
Confession and Absolution


Based on Philippians 2:1–11



Old Testament Reading

Exodus 16:2-5, 11-18

P A reading from Exodus, the sixteenth chapter.

²And the whole congregation of the people of Israel grumbled against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness, ³ and the people of Israel said to them, "Would that we had died by the hand of the LORD in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the meat pots and ate bread to the full, for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger."

⁴Then the LORD said to Moses, "Behold, I am about to rain bread from heaven for you, and the people shall go out and gather a day's portion every day, that I may test them, whether they will walk in my law or not. 5On the sixth day, when they prepare what they bring in, it will be twice as much as they gather daily." 11And the LORD said to Moses, 12"I have heard the grumbling of the people of Israel. Say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall be filled with bread. Then you shall know that I am the LORD your God."

¹³In the evening quail came up and covered the camp, and in the morning dew lay around the camp. ¹⁴And when the dew had gone up, there was on the face of the wilderness a fine, flake-like thing, fine as frost on the ground. ¹⁵When the people of Israel saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" 




And let my cry come to You.

- All glory, honor, and praise be to You, with the Father and the Son, one God, now and forever. Amen.


Collect for Peace and Luther's Evening Prayer

Home Devotional: Bread of Life

"I am the bread of life; whoever comes to Me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in Me shall never thirst." John 6:35

Introduction

Bread is one of the most common food staples of life. It is also, perhaps, one of the most familiar physical elements in the Bible, and it is still used often in the Church today. Even though some people are allergic to processed flour, various whole grains and seed breads are still crucial to good nutrition. When the Israelites were in Egypt and about to depart, Moses instructed them to make unleavened bread (see Exodus 12). The manna in the desert, which God gave to the people of Israel, sustained them on their way to the Promised Land (see Exodus 16). God made manna rain down from heaven every day for the people to eat while they were in the wilderness. God also established the feast of unleavened bread. Soon, the bread of the Presence was to be set in the tabernacle and Holy Place by the priests (see Exodus 25:30).

In the New Testament, Jesus fed the five thousand (see Luke 9:10–17), taught us to pray for daily bread (see Luke 11:2–4), and called Himself the "bread of life" (John 6:35). In fact, His bread of life teaching (see John 6) became one of His most contentious discourses, because many left Him (see v. 66) when He addressed eating His flesh and drinking His blood (see v. 54). When Jesus instituted His Supper, He used bread and wine. Today, we use these elements in every service of Holy Communion. The Lord's Supper remains a contentious topic, a crucible, for many within Christendom who do not believe, or renounce, Christ's real bodily presence in the Meal.

Each of us goes through many stages of maturity, like grains of wheat. Lent is a beautiful season to grow again, to be ground like wheat. Just as many grains grow, die, and are ground up to make one beautiful loaf of bread, so do we as the Church. Each day we are sifted and milled through repentance to become more like Christ. Until our journey of this life ends, we only grow when our old sinful nature is ground up and crucified so that a new man, like a new loaf, rises in Christ. Like chaff, which clings to wheat, our sinful nature is burned with Christ in His death and buried in His tomb so that only pure wheat, our new nature, remains. St. Augustine once said to his people, "Be what you see, receive what you are." Each of us will go through the threshing floor of suffering, pain, and challenge in life. None of us can avoid it. However, by God's Word and Supper, the Holy Spirit continues His good work in you, separating the sinful chaff of your old man, in order to make you into a new loaf, united with all the Body of Christ, the Church. To partake of Jesus, the bread of life, makes each of us bread and all who partake of Jesus become one whole loaf in the Church as well. The most essential thing in life is not your daily bread but the bread of life, Jesus Christ.

Questions (Answers at the End)

- Q1. What did God regularly provide to feed the people of God, Israel, after He delivered them from Egypt and brought them through the Red Sea? Read Exodus 16:1–2, 11–18.
- Q2. In 1 Corinthians 10:1–4, 11–17, St. Paul makes a spiritual application to the physical eating and drinking in the wilderness by the people of God. Who does St. Paul say was leading them even at that time (which person of the Trinity)?

- Q3. The Jews so often appealed to the greatness of their father Abraham (see John 8:39–47) and Moses (see John 6:32–37) but failed to see that Jesus was the greater Moses, the greatest prophet. Are people still blind to who Jesus really is, the only source of life? If so, what can we do about that?
- Q4. God's Word is food for the soul. That is why it is called a Means of Grace, a channel through which forgiveness flows into you. How does King David so beautifully describe God's Word in Psalm 19:11–17?

Conclusion

Like the Israelites of old, we journey every day in the wilderness of this life. We live in the midst of this sinful world under the heat of sin and death bearing down on us each day. It is just as the desert heat beat down on the Israelites. We are waiting for a promised land, not Canaan, but the promised land of heaven. No matter how crazy or bad life may be in the wilderness of this world, you are not wondering "Where can I find help?" or "How can I be sustained?" Your true help is found in this life whenever Christ breaks open His Word for you to eat, meditate upon, hear, and inwardly digest, and when He offers you the holy food of His body and blood at His Altar. In order to enter the promised land of heaven, we must be fed in the way God chooses to feed us, and that is always through His precious Word and Sacraments.

Closing

Prayer: Lord Jesus Christ, You are the bread of life. You are the gift of the heavenly Father to this entire world, and through You we live, move, and have our being. You are the sustainer of all life and the head of all things in heaven and earth, now and forever. Feed us now with the bread of life so that we never hunger or thirst. Just as You sustained the Israelites in the wilderness every morning with manna until they reached the Promised Land, so give us this day our daily bread and give us Yourself as the bread of life often in Word and Sacrament so that our faith never wanders nor wants. We pray all these things in Your holy name. Amen.

Answers

- A1. God rained down bread from heaven, manna, every day to feed His people, Israel. He loves all people and sustains them day after day, both the evil and the good (see Matthew 5:45). In the evening, God even provided meat for Israel to eat when He brought them quail. He provided food for them every day. They only collected what they needed for that day. He still feeds us every day, as Martin Luther's meal prayer emphasizes (see Psalm 145:15–16).
- A2. All the people of Israel ate the same food, manna, and drank from the same spiritual Rock, which was Christ. The Church, like Israel of old, still eats of the same spiritual bread at Holy Communion and receives Christ's true body and blood. We still receive our daily bread (every need of the body) from God, but the most essential bread for life is the bread of life, Jesus Christ, whom we receive by faith often—in the hearing of His forgiving Word and the receiving of His nourishing Supper.
- A3. Jesus is far greater than Abraham, who rejoiced at seeing Jesus' day (see John 8:56). Jesus is also far greater than Moses, who did not even provide the manna for the people to eat; it was God who did. Jesus, likewise, is the bread of life, satisfying and feeding every hungry and longing soul. No one who comes to Him ever lacks anything. He will never cast any child away. He always welcomes longing souls to take of Him and eat and live forever. We can assure anyone we know and see that God has made them and has a purpose for their life. Jesus is the way, the truth, the life, and the bread of life (see John 14:6; 6:35). Outside of Him, there is no nourishment or peace.
- A4. This wonderful psalm highlights God's creation and His Word. Just as God created the world and all things with His voice, so His voice still goes forth with His Word. It is perfect, sure, right, pure, and true (see vv. 7–9). God's Word never fails and always satisfies. His Word is sweeter than honey (see v. 10). His Word is food for the soul. Jesus is the manna of life now and forever.
