
#### **Confession and Absolution**


Based on Philippians 2:1–11


P A reading from St. John, the eighth chapter.





# Postlude My Soul Now Magnifies the Lord Johann Pachelbel Home Devotional: Salt Sweetens and Preserves

"I am the light of the world. Whoever follows Me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." John 8:12

#### INTRODUCTION

The contrasting themes of light and darkness are one of the strongest in all of Scripture, beginning at creation when God creates light and then separates light from darkness (see Genesis 1:1–5). Jesus Christ, the Second Person of the Trinity and the Word made flesh (see John 1:1–2), said at creation, "Let there be light" (Genesis 1:3). In the New Testament, Jesus identifies Himself as the light of the world (see John 8:12), and He calls His people the light of the world (see Matthew 5:14). Jesus enlightens all who believe in Him. His light dispels sin and darkness, filling you with so much light and joy that you truly reflect His light to the world.

Although God's Word, first, exposes all my sin (see Hebrews 4:12), it also tells me, second, that in Jesus Christ I am forgiven. As His baptized child, I am empowered to walk as a child of the light (see Ephesians 5:8), reflecting His light to others. When darkness encases people, it presses them down, depresses them, and fills them with little or no hope. Sin loves to lurk in the dark, unexposed places. Jesus indicates that sin exists within all our hearts, where murder, greed, lust, and covetousness lie (see Matthew 15:19–20). However, all it takes is one candle to shatter the darkness and bring light. Jesus transparently and lovingly exposes our darkest deeds so that sin may be identified for what it is, be nailed down, and be honestly confessed. This is what Lent is all about, having your sin openly exposed by the light so that it may be washed away, again and again.

The true Light, who gives light to every man, faced the greatest darkness of betrayal, death, and loneliness on the cross. Completely forsaken by God and rejected by man, He endured death for you. Yet, because He rose from the dead, His cross shines, filling you with warmth and joy every day of life. Candles and lamps were always lit throughout the Old Testament, even placed inside the tabernacle and the Holy Place (see Exodus 37:17). Lamps and light are also mentioned in the Gospels, such as the ten virgins with lamps and oil in Matthew 25. In the Revelation to John, the seven lampstands correlate with the seven churches (see chapters 1–3). Often in our sanctuaries, naves, and chancels, candles are numerous—often found in sevenfold lampstands, along with two

sacramental candles on the altar (identifying the two natures of Christ and His body and blood given in the Sacrament of the Altar). Additionally, a paschal candle can be found in many congregations and is used at Baptisms and for the season of Lent and Easter. The origins of the paschal candle date back to the fourth century.

#### Questions (Answers at the End)

- Q1. Is light a natural phenomena in our world that has always existed?
- Q2. Why does Jesus call Himself the light of the world? Doesn't that seem to be an arrogant statement to many today who believe that light and truth exist in many places?
- Q3. When we live in the darkness of our sinful thoughts and world, our perspective on life often looks depressing and oppressing. It even dismays us when more people seem to reject the truth and the light of Christ. How do we best cope with such feelings?
- Q4. Since St. Paul calls Christians "children of the light" (see Ephesians 5:1–2, 8–14), what does that mean for us as the baptized children of God? How do we remain loving and compassionate and also speak the truth about sin and death with others?
- Q5. Why is it useful to light candles in the church? Further, when are candles lit on the altar? Why do we call the altar candles sacramental lights?

#### Conclusion

Lent exposes our old life in order to bury it in Christ's tomb. It is buried there o that we may be joyful and arise with Him again in the light of His resurrection. Jesus Christ is the true light, who gives light to everyone. Although His life was extinguished on the cross amid total darkness, Jesus bore the full weight of this world's sin and darkness in order to bring light to us and all the world. That's why the cross always brightly reflects joy, love, and mercy—because Jesus suffered there to bring light and love. From His cross now shines a new Gospel beam! Even though your sins are like scarlet, they are now as white as snow (see Isaiah 1:18). The Gospel light pierces through your darkest and most depressive thoughts and fills you with peace and joy. The light of Jesus shines like the sun and like the moon, you reflect His light to others. Every day, Christ's light continues to shine through you and your words so receive Christ's light again!

#### Closing

Prayer: Jesus Christ, the light of the world, in Your light, we see light. We have no light in this world without Your power and grace. Expose the darkness of sin that lies within our hearts and minds so that we might not die but rather rise with new life and joy, knowing that You died and rose to forgive all our sin and give us eternal life. As Your baptized and enlightened children, let our lives reflect Your light and love wherever we go so that those who are sitting in darkness may know that there is light and salvation in You alone. In Your precious name, we pray. Amen.

#### **Answers**

- A1. No, absolutely not. During creation's first day, God is the One who brought light out of darkness, and then He separated the two. He said, "Let there be light" (Genesis 1:3)! Light is not a natural phenomenon in this world. God brought it forth, ex nihilo ("out of nothing"), and His light is always pure and good. God also made the greatest object of light for our world to be the sun on day four of creation.
- A2. Jesus, the Creator of the world (John 1:1), who called light out of darkness, calls Himself the light of the world. Whoever listens to His Word and follows Him is no longer in the dark. To have Jesus as your light is to have it all, including eternal life. Today, many in our world think that truth and light are found in numerous places and even within other religions. However, they are only found in Jesus; outside of Him, everything is darkness (John 1:4–5).
- A3. Psalm 27, a psalm of David, is so full of comfort, strength, and peace: "The LORD is my light and my salvation" (v. 1). Thankfully, God shields us from all harm and lifts us high upon a rock (v. 5). If I cry aloud in pain or travail, He is open to hear my voice (v. 7). The Psalms are a great resource for wisdom, comfort, and prayer. When we do not know how or what to pray, we can read/pray such psalms as prayers, knowing that God hears us when we pray back to Him what He has already said to us.
- A4. At one time, without God and new life in Christ, our life was dark and lifeless. But since Christ loved you and gave Himself as an offering for sin on the cross, all your sin is washed away. Now baptized into Christ by His light, you are now light in the world (see Matthew 5:14). As children of the light, we do not participate in the deeds of darkness; rather, we expose them. The fruit of the Spirit is kindness, gentleness, and self-control (see Galatians 5:22–23). When we exhibit this to others and lovingly share with them the truth, we pray that the Holy Spirit fills them with new light and understanding so that they receive it and do not reject it.
- A5. Candles and lamps were always lit throughout the Old Testament, even placed inside the tabernacle, the Holy Place (see Exodus 37:17), and later the temple. Lamps and light are also mentioned in the Gospels, such as the ten virgins with lamps and oil in Matthew 25. In the Revelation to John, the seven lampstands correlate with the seven churches (see chapters 1–3). Often in our sanctuaries, naves, and chancels, candles are numerous—often found in sevenfold lampstands, along with two sacramental candles on the altar. The two sacramental candles are lit on the altar only when Holy Communion is served, and these two candles symbolize Jesus and His two natures, true God and true man. Additionally, an even larger paschal candle is used in many congregations and lit at Baptisms. It may have a cross on it and five nails, representing the wounds of Christ. The paschal candle is present during the entire season of Easter and extinguished on Ascension Day. The origins of its use date back to the fourth century.
