I want to use my last Pastor's Page to express my love for you all and to let you know how much being your pastor has been a blessing to me. It has been a wonderful 17 years full of many challenges and many joys. I have grown as a pastor and grown in my faith and spirituality.

I'm not worried about Orangewood Presbyterian Church. You will be just fine because the ministry at Orangewood has never been just about the minister. As I reflect on my years here, I remember how many times you have ministered to me and my family. You helped Lori and me raise our children. When I asked them as young teenagers "who are your heroes?" I expected to get soccer players and rock stars as answers. Instead they mentioned people like Dirk Oosterwyck, Bernale Wright, Tully Fletcher and Esther Raybuck.

You gave me a sabbatical to study Spiritual Direction which has been tremendously fruitful in my life and my ministry. You supported us through my heart attack and my disability with diverticulitis and c-diff. We've truly seen some miracles together! I also recall how you have stepped up recently when I couldn't be here. You continued the ministry of the church. You all can, and always have, stepped up to the tasks of the ministry before you. I have no doubt that you will do it again, and that God will bless you through it.

I read an article recently about a difference in wine making between California and France. In California they irrigate abundantly. In France they don't. When you don't water you will have lesser crops in some years, but the roots of your vines will grow much deeper. Eventually, they will reach the ground water and will be resistant to any drought. Relying on your pastor for everything is kind of like irrigation. In the short term, crops can be increased. In the long term, though, your roots need to go deeper into the living water of Jesus Christ.



The Plumbline will periodically introduce a member of our three congregations in a feature article. (Peter) Bhan Ruot is in *The Spotlight* this month. Bhan is a member of both the South Sudanese New Life Presbyterian Fellowship (formerly Nile Congregation) and the original Orangewood congregation. He attends both services most Sundays.

Bhan was born in a small Ethiopian village. Bhan's Grandmother took him to Presbyterian Church and had him baptized at age two. She taught him the Commandments, which were recited in church. When they got home from church, Grandmother made Bhan again say the Commandments before he could go play.

Their father wanted a different life for Bhan and his brother Buany from what he had as a cattle farmer. He sent the boys to school in a nearby town, an hour's walk from home. One day in 2005 after some violence and killing in their village, Bhan believed he was a target of the aggression. He left his class, went to his brother's classroom and grabbed him by the hand. The boys, ages 18 and 14, took off running without a goodbye. They had only what they had worn to school and a little lunch money. And so began a journey that would last both a month and a lifetime.

Bhan and Buany headed towards a refugee camp in Ethiopia. When they arrived, they were told they could not stay since the camp was for persons who had fled other countries, not those who lived in Ethiopia. They were sent on their way to Kakuma, a large refugee camp in Kenya.

Their journey took them from Ethiopia through South Sudan and into Kenya. Sometimes they walked alone, sometimes in the company of others. They travelled on foot over dirt roads and were grateful when they could hitch a ride for a few miles on a better road. Often they were without food or water. At times they slept during the day and travelled at night when it was cooler and safer from predators. When they arrived in Kakuma nearly a month later, they had travelled at least 614 km, as the crow flies. This translates to 382 miles, equivalent to the distance and terrain from Phoenix to LA.

In Kakuma the boys attended and graduated from high school. Bhan learned English, Arabic, and Swahili in addition to his native Nuer language. Bhan held a number of jobs within the camp, some paid, some volunteer. His favorite role may have been as choir master for his Presbyterian church's 3 choirs—youth, women, men; when the three groups united as one, 150 refugees raised their voices in song.

In 2009 the Red Cross was finally able to connect the boys to their parents by phone. For the past four years, their parents had believed the boys were no longer alive. In 2022 Bhan saw his parents, the first time since 2005.

Bhan met a young woman from So. Sudan. Their friendship led to a serious relationship and then marriage, according to tribal customs. They had two children, a daughter and a son. In 2017, Bhan was informed he and Buany had been selected to emigrate to the United States. Bhan was faced with a most difficult decision—should he stay in Kenya with his wife and children and be there for the birth of his third child? Staying would mean he might never have another opportunity to go and if he declined, Buany would have to remain in Kenya also. Should he go and later bring his family to America for a better life, with more opportunities for education, jobs, safety, a family home. Bhan believes that God guided him to chose to GO at this time. Bhan and Buany arrived in Phoenix in December, 2018.

Bhan has met and conquered many challenges in Phoenix. He is employed, has learned to drive, owns a car, attends English classes three times a week, has connected with the South Sudanese community here and has continued his Presbyterian worship and affiliation. Bhan is grateful for the friendship he has with fellow refugee Gach Kur. It is Gach who invited Bhan to come to Orangewood. Bhan shared that his greatest challenge is his family being far away. He could have remained in Africa with them. But he is certain the better life for all of them is in America.

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The Old Rugged Cross



The Old Rugged Cross is one of the best known and most loved country gospel songs. It has been performed by some of the twentieth century's most important recording artists, including:

Al Green, Andy Griffith, Anne Murray, Chet Atkins, Floyd Cramer, Eddy Arnold, Jim Reeves, Johnny Cash and June Carter, Ella Fitzgerald, Mahalia Jackson, Merle Haggard, Patsy Cline, Loretta Lynn, Ray Price, Ronnie Milsap, Tennessee Ernie Ford, The Oak Ridge Boys, The Statler Brothers, Vince Gill, and Willie Nelson.

Orangewood has it's own "rugged cross" hanging in Page Hall. Have you wondered about its origin?

On one of the Rocky Point trips, the Orangewood crew built a small chapel, rather than a home. Bernale thought it would be nice to construct a cross for the front of the church and to make it out of scraps from the build. The church's pastor declined the offer of the cross, because as the crew learned, Pentecostals view any kind of adornment, whether on buildings or on a

person, as "idolatry", and thus they discourage it. When the situation was explained to Bernale, she suggested, "Well, we'll just take it back and display it in Page Hall."

And there it hangs, as a reminder of scores of Rocky Point trips, a wonderful symbol of OPC's faithfulness to Jesus' calling in Mexico.

Thank you all for your support of this ministry.












Session Notes

Despite the changes and turmoil we are experiencing and the urgent need to lay out a plan for our future, positive changes and improvements continue to be carried out. See separate articles in this newsletter about the Honduras trip and the ongoing work of the OPC Mission Committee. We appreciate the work of our Facilities team, led by Brent Upson, in carrying out the following projects.

- The sale of the manse has been completed with net proceeds to Orangewood of \$534,663. The sale closed on July 6th. The new owners are a family of four with two preschool boys. The family is excited to be living next to Orangewood and the schools.
- The preschool is having new security rolling shutters installed in response to requests from parents. They will be beige to blend in with the wall color and be closed when the school is not in session to minimize vandalism.
- The cabinets in Page Hall meeting rooms have been repaired and the locks replaced/ rekeyed. See the church administrator for a key if your group would like to have secure storage in the cabinets.
- Our solar project took another step forward as the service panel on the north education building was replaced with 400 amp service to handle the combined solar and existing power. This took alignment of APS, City of Phoenix, Creative Bridges Preschool and our contractor. During the delay of system connection our contractor is paying all our electricity bills.
- Parking lot income. There is a company that manages excess parking for rental. We have started the process of assessing the income and risk of renting our excess parking.
- Discussion about ideas to use of our vacant land (known as "the north 40") continues with
 focus on the possibility of building some affordable housing units on the property. Session
 welcomes your thoughts about this idea and your participation in planning for the future of
 this unused property on our campus.
- Session approved expenditure of up to \$1,000 to retrofit the signage on 10th Street in from
 of the church with an electronic programmable sign.





Get your copy and come join a small group on September 10th!! We will begin an 8-week series, kicking off in the sanctuary at 10:45 am. Following a brief introduction, groups will be formed for discussion in Room 11 and/or the Choir Room.

Immerse: The Reading Bible comes in 6 volumes and presents each Bible book without the distractions of chapter and verse numbers, subject headers, or footnotes. The New Living Translation text is laid out in easy-to-read, single-column format. No Bible text has been added or left out. There are six volumes: Beginnings, Kingdoms, Prophets, Poets, Chronicles, and Messiah.

The **Beginnings** volume includes the first five books of the Bible. We will use an 8-week plan to read this volume, which will mean reading about 40 pages per week. An information sheet about the whole program is available on the patio along with copies of the **Beginnings** volume. Come check it out and join us on Sunday, September 10th for discussion in your church community!

Mission Committee

Undie Sunday, September 3 – Labor Day is the traditional time for OPC to bring donations of toiletries, underwear and socks for Nourish Phoenix (fka ICM). Bring the hotel goodies you may have collected over the last few months (shampoo & conditioner, soap or liquid body

wash, lotion, etc.), along with **new** underwear and socks for men, women, and children. Men's sport socks, white, and large size (size 6-12) are especially liked by their clients!

Nourish Phoenix — On the fourth Monday of most months, a group from Orangewood volunteers at Nourish Phoenix, where we help assemble food boxes for those in need and/or sort clothing donations. (This is in addition to two of our dedicated women from OPC who have volunteered in their clothing room every week for many years!) We meet at the church at 8:00 AM, carpool or take the van to their location, and are usually back at the church by noon.

Butterfly Tree – We purchased 75 backpacks and supplies for students returning to school this fall. The backpacks were blessed at a Sunday service in the Sanctuary in late July, after which they were made available to OPC students, including our African Fellowship youth.

Grace Lutheran – We serve pancakes to the homeless on the third Sunday morning of even numbered months. Our next breakfast there will be October 15.

July 9th

Hello Dear Friends,

After a long, slow day of travel, we arrived safely in Dulce Nombre. Although we arrived much later than expected, many old friends and locals were on hand to greet us and welcome us to the community. The mayor introduced the families whose homes we will be helping to build.

Today we took a tour of the homesites under construction as well as of the homes these families currently live in. We saw the block machine that we donated and learned that 2/3 of the blocks needed for ten homes have already been made. This is a very motivated and hard working community. Blessings,

July 10th

Dear Family and Friends of Orangewood,

Dulce Nombre is filled with energy and enthusiasm with our arrival. The mayor explained to us that our

presence motivates the community to continue their collaboration to build 10 homes together. This morning, our group was divided into four teams — one packed up with medical supplies, games, and toys and the other three geared

up with working gloves - ready to lay block at three

separate home sites.

I joined the medical team and was in awe as we drove about 45 minutes through the most beautiful hills you have ever seen. Upon arriving at the school, we saw 24 to 30 children sitting at their desks and 20 to 30 adults waiting in line for healthcare.

Dental education was one of the many activities today. Every child was given a toothbrush. One of the older students was given the role of teaching the entire classroom how to brush their teeth. She read from the Spanish version of the book Where There Is No Doctor while I coached her where to read and what to emphasize. This young girl was empowered by her role as a Maestra and was beaming. After the lesson, we told them it was time for a test and they lined up

with their toothbrushes. We gave them toothpaste and asked them to begin practicing the brushing skills. It was so much fun seeing them excited to brush their teeth!

Teaching them healthy lifestyle habits would not have been possible without your prayers and generous donations. We all feel your prayers and are grateful for the financial support as this

is what makes the building and the personal health care possible.


Hello evervone!


