A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

What and Where Is the Church?

I don't know if it is just a byproduct of our American consumer culture, but there sure seems to be an overabundance of Church shopping. The reasons for why someone joins or leaves a congregation is baffling to me. You can find any flavor of church you want. Do you prefer traditional or contemporary? Screens or hymnals? Male only clergy or something more diverse? Reverent or casual? But even these are not the main reasons why someone chooses one church or another. Instead, it boils down to what programs are available for kids and youth even though their kids will never actually participate anyway. How's the parking? Is the seating comfortable? Will they let me believe as I want to believe or are they religious and preachy? Knowing that people are engaged in this thought process, many churches have become commercialized as they market themselves according to cultural opinions rather than Biblical principles, some to the point that many may question whether or not they are even "church" anymore.

The question of what constitutes the church was of great importance to the Lutheran reformers. Their adversaries made the claim that opponents to the traditions, rites, and hierarchy of the Roman Church, to whom all expected to bend the knee even above Scripture, could not be considered a valid "church." Turning to Scripture, especially as demonstrated in the book of Acts, the Lutherans, who also highly valued the traditions and structure that had been handed down through the church, saw that the Church is not defined by the practices instituted by men; it is defined by faithful preaching of Christ crucified and the administration of the Sacraments according to Christ's institution, which bestow the forgiveness of sins and unity with Christ to the believer.

This body of believers are united as one as the body of Christ. Differences in form and function exist between the members of the body, and yet they are still all the same body. It is Christ who gives them this unity, for as they are joined to him, they also become joined to one another through him. Speaking to this unity of the Church, the Lutherans wrote in Article VII of the Augsburg Confession:

Also [Lutheran Churches] teach that one holy Church is to continue forever. The Church is the congregation of saints, in which the Gospel is rightly taught and the Sacraments are rightly administered.

And to the true unity of the Church it is enough to agree concerning the doctrine of the Gospel and the administration of the Sacraments. Nor is it necessary that human traditions, that is, rites or ceremonies, instituted by men, should be everywhere alike. As Paul says: One faith, one Baptism, one God and Father of all, etc. Eph. 4:5-6.

As the Lutherans look to Scripture and the foundation of the Church that Christ and his Apostles established, it became readily clear that it is not the buildings, rites, and officials that reveal the presence of the Church. The Church exists where Christ is present—not in a nominal sense because there are many false versions of the Christ than man has constructed for himself—Christ is present where that which he has said are extension of himself are present: His Word and Sacraments.

When we hear the Word rightly preached, letting Scripture speak for itself and submitting to its authority, it is Christ's own voice that we are hearing. Jesus is the Word of God manifested in the flesh, and where two or three are gathered in his name (meaning that they truly believe his gospel and trust in him for salvation) Christ has promised to be there in the midst of them. Where Christ is; there also is his Church. And if his Word is truly taught, received, and believed, then it should also be expected that the other means by which he, himself, as established to deliver his grace (Baptism and Communion) would also be administered there, according to Christ's institution and for the comfort of forgiveness and new life in Christ.

The efficacy of Christ's Word and sacramental gifts hold their authority because they belong to Christ, and he gives them to us that we may have life and forgiveness in his name. Even if hypocrites surround these things, or worse, if the one entrusted to handle the things of God is a wicked man, this does not invalidate that which belongs to Jesus. Does a scandalously sinful life disqualify someone from holding the preaching office? Yes! But that man's sin does not make void the Word that was preached, the baptisms that washed, or the body and blood that forgave if they were rightly done in accord with the command and institution of Christ, since those things belong to Jesus and his Bride, not to the man who holds the office as a steward.

No congregation or pastor is perfect. The Church is full of sinners. The fact that they are sinners is why they are in the Church. For it is only through the Church, where Christ's Word is preached to create and sustain faith, where baptism gives unity with Christ and his Body, and where Jesus visits his people to forgive and strengthen them with the fruits of His cross, that those who know and repent of their sinful wretchedness receive God's gracious mercy and absolution for the sake of His Son. If these things are present, then so is the Church of Jesus Christ, even if hypocrites in her midst abound. If these things are not present, then neither is the Church, even though friendly and well-intentioned people fill the halls.

What should someone look for in a church? Things such as programs, activities, and conveniences are fine things to consider when comparing apples to apples, but they are superficial and meaningless unless the congregation of the saints in a particular place is faithful in Word and Sacrament. Some churches may have pastors with rockstar charisma, but what good is that if he is not preaching the unadulterated word of Christ? There may be opportunities galore to do exciting things, but if baptism is withheld from some and the Lord's Supper is treated as merely symbolic bread and wine instead of Christ's very body and

blood that has actual and real authority to forgive sins, then all those activities are nothing more than a social club. This is not an excuse to validate lazy or disengaged pastors, but a call to reassess how we judge a good church from a poor one. A godly man who rightly handles the Word of God and the sacramental mysteries entrusted to his care does more good than the most dynamic vision casting leader. Likewise, a congregation that diligently adheres to God's word as they daily serve God and their neighbor with humble persistence is greater than any flavor-of-the-week attention grabber.

Hopping from congregation to congregation is of no benefit to anyone; rather it disrupts the unity of Christ's body. But if you must change congregations, how can you spot a good church? A good one is where God's people hear the Gospel rightly taught and where the Sacraments are rightly administered. Everything else is window-dressing. If the church you attend is weak in the foundations, fight to make it stronger. If the church you attend is doing something other than what Christ has established, flee! But before you do so, first make sure by careful study of God's Word that you are not the one in error, and then earnestly seek, with all respectfulness and love, to return the erring to faithfulness. If nothing else, you may rescue some from deception.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Members of Mt. Pisgah,

Because we didn't have any new business to cover, the July church council meeting was cancelled and there was no president's article in the August View. We are now back on track and have information to share with all of you.

At our August 14 church council meeting we:

- Reviewed the **financial reports** from the Treasurer and Financial Secretary.
- Approved investment of \$25,000 in a LCEF low-interest account, with the stipulation
 that it not be done until current investments have matured and that early withdrawal will
 not result in loss of principal. The LCEF account is designed to offer low-interest loans to
 pastors and other church workers who are trying to buy a house in this high mortgage
 interest environment.
- Received **reports** of the boards and committees.
- Learned that the **remodeling in the preschool** has been completed. The current need at the school is for **teachers**. There are 52 children enrolled and 62 on the waiting list! We could take some of these if we could secure teachers.
- Heard that the **VBS**, which ran July 10–14, had daily attendance between 20 and 24. Many thanks to the volunteers who helped these children learn about God's love and the gift of life.
- Had a report from Pastor about the **LCMS convention** held in Milwaukee. Pastor Jon was our circuit pastoral delegate.
- Learned that the Mission Committee had approved the **proposed budget for the Lutheran School in Laotchikit** and would support **three additional schools** with \$500 per month for the school year, with the stipulation that they send their payroll reports quarterly. Our

- **new seminary student** is Jacob Moede. He and his wife are expecting a baby girl and we will be sending them hand-made gifts, as well as a check to cover some of their needs.
- Received reports on the **Missions of the Month**: The Hope Center (June) received \$190 and The Veterans Healing Farm (July) received \$784. The August MOM was Safelight's Child Advocacy Center. We gave Patchwork Foster Center five highchairs for foster families and they will be September's MOM, including an ingathering of socks, underwear, and diapers.
- Heard that approximately 65 people attended the **Friendship Sunday** potluck and 11 poke bags for 16 members were distributed.
- Saw that the **refurbished table** is back in the narthex, thanks to Bob Morin with help from Paul Mincer. **Security cameras** have arrived and are awaiting installation. There is a new **ice machine**, as the old one could no longer be repaired.
- Learned that the repaying has been completed and that **handicap parking area** can now be used. The **outdoor electronic sign** sustained storm damage and needs to have parts replaced.

Witness is the purpose of your everyday life. The Every One His Witness® Lutheran evangelism program considers your place as a witness of Christ within your daily context. It connects sound doctrine with practical ways to share the faith with those whom God has placed alongside you in your everyday life.



It starts with the core module. Every

One His Witness® uses the 'LASSIE' approach to witnessing, which is a relational, contextual approach that teaches you to share the Good News of Jesus Christ as you Listen, Ask, Seek, Share, Invite and Encourage people in your life who are not yet part of the church.

Learn to witness in specific contexts.

After the core module workshop, register online at everyonehiswitness.org to gain access to the video-based context modules. These modules pick up where the core module left off, teaching you how to witness in

specific contexts. If the congregation wants to work on this together, we certainly can pick out some that apply to our personal situations and extend out the program to include the specific applications.



Lutheran Seminary in Laotchikit Attracts International Students

A few years ago, a dedicated gift was given to the Haiti Mission fund to support a Lutheran Seminary at the Lutheran Church in Laotchikit, Haiti. As COVID hit, and gangsters began controlling many of the highways coming in and out of Port-au-Prince, Pastor Walta took the seminary to virtual classes.

This effort was accomplished through another dedicated gift to help support technology at the church and school in Laotchikit. As you may know, there is no electricity in Laotchikit. To accomplish this goal, Pastor Walta purchased big screen monitors, a computer and a

generator. His intent was to allow students in the south-west part of Haiti to attend theology classes and to attract professors who were located away from Laotchikit. With the computer system and internet through cell phones, professors are able to teach the seminary classes. Pastor Walta solicits pastors as professors in the United States, Haiti, and Canada to teach the theology classes each Saturday morning for the adult students.

One of the pastors who teaches is Pastor Sommers in Canada. This is the same pastor who helped us find Luther's Small Catechisms in French about 10 years ago. During the time the catechisms were in transit, we prayed for the safe passage of the ten mail bags from Paris that contained the precious books until they arrived in Port-au-Prince weeks later.

Today, what started out as theological training for a dozen teachers and lay leaders of the preaching stations, has become an international Lutheran seminary. Using the internet connection, Pastor Sommers and Pastor Walta connected seminary students who understand French and English from around the world into these seminary classes. The adult-students attend class each Saturday in person in Laotchikit and online from around the world. Currently, there are 92 students attending seminary classes from Laotchikit, Haiti, Rwanda, Burundi, Canada, Dominican Republic, Senegal, Brooklyn, New York and France. Wow!

To God be the Glory. He takes our meager efforts and magnifies them with His supernatural power and we on the Mission Committee get to watch the miracles unfold!
