but he also tells him what it does not look like: fear. As

young Timothy ventured out into pastoral ministry, it would require him to have a lot of courage. He would need courage to speak the truth, he would need courage to endure through suffering, and he would need courage to face credible threats of death. Paul knew these things all too well from his own experiences and through the inspiration of the Spirit, he was led to equip Timothy and the entire Church with the knowledge that things were not changing any time soon.

Our world has an interesting relationship with fear. In American culture, the month of October seems to be the unofficial start of what has often been dubbed "spooky season." Sure, in autumn, people also enjoy apple picking and hayrides and pumpkin spice flavored items, but there are many people around us who like to be frightened. People like to watch scary movies. People like to frequent haunted houses. People like to dress up as grotesque and fiendish creatures, while going door to door demanding candy. If we step outside the sphere of our culture, we would be more likely to realize that this is all pretty strange.


If you were to look into the origins of Halloween, you would find some pretty interesting things. First of all, the name "Halloween" has a connection to the Church. As words sometimes do, the word Halloween has morphed over time, but it started off as "All Hallows Eve." All Hallows Eve is what we used to call the day before All Saints Day and together with All Souls Day, the three formed what is called a triduum. On All Hallows Eve, it was thought that the church focused on the evil in the world before the flood. The next day, on All Saints Day, they remembered who were saved from the cleansing flood that God sent. And finally, on All

Souls Day, they remembered how God provided for those who repopulated the earth. Nowadays, on All Saints Day, we remember those in the Church who have fallen asleep in Christ in the previous year, but unfortunately, other practices and beliefs had already crept into the previous three-day Christian holiday.

You see, before the Christian faith was widespread, pagan cultures thought of autumn as the time that the world was dying. The leaves fall off of the trees, the grass becomes brown, and after the harvest, the fields are devoid of growth. Since the world around them was thought to be dying, the people themselves contemplated their own demise. Around the end of October, there was a thought that the barrier between the material world and the afterlife thinned, so that it could more easily be breeched. We see this in the Mexican celebration of Dia de

los Muertos (Day of the Dead). In this line of thinking, the afterlife included not only the spirits of those who were good, but also those who were evil. Therefore, on All Hallows Eve, many people thought that they needed some kind of protection from these evil spirits who were roaming the earth, which is partially where we get the practice of Jack-O-Lanterns. Jack-O-Lanterns with spooky faces are supposed to scare away these spirits, based on the Irish legend of Stingy Jack. But as Christians, we do not

need to fear ghosts, since the souls of the dead do not wander the earth.

In all of these things, we can see that fear and terror was gripping the hearts of these people. They feared the unknown, the strange, and things that they could not control. For comfort, they often resorted to placing power or importance in objects or ideas. Even during the time of Martin Luther, there were many superstitious practices in the Church that needed to be corrected. People would place undue importance on holy relics like the spear that pierced Jesus' side or an original nail from the cross. In trademark Luther fashion, he went back to the Word of God and found these things to be unbiblical and preposterous.

So, where does all of this leave us? Should Christians be protesting Halloween? Should we be barring our children from trick or treating? At the end of the day, this issue is Adiaphora, something that is neither commanded nor forbidden by the Scriptures. This is something that depends upon the conscience that we have been given, informed by the Scriptures and carried along by the Holy Spirit. In I John 4, it

says "Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, for many false prophets have gone out into the world. By this you know the Spirit of God: every spirit that confesses that Jesus Christ has come in the flesh is from God."

In the month of October, Mt. Calvary is going to be doing a couple of youth activities, including pumpkin carving and a trunk or treat. For the pumpkin carving, I plan to have Christian stencils that can be used on the pumpkins to witness to our faith. As the light goes inside, we can remember that Jesus is the light that no darkness can overcome. At our trunk or treat last year, our elders all dressed up as Bible characters. In this way, we can still have fun and we can also remember all the saints, the heroes of the faith, who have gone before us. It may be different from the world around us, but remember, we are called to be different. In a world that trembles at the thought of evil and death, we know that death has lost its sting and evil will be no more. In Jesus, we have that guarantee.

Preschool through 6th grade


will go to opening in the sanctuary from 9:15 to 9:30 a.m. then to the basement to their respective classrooms for Sunday school class.
