Session Notes

OPC Session met on Tuesday, May 16, 2023.

- The Session approved a motion to accept the resignation of membership of Catherine and John Sickafoose.
- Treasurer's Report:
 - ♦ OPC has been registered with Corporation Commission for 2023.
 - ♦ A Preliminary Budget for next year has been emailed to Elders.
 - ♦ April Financial Report:
 - * Member Giving \$269,800 (63%)
 - * Total Income \$363,128 (68.9%)
 - Total Expenses \$324,750 (60.8%)
 - * Net Income + \$38,378
- Report on the May 6 Presbytery Meeting.
 - ♦ The Presbytery affirmed a candidate to be ordained with call in Douglas.
 - Update was given about Montlure.
 - Received information that there are currently 700 openings for pastors in PC/USA and only 500 pastors seeking positions.
- Dennis Daniel expressed thanks to Becky Cederquist for her work as Deacon.
- The Session is revisiting the requirements for giving Communion to shut-ins. Rev. Saylor clarifying who can perform communion in this setting.
- Special Presbytery Meeting on May 23, to dismiss Valley Presbyterian from the Presbytery. Commissioners appointed for this Zoom meeting: Gene Nix, Bob Wells, Phebe Packer.
- The Session approved a motion from the Worship Committee to replace the electrical cable on the chancel floor. The estimated cost is \$1500.
- Joseph Lavi gave the following report for the African Fellowship:
 - ♦ Baptism planned in July for 6 people.
 - ♦ Concerned to start children's ministry. Weekly Sunday school for OAF is 12:30 − 1:30.
 - ♦ 3 new families from Zimbabwe and Tanzania. Need membership class. Requests Session participation.
 - Leadership ready to work together with OPC.
- Session approved two motions from the Personnel Committee:
 - To hire an Interim Office Manager until the permanent position can be filled. The Interim Office Manager will be part-time with hours of Tuesday − Friday 10 am − 4 pm.
 - ♦ To approve an updated job description for the Music Director.
- Session requested that Facilities examine possibilities for new outside signage for the 10th Street sign in front of the church. The current sign is outdated and cannot be changed.
- A review of church records by the Presbytery will take place on June 10, 2023, at OPC.
- The next Session Meeting will be on June 27 at 6:30 pm by Zoom meeting and/or in person in Room 11.

The **Benefit Rummage "Sale"** (Name Your Price) on April 22 brought in more than \$3000, exceeding everyone's expectations. Jeanne Matt, sale co-chair, commented This was first time in all the decades I have

been at Orangewood that the Presbyterian Women had a fund raiser. Many folks, young and old, male and female, contributed to the sale's success, both on the day of sale and in the days leading up to it, receiving, sorting, setting up, staging, taking cash/checks, assisting shoppers, wrapping, boxing up, taking down, etc. And of course, this outcome would not have been realized if not for all the good stuff our members and friends donated—a win-win at both ends, your home and Page Hall. OPC Spring 2023 Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

In response to questions frequently asked in our congregation, Session offers the following answers. Session encourages all members to raise questions and concerns by calling or emailing Session members. A list of Session members and their contact information is available online by request and in printed form in the narthex.

Q: Is the traditional worship service as we know it going away?

A: Session plans to keep our traditional worship with no plans to lose the style of worship so many of our long-time members count on as the foundation of their week.

Q: What is the plan for the Orangewood African Fellowship service? Will we be merging our worship?

A: Session does not plan to combine the OAF and traditional services. The OAF bilingual service is important for the OAF members who don't speak English and the style of worship is well suited to cultural traditions and welcoming to refugees coming to a new home in America. Each service serves a great need.

Q: Why does the OAF sometimes share music or scripture in the traditional service?

A: Session desires to build connections between our two cultures and worship styles and share with each other to know each other better. While we worship apart, we seek to be one in the Lord and have fellowship together. Session has identified three ways to be one in the Sprit together and increase opportunities for fellowship:

Share music in each other's services.

Work together on mission projects.

Work together on children and youth programs.

Q: Does selling the manse and asking for member feedback on the north forty mean that Orangewood is in financial trouble?

A: Orangewood has maintained a balanced budget. Session sees a long-term trend of reduced giving as our member mix has changed from more affluent families who are aging and new refugee families who are more economically challenged. Session and the congregation voted to sell the manse to improve our ability to manage through reduced giving. We currently use up to 4% of our endowments each year to keep a balanced budget.

Q: Why have so many different pastors been preaching lately?

A: Our pastor Ken has been very ill and recently underwent surgery. The surgery went very well, and Ken will need time to recover. The Session has hired Rev. Mary Saylor to work in Ken's absence, both preaching and managing staff. Her office days are Wednesday and Friday.

Q: Both Pam White, our office manager, and Sammi Burkhart, our children and youth leader, have resigned. How will Orangewood continue with so much staff leaving?

A: Both Pam and Sammi have graciously agreed to continue working to train their replacements. The Personnel Committee has been searching for our new office manager and developing the position description for our next children and youth leader. We prefer these roles be hired when our pastor is able to participate but will proceed to assure our church continues to serve our members and community. Session is in total agreement that an important element for Orangewood's future is attracting and welcoming young families.

Q: I've seen our solar panels on the church roof but heard that the system has not been connected. Did we lose money with our solar investment?

A: Session has been very disappointed in the many delays by our solar contractor, APS, and the City of Phoenix in this process. Our contractor bears major responsibility for the delay by engineering three different types of power at our three separate meters. We charged half our electricity bills to the contractor from July 2022 to December 2022 as a penalty. As of January 2023, the contractor is paying 100% of our electricity bills. Orangewood is no longer impacted by the delays and our contractor is highly motivated to complete our project.
