The End is Better than the Beginning

Dear members and friends of Mt. Calvary,

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior! I pray that our Lord would grant you an extra measure of patience, hope, charity, and love as you serve Him this month. By the time you read this article, some of our fellow congregations in the LCMS will have already started their Advent prepara-

tions. They will have four Wednesday Advent services, while we will only have three. Because of the way everything falls, this year, the 4th Sunday in Advent will be Christmas Eve. They may have one more evening with their bellies full of good Advent supper food, but do not fret. By deciding to have three Wednesday Advent services instead of four, we are getting an advanced lesson in what this season is all about. And we are also learning that the end is better than the beginning.

A couple of weeks ago, I needed a lesson in a lot of different things. It had been a hectic week and for me, it looked like things weren't going to get done. On Friday, there were phone calls that I didn't expect. There were people in the Church building that I didn't expect. There were things that I had to do that I didn't expect. But I had thought it would be a nice quiet Friday where I could put the finishing touches on my sermon for the week.

It all started with a phone call to the Church Office. As I was typing furiously, Lorna called from her office to say there was somebody on hold for me. She said his name, but it didn't register. I asked "did he say where he was from?" But there was no clarification until I picked up the phone. It was an old friend from

Concordia St. Paul. He had gone to school to be a Lutheran Classroom Teacher and we had been in a Bible study together with several other guys during my time there. He now works as a fuel truck driver and happened to be in town. Only problem was, he couldn't get himself to Church with his truck. I would need to pick him up early on Sunday morning.

My first thought was "I don't really have time for this," but it was such a blessing to have him here. He dutifully sat through my sermon and my Bible study and came up afterward to say, "It was so great to see you doing your thing. They're blessed to have you." The end was better than the beginning.


On that same Friday, I had an unexpected visitor. After the

first phone call, I was a bit annoyed. People keep coming to our door and I have to tell them "I'm sorry, we can't do much to help you." I walked out of my office in a huff and went to the Fellowship Hall where she was sitting. She looked vaguely familiar, but I could not remember where I had seen her before. She said "I remember you. You're Pastor Kevin, right? You helped me about a year ago." A year ago, she was in a bad situation. She was pregnant with no working vehicle. I would like to say that she was happily married with a devoted husband, but this was an unplanned pregnancy involving deception and a very sad set of circumstances. We had convinced her to spare the child's life, but now, she was coming to me with a different problem. Her car had started on fire near Virgil Road. Somebody had volunteered their vehicle to tow it, but they needed gas. We got her set up with a gas card, but as she was telling me the story, she broke down in tears. She said "I'm trying. I'm really trying. I don't do drugs. I don't drink. I'm trying to hold down a job, but things like this keep happening." I im-

mediately felt ashamed that I had been so dismissive of her at first. Then, she said "Things can only get better from here, right?" And then she showed me pictures of her I-year old son. The end was better than the beginning.

Not heavy in the sense of sadness, but heavy in the sense of bursting at the seams with various emotions. I get to minister to children on a regular basis, whether through our preschool or on Sunday mornings during services or during the week in (continued on page 2)

Family Ministry. I don't often get to minister to them when they are in the hospital. I thank God that I don't have to do that very often, actually. Children are very often resilient, bouncing back quickly from broken bones and accidents and other things like that. But it's a lot harder when you have to say "this is going to be with you for a long, long time." It's a hard concept to understand, for someone so young. They've only been around for about a decade or even less, in some cases. To them, each moment seems a lot longer, because this is new. Or at least, their experience with it is relatively new. In those moments, you can sugar coat it or you can try introducing a concept that many adults don't even get. God uses suffering. God works through you as a person. God brings glory out of our experience, if we handle it with endurance and patience.

My heart absolutely melted when her mom said this young lady wanted to see me. She smiled as my name was brought up and wanted me to come down and help her through this. One of mom's favorite passages that I shared throughout the week was Lamentations 3:25-26, which says "The Lord is good to those who wait for him, to the soul who seeks him. It is good that one should wait quietly for the salvation of the Lord." I sent those verses on one of the days I wasn't at the hospital and on another day, when I was there, I saw that she was getting frustrated. I repeated my plea for her to have patience. Eventually, her patience was rewarded. She was absolutely

beaming as she came to worship the next Sunday. The end was better than the beginning.

As we know, Advent is all about waiting and our waiting seems to be satisfied by the coming of Christ, the baby in the manger. But really, our waiting is not completely satisfied on December 25th. As we start the new church year in Advent, we still have yet to hear about the full extent of what this Christ would do. I once heard another pastor say that every Christmas, he could preach an Easter sermon, and every Easter, he could preach a Christmas sermon. Although I think people would revolt, he might have a point. They go together. And if we had to rank Christmas and Easter, the end is actually better than the beginning. Yes, Christ comes as the prophets foretold, but that is "only" the first part of the message. Christ would come to die. Christ would come to rise from the dead. Christ would come to return in glory. If we think about it, the end of earthly life for a believer actually results in the beginning of something else, eternal life. Once we have entered into heaven, there will be no more beginnings and no more ends. Infinite glory, infinite majesty, and infinite joy is what will result. Our God will wipe every tear from our eyes. Death will be no more. We will praise the Lamb Who was sent, the Lamb Who was slain, and the Lamb Who reigns now forever and ever.


