Note from Pastor

The Augsburg Confession and the Trinity

I have never been a gambling man, but I will take the occasional risk. Essentially, that is what my plans are for the newsletter articles. Knowing that we just finished a series that examined the Ten Commandments, I am taking a risk and hoping that you will perhaps stick with me as we jump into another set of installments on another topic. My intention is to briefly address each of the Articles from the Augsburg Confession. (This is also a sly attempt to have people read the Confession)

But first, a bit of historical context... The Reformation was more than a disagreement about theology. It called into question the authority and practices of the Roman Church, which was so entangled in the religious, social, and political life of Western Society, that the fractured unity of the Church also threatened to unravel the tenuous hold of the Holy Roman Empire as a whole, which already was plagued with infighting within its borders and the attacks of Islamic forces from outside. Attempting to restore unity, Emperor Charles V permitted Lutheran princes from the Germanic territories to present their religious positions for discussion in a peaceful forum, but it was also pretty clear undertone that Charles was also willing to send troops to force unity. The Augsburg Confession is the summary of the Christian Faith as taught by Scripture and held, even unto death, by Lutherans.

Eager for the opportunity to present what they believe, teach, and confess according to the Word of God, the Lutherans formulated a series of Articles that were composed of an affirmative statement of what they believe and clarified it against other teachings that they disavow. As any good confession should, they began with a declaration of who God is.

Article I: Of God

Our Churches, with common consent, do teach that the decree of the Council of Nicaea concerning the Unity of the Divine Essence and concerning the Three Persons, is true and to be believed without any doubting; that is to say, there is one Divine Essence which is called and which is God: eternal, without body, without parts, of infinite power, wisdom, and goodness, the Maker and

Preserver of all things, visible and invisible; and yet there are three Persons, of the same essence and power, who also are coeternal, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost. And the term "person" they use as the Fathers have used it, to signify, not a part or quality in another, but that which subsists of itself.

They condemn all heresies which have sprung up against this article, as the Manichaeans, who assumed two principles, one Good and the other Evil: also the Valentinians, Arians, Eunomians, Mohammedans, and all such. They condemn also the Samosatenes, old and new, who, contending that there is but one Person, sophistically and impiously argue that the Word and the Holy Ghost are not distinct Persons, but that "Word" signifies a spoken word, and "Spirit" signifies motion created in things.

This article has a double intention. First, it upholds the Lutheran position that Holy Scripture is the rule and norm of all doctrine and faith. Unlike some other groups that came out of the Reformation, who approach the principle of Scripture Alone as meaning that something must be explicitly stated to in the texts to be authoritative, Lutherans examine the whole counsel of God's Word to also include the mysterious things of God that are clearly taught by Scripture but may not have a direct statement in the text. The First Article confesses the Triune God, who exists in three distinct, but completely equal persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, but who is also one in Divine Essence. While the word "Trinity" does not appear in Holy Scripture, the doctrine of the Trinity is repeatedly confessed throughout its entirety.

This also leads into the second intention within this Article: Lutherans are not introducing any new doctrines to the Christian faith; they merely uphold the Biblical confession of the Church. Agreeing with the Church Fathers and the Council of Nicaea, Lutherans do not throw out the wisdom that has been handed down through the Church. It could be argued that Lutherans cling to it even more fervently because we believe that the Creeds of the Church are simply a summary of Scripture and, therefore, carry the authority of it. Lutherans only separate themselves from the historic teachings and traditions of the Church when there is a clear contradiction between Scripture and tradition. In those situations, God's Word always wins the debate.

After confessing the historic, Scriptural doctrine of the Church concerning the Trinity, the Lutherans also clarify also what they do not believe regarding false beliefs. Some may see this unnecessary and wonder why the Lutherans point out the false teachings of others, but sometimes adding a negative clarification helps to avoid confusion or to silence accusations from opponents who may not want to paint our beliefs in a favorable light. In our day and age, with things like 24 hour news cycles and the joys of social media, being precise in what you believe and what you do not is a good tactic for us to adopt.

This First Article of the Augsburg Confession found no opposition by the Roman Church, who agreed wholeheartedly with it. Additionally, it set the standard by which the Lutherans would present their case for Grace Alone by Faith Alone in Christ Alone according to Scripture Alone.

At our February 13 church council meeting we:

- Reviewed the **financial reports** from the Treasurer and Financial Secretary.
- Received **reports** of the boards and committees.
- Discussed the request from the Early Childhood Ministry Board to **remodel classrooms** 7 and 8, with funding coming from state economic assistance grants which must be used for capital improvements. - Approved \$2,000 for **new mattresses** for the cabin we sponsor at Camp Linn Haven. Members who wish to help with this can make contributions to offset the cost.
- Heard from Wendy White that she will take **Sunday School students to Linn Haven** for a retreat weekend.
- Selected May 21 as the date for our mid-year **congregational meeting**. Further details will follow. As a reminder, we still do not have a Chair for the **Board of Stewardship**. This board assists the members in identifying their God-given gifts and talents, promotes ways they can use their gifts in service to others, and encourages first fruits giving. We hope someone will step up to fill this position or be willing to serve if asked. Please pray about this opportunity to get better acquainted with your fellow members.
