A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Hooray for Epiphany

Sometimes a pastor just needs to bite his tongue. We strive to be Scripturally and theologically correct in what we say and do. But there are some times when the Body of Christ is not in danger of falling into heresy or disbelief that the pastor does not need to fight tooth and nail, drawing a line in the sand, even though every fiber of his being desires to do so. For this pastor that point of frustration is the inclusion of the Magi in church nativity programs. Yes, I know that watching tikes dressed in crowns and fake beards is adorable. Yes, I know that it has become tradition. Yes, I know that they followed the star that heralded Christ's birth. But it still annoys me.



This of course is tongue-in-cheek. But I actually do have a good reason (in my opinion) for it. It's not just that the Magi are mislabeled as "kings" by popular carols, even though Scripture never calls them that, and neither does it say that there were three of them. Their number is assumed and traditionally accepted because there were three gifts listed. It's not even that they likely didn't show up until Jesus was around two years old. No. My reason is probably less meaningful than these to anyone who reads the newsletter article. I dislike Magi in the children's Christmas program because it steals away a major feature from the already overlooked season of Epiphany.

Epiphany is a nearly forgotten festival in the liturgical church year. The festival day is January 6th, but since elements associated with it, such as the Magi, have been reallocated to other places in the church year and because busy schedules deter people from midweek services, it is now typically observed on the following Sunday. This oft ignored festival and season is actually one of the oldest in the church, second only to Easter.

The name, "Epiphany," comes from the Greek word for "manifestation." It is a celebration of the light of the world coming to those who were sitting in darkness. We rejoice that Jesus has manifested as God and man. It was also accompanied with the use of incense in the church, specifically frankincense, which was given to the Christ Child by the Magi. The fragrant smoke symbolizes the prayers of God's people as they ascend to Him.

The earliest Christians referred to this festival as the Theophany: the revelation of God. This is where the Magi or Wise Men come into the tradition because they saw the sign in the heavens pointing them to the Christ, who is God incarnate. But the season of Epiphany is not limited to the visitors from the east. The season of Epiphany can last up to nine weeks, leading up to Lent and includes several points in the life of Jesus where his divinity is revealed.

When Jesus was baptized, the heavens opened, the Spirit descended upon him, and the voice of the Father revealed Jesus as the beloved Son. His disciples beheld his divinity as he changed water into wine with his first miracle at the wedding in Cana, and the disciples believed in him. The season ends with the Transfiguration. Three disciples saw Jesus in his divine splendor and glory.

Christmas announces the arrival of the Messiah. Easter declares his victory. But Epiphany invites us to join the disciples and those who met this Jesus of Nazareth as they begin to realize that there is something more to the child, this boy, this man. God's revelation to them and the witness that they bore has brought us by God's grace to as saving faith is the one who is true God and true man. This Epiphany, may you celebrate the revelation of God manifested in the flesh.


