Around the Table

Dear members and friends of Mt. Calvary,

Greetings in the name of Jesus! May our gracious God and Father bring you an abundance of blessings and a countenance that overflows with joy this month. This is my prayer for you, because I know that joy is not always the prevailing feeling as we enter into the stretch before us.

As we think about the thirty days ahead of us and beyond, we know that they may bring a mixed bag of emotions. Feelings of joy and nostalgia often shift to feelings of worry and angst, because holidays like Thanksgiving can be a stressful time for a lot of people. Just think about all the "ingredients" that could go into this mixture that we call Thanksgiving Dinner.

First of all, you have travel. Whether people travel on the road or in the air, there is no stress-free environment. By car, they will find gas prices that are still sky high and the possibility of breakdowns. By plane, they risk luggage getting lost and an uncomfortable experience with cramped seats.

Then, even when the travel rush has ended, there is preparation for the big fancy meal, which often falls on the shoulders of only a few individuals. Ingredients, including main dishes, are more expensive than ever before. And it seems that there is always at least one catastrophe. Not enough

pies, lumpy gravy, or forgetting to thaw the prized bird. Hopefully your catastrophe doesn't involve putting a frozen turkey in the deep fryer.

Then, of course, there are the people. Although there has been a movement recently toward "Friendsgiving," we know the usual suspects for our Thanksgiving table. Most often, the people we gather with are our family members: grandpa, grandma, parents, aunts, uncles, brothers, sisters, nieces, nephews, and cousins.

Many of these blood relatives have been living separate lives until this one day when they are all crammed in the same room. Childhood rivalries may be reignited. Political comments begin to fly. Young college students, flush with new ideologies, start

spewing the new ideas that they have come to believe. Older adults, perhaps a bit stubborn and set in their ways, begin to push back with all their might.

Does this sound like any Thanksgiving Dinner that you have witnessed? I would be surprised if you never have any

stress when you get together for the big shindig at the end of November. In my family, thankfully, it's usually not so bad when we get to the event itself, but the older and younger generations have clashed on the timing. Some want the gathering earlier, some want it later. Some want it on a Saturday, some on a Sunday. Some have other gatherings to go to, others do not. And of course, in the end, not everybody is happy.

I feel blessed to have grown up in a household and in a family where there was very little conflict. Of course, in most families, there's probably one who could be called a black sheep or others who may come off as odd, but nothing quite to the level of other families that I have known.

As a pastor, I have had some different experiences. Of course, I get to be there at some of people's best moments, but I also get to help people pick up the pieces after some of their worst experiences. Unfortunately, it is no longer a surprise to me when I hear that family members are not speaking to each other or that any combination of siblings, parents, children, and others have had a major falling out. It has become so commonplace that I almost don't even bat an eye.

It seems that now, more than ever, Satan is trying to drive a wedge between family members. In schools, some educators are encouraging children to transition to a different gender without their family's knowledge. During COVID, we saw a mass movement toward cutting off contact with family members, due to positions on vaccination, masking, social distancing,

and the pandemic. And there have been many other attempts to demonize the other, the one that does not agree with us.


What we have to realize is that God made the family for a reason. Not just a dad, a mom, and children, but grandparents, uncles, aunts, and cousins. The structures that He put into place should not be discarded at the first sign of trouble. God created the family to support, to encourage, to instruct, and to lead by example.

From listening to many people's stories, I can say that these family separations are often one-sided. Many people long for a reunion. Many would love nothing more than to reconcile, but they feel that at this point, it may be an impossibility.

In the Bible, there are accounts of family

interactions everywhere that you look, from Cain and Abel to Abraham and Sarah to Joseph and Mary. Many of the chapters recorded for us include incredible amounts of dysfunction, far more serious than most any instance of family dysfunction in

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our own lives. In Genesis alone, we see Jacob stealing Esau's birthright and blessing, followed by Joseph being sold into slavery by his brothers. And yet, those accounts of family dysfunction are followed by even more extraordinary shows of forgiveness.

Jacob the heel-grabber was sure that his brother Esau would kill him the moment that he saw him, but instead, we see one of the most beautiful moments in all the Scriptures. Big, rugged Esau runs up to his shrimp of a brother and squeezes him hard. At that moment, it must have been a little bit dusty, because neither of them could keep from crying. It had been so hard being apart, because their natural state was

being together. Jacob even says that to see Esau's face again was like seeing the face of God. The reason that Jacob says that is because he knows that way that God operates. God is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love.

Jesus, in the parable of the prodigal son, teaches that the father of that wayward son ran to meet him. No matter what he had done, he just wanted him to come home. So, as you make your way to family gatherings and wade into those deep waters, remember that family is a gift of God. Remember that Christ forgave the worst in you and calls on you to forgive others, especially those closest. It may not be easy, but we can still stand for the truth of God's Word and show compassion to all His children.

Is Our "Missions" Giving All That Important?

Each year, Mt. Calvary adopts its annual **Background:** "budget," a portion of which is designated for missions, including a significant amount designated for the South Dakota District. Because I served as District President and have firsthand knowledge of how the mission commitments the district receives from its congregations are used, the president of Mt. Calvary, Kerwin Haeder, and Pastor Koester asked that I would write a newsletter article and some bulletin notes and give a presentation on missions before the Sunday Services and in the Adult Bible Class. Those who were present in church on October 22nd heard those presentations and read the bulletin insert. For those who weren't present but who are interested in how our missions giving to the District is used, the following is what was included on the bulletin insert.

What About Our "Missions" Giving?

On our offering envelopes, there are two categories for our weekly giving. The *first* is FOR OTHERS. It is first for a reason. In the church's life, just as in our own personal life of faith, God's Word encourages us to count others before (or better than) ourselves and to look not only to our own interests, but to the interests of others (see Philippians 2:3-4). The second category is FOR OURSELVES.

Under the first category, there is one single item, namely "Missions." As the Mt. Calvary Voters Assembly set our annual budget for 2023 [and again for 2024], it designated \$89,000 for Missions. Of that, a portion was designated for our South Dakota District's special "over-and-above" project of Together in Mission (T.I.M.) providing direct support for Synod Missionaries in Eurasia. Two of those missionaries are pastors who have previously served in the South Dakota District. Another portion is to help support the fairly new Lutheran Family Services organization which provides counseling services with a distinctive Lutheran / Christian emphasis for both professional church workers and for the laity of our

District's congregations. For several years, \$70,000 has been designated for "District. The balance is for Mt. Calvary's outreach through our Early Education Center, support for the Main Street Living television program, and for Lutherans for Life.

What about our "Missions" Giving to the District?

Mt. Calvary is a congregation of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, a denomination of approximately 6,000 congregations in the United States. The LCMS is divided into 35 districts, one of which is our own South Dakota District. There are certain ministries and missions that, because of their size, Districts and Synod are able to do on behalf of the congregations and often more efficiently than single congregations would be able to do. Those include training of pastors, teachers and other church workers, helping call and place pastors, teachers and other church workers as needed in congregations and church schools, sending and providing foreign missionaries and institutional and military chaplains, starting new congregations, providing programs and resources for established congregations as well as many other services.

The "Missions" commitment that Mt. Calvary sends to the District is used as follows:

49.4% goes to direct "Mission / Outreach" support, including support for the Synod, new mission congregation support in the district, missionaries on the Rosebud Reservation (Pastor Andrew Utecht) and on the Pine Ridge Reservation (Pastor Albert Sutton), deaf ministry support (Pastor Matthew Nix), university student ministry support (Brookings, Vermillion, Madison), and financial aid for those preparing for church work (pastors, teachers, DCEs, etc.).

<u>26% goes to congregational services support</u>, including Lutheran Witness subscriptions, youth and young adult services, disaster response, district conferences, workshops, and conven-

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tions, and the hospital chaplain in Sioux Falls (primarily for patients who are from congregations throughout the district *outside* the Sioux Falls area).

<u>24.6% goes to administration</u>, namely support for the district president, the assistant to the president (formerly "executive secretary"), the district business manager, the administrative assistant, and finally building and property maintenance.

Some Additional Thoughts:

Many of us are aware of verses in the Bible which speak of the offerings that God's people give. But what we may not realize is that many of those verses in the New Testament are speaking not primarily about the offerings that God's people are giving in support of their local church or gathering of believers. Rather, many of those verses are speaking about offerings which will be used for the support of Christian ministry in other locations. Specifically, as the Apostle Paul wrote his letters ("epistles") to the Romans and Corinthians, he wrote of special offerings that would be used for the relief of "the poor among the saints at Jerusalem" (cf. Romans 15:26). Take a few moments and look at these writings: Romans 15:25-26; I Corinthians 16:1-4; and 2 Corinthians 8:1 to 9:15. Then take a look at Philippians 2:1-11, and especially verses 3 and 4.

While we would all agree that the Lord's work here at Mt. Calvary is vitally important and deserves our faithful stewardship and support, we also realize that even as our Savior came not to serve Himself but to serve others and even give His life for them, so He has also called us to serve others as

well. Both as a congregation and as individual members of the congregation, one of the ways we serve others is through our mission giving. Though we may not always personally see the results, lives are being touched through the Gospel ministries we support with our mission giving, whether it be people in a new mission congregation in our district, or people hearing the Gospel through our missions on the Reservations in South Dakota, or people being served in through our District's ministry with the deaf, or people first hearing about Jesus through the foreign missions we support, or students who are receiving District aid as they prepare to be pastors, teachers, or other church workers. And there are many others as well. What a real difference our mission giving FOR OTHERS makes!


