
Confession and Absolution

Based on Philippians 2:1–11


Lord Jesus, search our hearts and minds that we may receive Your Word, share in Your Spirit, and be renewed in our relationships with You and with one another.

Home Devotional: Water and the Gift of Life

"The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters." Psalm 23:1–2

"Jesus answered, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God." John 3:5

Introduction

Water is the most common element in our world, and it circulates throughout Scripture to wash, cleanse, flood, and reshape. Like a potter, your heavenly Father remodels you every day, conforming you more closely to the image of His Son, Jesus Christ. Often, Easter Vigil services include numerous Bible readings with water narratives, including the words about Noah and the flood account with his family and Moses and the parting of the Red Sea with the people of Israel. Luther recounts such water and washing experiences of the people of God and the Church, including those in the Jordan River, in his baptismal flood prayer. It is interesting to also read some of the words from the ancient west Syrian (Turkish) rites on the water of Holy Baptism. They taught the water is similar to a crucible, a cross, where your old mortal nature is dying while you are taking on a new eternal and incorruptible life. God is described as a potter who is constantly making you and shaping you, like wet, moldable clay, into a beautiful object or vase. You, like a moldable pot, have not been fired, but someday you will be.

In Holy Baptism, all your sin is washed away. You are clean, just as Naaman was made clean of his leprosy after washing in the Jordan River (see 2 Kings 5). You are remade and reshaped by water, drowning the old you to be conformed and restored anew every day into the image of Christ. "Thus you see how rich a Christian is, that is, one who has been baptized! Even if he would, he could not lose his salvation, however much he sinned, unless he refused to believe. For no sin can condemn him save unbelief alone." New life in Jesus Christ begins and continues to exist every day within the waters of Holy Baptism. Although the world is uncertain and hopeless, filled with new challenges and trials, the Christian is never uncertain, because Christ is true yesterday, today, and forever. United to Christ, no wave or tempest will blow down or drown the baptized believer in Christ.

Questions (Answers at the End)

- Q1. The "still waters" of Psalm 23 are often an image of peace and serenity for the people of God. Why is that so?
- Q2. If the worldwide flood in the days of Noah was such a deathly tragedy, then why does St. Peter use this account to say that the flood of Baptism is a blessing that "now saves you" (1 Peter 3:21)?
- Q3. The people of God remain afloat above the sin and death of the entire world. Although we are subject to temporal death, we are not subject to eternal death and torment in hell. One way this is illustrated for many congregations is that the worship space where congregants sit is called the nave. Do you know why it is called that?
- Q4. Nicodemus, probably an older man and Jewish leader in the Sanhedrin, was stunned and shocked when Jesus told him that in order to be saved one must be born of the water and the Spirit. Then, he asked Jesus, How can a man be physically reborn in his mother's womb? How would you describe that kind of birth? How is spiritual birth uniquely different than physical birth and yet also the same? Are you born again or born from above?

Conclusion

Holy Baptism is when you were spiritually born and how you are joyfully reborn every day. Since you were grafted into Jesus, the Vine, and into His Church by water and the Word, you live, move, and have your being only in Him (see Acts 17:28). Just as your mother's womb so beautifully protected you in water when God knitted you together (see Psalm 139:13), so now the Holy Spirit protects you in the womb of your new mother, the Holy Church.

Your heavenly Father reshapes and rewashes you every day with baptismal water. By the Holy Spirit, He reshapes your life, molding you like wet clay into the image of His Son, Jesus Christ. Your old Adam is drowned so that a new you is resurrected. This is why Dr. Martin Luther said, "The Old Adam in us should by daily contrition and repentance be drowned and die with all sins and evil desires, and that a new man should daily emerge and arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever." Lent is all about drowning an old you so that a new joyful you arises. Although the "nave" and church is dark now and full of purple—reminding us of Christ's passion, death, and tomb—we will not stay here. We will arise from our tomb on Easter.

Closing

Prayer: Almighty God, You wonderfully made us and wove us beautifully in the water of our mother's womb, giving us physical life. Now, by Your grace and mercy, You have also made the waters of Baptism the way for us to be born again from above, having new spiritual life given by Your Holy Spirit. Help us to joyfully swim in Your baptismal waters each day so that our life and behavior may draw others to desire this eternal life, so that You may be glorified and that others enter the kingdom of Your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord. In His name, we pray. Amen.

Answers

- A1. Like a gentle shepherd who leads lambs to fresh water to drink and to green pastures to lay down, God always sustains, refreshes, and nourishes His people.
- A2. The account of the flood was devastating to all the life of the entire ancient world. All life that was not on board the ark, except for creatures in the water, was extinguished and drowned. The sinful flesh must be drowned often, daily as Luther says in the Small Catechism. The sinful flesh is never dead in the life of the Christian. The waters of your Baptism promise you that every day your sin is drowned with Christ so that you may arise anew with a clean conscience to serve the living God.
- A3. The derivative root for the Latin word nave is where we get our English word navy. Our United States Navy protects our country by sea on ships. When we worship every Lord's Day (Sunday), or at other times, we are recognizing that we are being saved from this sinful world in the ship, or ark, of Christ's Church. Since Jesus Christ suffered death for all sin once for all, we live with that hope. Since sin is put to death in you, you are made alive by the Holy Spirit. By baptismal water, you will be safely brought to God's eternal shore someday, having a clean conscience through Christ's resurrection from the dead.
- A4. Anyone who is baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit is born of the Holy Spirit. Jesus instructed Nicodemus that all people have a fleshly birth but not all people have a spiritual birth. To be spiritually born requires the death and drowning of the sinful flesh. To be born anew, of both water and the Spirit, provides access and entrance into the kingdom of God.
