Our Father in heaven, Reveal who you are. Set the world right; Do what's best — as above, so below. – Matthew 6:9-10 (The Message)

Dear Church,

Peace be with you. On October 23rd one of our saints Eugene Peterson returned home to the Lord. Mr. Peterson was a professor of spiritual theology, a Presbyterian pastor in Maryland and the author of the bible translation best known as The Message, the Bible in contemporary language. As we live out our lives in the 21st century, we should not forget about our spiritual ancestors.

November 1st there is a religious day of remembrance known as All Saints Day. It is a day for us to remember the Saints that have passed on and recall their gifts to the church, sacrifices and what a testament to the Gospel their very lives have been. We all have been influenced and inspired by the everyday Saints in our lives, those who have gone before us and those who remain with us. Eugene Peterson is no exception.

God gives us our mission in a straight forward text in Matthew 28:19-20 (look it up if you can't immediately recite what it is) and this should remain central in our lives as disciples who follow Jesus Christ. God gives us the what, that is known as The Great Commission. The how is up to us and open for interpretation as we minister to an ever changing world.

We come to church once a week for about an hour. The other six days we are bombarded with messages ranging from what is wrong with us and what you can buy to fix it; to who we should be afraid of this week and a whole lot of mess in-between. As disciples we are to hold on to our spiritual anchor and guide Jesus and the teachings found in our holy scriptures. If you don't know how you are supposed to be living, how can you be a faithful disciple and consequently share that good news with a troubled world? The genius of Eugene Peterson's, The Message is not so much technical as far as translating goes. But it faithfully communicates the spirit of what Jesus came to teach us. Take a look at these translations side by side:

Matthew 5:13 NRSV- "You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot."

Matthew 5:13 The Message- "Let me tell you why you are here. You're here to be salt-seasoning that brings out the God flavors of this earth. If you lose your saltiness, how will people taste godliness? You've lost your usefulness and will end up in the garbage."

Different translations speak to different people. I have found that for sharing the good news in our contemporary context, The Message, faithfully communicates the Kingdom of Heaven to the world. Read The Message translation, I highly recommend it, you can find a copy at church.

A GREENTHANKSGIVING FOOD FOR THOUGHT

“Not long ago we took for granted that food was produced and shared in a local community. Since World War II, the U.S. has lost more than 4 million family farms. Today, as corporate agricultural conglomerates have expanded, food travels 25% farther than it did in 1980, moving between 1,500 to 2,500 miles before it reaches your table. Mass production of food has led to a greater disconnect with the land that grows our food and the communities that harvest it. Mass production of food has also led to the use of monoculture (single crop agriculture), chemical fertilizers and pesticides, non-medicinal antibiotics in animal farming, and the use of fossil fuels for food production and transport.” (Pp. 2-3, “Where Two or More Are Gathered,, Eco-Justice as Community”, Presby. Earth Day Resources.)

With the new report that has recently come out about climate change, this may be a great time to plan a “Green Thanksgiving! Here are some ideas:

1. Celebrate local/organic food as much as you can by buying a locally produced, organic turkey that is humanely treated and free from chemicals & hormones. Favor locally grown fruits & veggies (awhile back, Byerly's sold apple pie that was made with local Macintosh apples & local flour), cheese, etc. (If your turkey can't be organic at least go local.)
2. Your meal can be less expensive so you can afford an organic turkey if you have a BRING YOUR OWN DISH celebration. Tell your guests you are trying to highlight local/organic if they can manage it and let them help with side dishes, desserts, etc.
3. Make it a NO WASTE/LOW WASTE event. Plan to buy foods with as little packaging as possible, RECYCLE, & COMPOST. Use washable dishes (or compostable ones NOT throwaways<), cups & utensils.
4. Use natural decorations.
