Riz's Reflections...

Let the field be joyful, and all that is therein: then shall all the trees of the wood rejoice. – Psalm 96:12

Dear Church,

Peace be with you. This month we celebrate Earth Day, and in today's rapidly urbanizing world, 56% of the global population resides in cities where the call for environmental stewardship grows ever louder. Our cities, brimming with life and activity, are also the source of 70% of the world's emissions. As faithful stewards, we are tasked with not just preserving but also enhancing the quality of life for all of God's creation. This challenge is intricately linked to our handling of a prevalent yet problematic material: plastic.

Since its inception in 1907, plastic has infiltrated every aspect of our lives. From food packaging to technological devices, its omnipresence is undeniable. Alarming statistics reveal that in 2019 alone, 460 million tons of plastic were produced globally. Unfortunately, this convenience comes at a high cost. Plastic pollution is now a critical environmental

threat, with single-use plastics being a major culprit. They are found cluttering landfills, polluting water sources, and even entering our bodies and those of other living creatures.

The impact of plastic pollution extends beyond mere aesthetics. It disrupts natural habitats, hinders ecosystem adaptability to climate change, and compromises human health and livelihoods. Alarmingly, the average adult consumes microplastic particles equivalent to one credit card per week, and these particles have been linked to serious health issues. The chemicals in these plastics have been linked to reproductive harm and obesity, organ problems. and developmental delays in children.

Cigarette butts (whose filters contain tiny plastic fibers), food wrappers, plastic bottles, plastic bottle caps, plastic grocery bags, plastic straws and plastic stirrers are among the most common pollutants. These plastics can take anywhere from 20 to 1000 years to decompose, depending on the material's structure and environmental factors such as sunlight exposure.

Current Stewardship chair, Bruce Nelson, has retired from this position. We thank him for leading us through a successful stewardship year. A replacement is needed.

Staffing changes--Justin Combs has resigned as Custodian, but continues as Communications Collaborator; Logan Combs has assumed the Custodian role in addition to his role as Music Director, giving him full-time status at 40 hours/week.

Sprinkler bids of \$71,000; \$38,000; and \$36,000 have been received.

A draft lease for preschool space has been delivered. Awaiting Building and Grounds feedback.

From the Church Reformation Task Force--Town Hall surveys are still being compiled. Next Town Hall scheduled for May 19, 2024. Partnering conversations with other churches include: a joint task force with Falcon Heights UCC that has meetings scheduled for March 23, 2024 and either April 6 or 7, 2024; conversations planned after Easter with Presbyterian Church of the Way. CRTF will draft a strategic plan consisting of two main parts—a plan for the building and a plan for the congregation.
