Note from Pastor

Why State the Obvious?

The Third Article of the Augsburg confession affirms:

Also they [our Churches] teach that the Word, that is, the Son of God, did assume the human nature in the womb of the blessed Virgin Mary, so that there are two natures, the divine and the human, inseparably enjoined in one Person, one Christ, true God and true man, who was born of the Virgin Mary, truly suffered, was crucified, dead, and buried, that He might reconcile the Father unto us, and be a sacrifice, not only for original guilt, but also for all actual sins of men.

He also descended into hell, and truly rose again the third day; afterward He ascended into heaven that He might sit on the right hand of the Father, and forever reign and have dominion over all creatures, and sanctify them that believe in Him, by sending the Holy Ghost into their hearts, to rule, comfort, and quicken them, and to defend them against the devil and the power of sin.

The same Christ shall openly come again to judge the quick and the dead, etc., according to the Apostles' Creed.

If you are wondering why this even needs to be confessed, since it is the most basic, straight-forward repetition of the Apostles' Creed, then say a prayer of thanksgiving for the faithful catechist who instructed you. When the early Lutherans confessed

this in the Augsburg Confession, this was one of few places where Lutherans and Rome were in absolutely complete agreement. So then why state it? This article serves as a litmus test to prove the orthodoxy of the Lutheran confession. They were not teaching anything novel or strange. They were not some heretical sect but faithful Christians, who held tightly to the clear word of Scripture and the Apostolic teachings. As surprising as it may seem, these foundational elements of our Christian faith that confess the person, nature and work of Jesus Christ have been the source of great controversy throughout the history of Christianity.

Most heresies either deny or overemphasize some Scriptural component of who Jesus is. The Gnostics, who were influenced by Greek philosophy, rejected of the material world as evil, and therefore, they denied the humanity of Jesus. In their estimation, a perfect God could not have any association with the material world or soil himself with a physical form. The Arian heresy took an opposite approach. In order to preserve the majestic sovereignty of the Father, the Arians, while still believing that Jesus the Son of God, denied his full divinity and his equality with the Father. Every facet of the creedal confession has been involved in controversy at some historical point. Strange teachings called into question whether Mary is the mother of God (theotokos), whether Jesus actually died on the cross, whether he was a real person or a mythological symbol, and the list goes on and on. This is not even to mention the soteriological controversies that debate the who, what, where, when, why, and how of salvation.

The Third Article of the Augsburg Confession exists to root Lutheranism deep into the bedrock of the clear, historic, Apostolic Christian faith, as it is found in the unchanging Word of God from Holy Scripture. It is the faith that has held fast to the truth handed down from generation to generation and weathered the storm of controversy and the bombardment of heresies. We know our Savior, and we will confess him as our incarnate Lord and God though threatened by persecution and schism. While the temptation arises to gloss over this article because it is so basic, historically the enemies of the Church have struck hardest to undermine our confession of Jesus Christ, and the devil, the world, and our sinful flesh continue the assault.

In our post-modern, post-truth era, all of the long-settled heresies spring up new again. Shockingly, they are now being received as a normal expression of "a" Christian faith. We even have Christian Atheists; as though that makes any sense whatsoever. We may scoff at these things, but the populous is so biblically ignorant,

and so intrigued by fanciful tales of hidden or suppressed truths, that the most obvious and contradictory heresies are championed. But none are so dangerous as the ones we create for ourselves. We fabricate our own version of Jesus to suit our preferences. Suddenly the Jesus we worship in our hearts, who tells us that the sins we personally struggle with are actually not so bad, looks very little like the biblical image of Christ, who was so grieved by mankind's sin, that he chose the humiliation of the incarnation and the ransom price of his own suffering and death to free us from those sins we fail to bat-an-eyelash over.

Therefore, confessing the fundamental elements of Scripture, such as the Third Article of the Augsburg Confession and the Creeds, becomes even more important and relevant to our faith and worship as it articulates the basic Scriptural tenets, unites the universal Church in doctrine, guards against heresy, and restrains our own sinful natures that crave the idols we fashion for ourselves rather than the true Christ. To those who elevate the Word of God as the true rule and norm, to which everything else must conform, this may feel like stating the obvious, but in a fallen world that perpetually rebels and wanders its own way, a strong confession anchors us in the truth of God's Word.

God had commanded the Israelites to commit the doctrines of the faith to their memories and hearts. He repeatedly instructed this, saying: "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates" (Deut. 6:4-9). Young and old were commanded to never cease renewing their confession of the doctrines they have received, that they may remain steadfast in the face of temptation and falsehood. We also commit them to our hearts, minds, and lips that we may continue to walk in the truth and to equip the next generation for the battles they will face.

We must keep stating the obvious, so that it remains obvious.

BIBLE PASSAGE — "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit.
