For many years, Orangewood had the tradition of welcoming visitors at our worship service, by having them stand, introduce themselves and presenting them with a loaf of homemade bread. Covid and losing our bread maker put an end to that practice. So our newcomers often fly under the radar a bit before we get to know them. Darlene Long didn't get a loaf of bread, but she is being introduced and featured in the Plumbline Spotlight. She's been attending Orangewood for several months and has already made her presence known, in a quiet way, by attending Sages and Presbyterian Women gatherings and joining the Orange Pealers, bringing 30 years of handbell experience. At present she is waiting for her official membership to be transferred to Orangewood from her former church in Pennsylvania.

Darlene was born in Philadelpia. Her first name came from Darlene Ice Cream which was sold in the 50s in the Philadelphia area. *The story goes that my mother saw a sign with that name on it, either near the doctor's office or the hospital. She also wanted a name that did not easily convert into a nickname, but life has a way of creating them anyway.*



Because I was slender, family sometimes called me Leanie Bean or just Bean. And a few family members called me Doll or Doll Doll---it was "close" to Darlene, I guess. Darlene lived with her sister Laraine and parents through her high school years in the house where her Dad had been born. Growing up in a Philly neighborhood and moving to the Philadelphia suburbs after high school was like moving to a foreign country.

Darlene graduated with a bachelor's degree from Drexel University, also in Philadelphia. *I started out as an interior design major and quickly realized I had no talent. Switched to home economics education. Other than doing my student teaching, I never taught school.* During her working years, Darlene worked mostly in administrative support positions. She survived mergers and downsizing. In her 50 years of employment, she worked for just three companies.

Darlene moved to Phoenix in December 2021 and lives with her sister, who had moved here in the late 70s. It was time to grow old together. Darlene described the coolest thing she has done since moving to Phoenix. I sang at Center Court at the Footprint Center. It was for the Phoenix Mercury's home opener. Wyclef Jean was the half time entertainment and I was part of a 200 voice choir (The Sum) that accompanied him. We did Bob Marley's song, One Love. There was a write up in the newspaper about the opportunity (one of the reasons I love newspapers). I applied on line never thinking I would be chosen and lo and behold got an email that I was picked. I think they were looking for all shapes, sizes, colors, ages, etc. It was a hoot!

Darlene found Orangewood by looking at nearby Presbyterian churches on the internet. Orangewood is a similar size to the church she belonged to in Springfield, PA. The form of worship was familiar. It is important to me that it is a Presbyterian Church, USA not a PCA. It's close to where I live now and being new to the 'neighborhood', easy to get to. My parents and grandparents were Presbyterians and the 'greats' were Scots' Presbyterians from Scotland and Northern Ireland. It's in my genes. I can't be anything else.

When asked about her faith, Darlene responded: *I know the Lord as the Supreme physician and that He watches over me. In 1999 I was diagnosed with rectal cancer. I had surgery, chemo and radiation. In 2001 it metastasized to the liver. I had a liver resection and chemo. In January 2002 I was diagnosed with a bowel obstruction. I was in and out of the hospital and had several bowel resections. I was finally released from the hospital in November 2002 and have never spent a night in the hospital since. I have not had a recurrence of cancer and am here to tell the tale. No one would have bet on me. The Lord wasn't ready for me.*

I asked Darlene "Which members of your family, who are no longer living, would you most like to dine with?" She told me it would be her paternal grandparents, who died before she was born. She had been told that Grandma Sara was pretty difficult, but she wanted to find out for herself if that was true. When asked "Which dead famous person(s) she'd most enjoy dining with, she thought and thought—and then came up with Ben Franklin and Gwen Ifill. I'd love to attend that dinner!!

While Ken was impressive with his shot that ricocheted off the Rocky Point trailer, it was Tully, whose ball travelled many miles while bouncing off the sites of our mission partners, who scored with nothing but net.

The Upson family, led by Chef Brent, and ably supported by his wife Diana, children Liz and John, and daughter in law Ariel Hanna, prepared and served a tasty Mexican buffet. The OAF also provided several traditional African dishes, including fufu!!

We thank Mighty Addi Case for setting up all of the tables and chairs and also thank those who assisted Addi in taking down the tables and chairs.

Session Notes

Following are highlights from the September 19, 2023 Session Meeting

- Annual meeting date set for Sunday, October 15th.
- Pastor Nominating Committee for Interim Pastor appointed, subject to members agreement to serve.
- Treasurer's Report:
 - Member Income: \$403,679 (95% of Budget)Total Income: \$522,507 (97.8% of Budget)
 - * Expenses: \$512,696 (96% of Budget)
 - Net: \$9,810 (Positive)
- Planning is underway for hosting the Presbytery Meeting on Saturday, November 4, 2023.
- Brent Upson reported on the status of pastoral candidate Sammi Innanen, who is under the care
 of Orangewood. Sammi has completed seminary and is currently completing practical study as a
 hospital chaplain with the US Army. Once Sammi has a call, installation and ordination can be
 scheduled and this is expected to occur in the next few months.
- Approval was given for the job description for the Director of Children's Church prepared by Brent Upson, who is currently serving as temporary chair of Personnel in the absence of Ron Carmichael.
- New Committee Chairpersons:
 - Becky Cederquist will chair the Worship Committee in the upcoming year.
 - * Judy Proffitt will chair the Congregational Life Committee in the upcoming year.
 - * Brent Upson will chair the Committee for Children and Youth.
- Joseph Lavi reported that 3 new families have begun attending OAF services and 2 new babies have been born. Joseph would like to schedule new member education and baptism for 6 people in the coming months.
- Thanksgiving Dinner is planned for the Sunday prior to Thanksgiving.
- Facilities Committee is investigating a new electronic sign for the front of the church.
- Session approved the budget for 2023-24. Bob Wells will publish the budget prior to the Annual Meeting.
- Session is forming a committee of an equal number of members from the OAF and the Mother church to meet regularly to continue to clarify the relationship between the congregations and facilitate communication.
- Description of Interim Pastor Process and first issue of the Mid-Week Messenger have been distributed.

Mission Committee

World Communion Sunday, October 1 – This is also the day when we receive the Peace & Global Witness Offering, which is one of the four special offerings collected each year by our denomination. Twenty five percent of the Peace Offering stays with our congregation to support peacemaking and reconciliation in our own community. The committee has selected Abounding Service, a non-profit that offers English language classes and citizenship classes to refugees, to receive our share of this year's offering.

Nourish Phoenix – Monday, October 23, is the date for our next group volunteer trip to Nourish Phoenix (fka ICM Food & Clothing Bank). We will meet at the church at 8:00 AM, carpool to their location, and are usually back at the church by noon. Please sign up on the patio if you plan on joining us for this activity. They can use more volunteers!

ICM was founded 40 years ago. Nourish Phoenix held a reception in honor of that anniversary in late August. Some of us from OPC attended the reception. Orangewood was mentioned by their Executive Director in her remarks as one of the congregations that has supported their mission through the years.

Grace Lutheran – We serve pancakes to the homeless on the third Sunday morning of even numbered months. Our next breakfast there will be October 15, and we also need volunteers for this event! Orangewood Facilities September Report

It's been a great finish to the summer as your facilities team is recovering from the heat and preparing for fall. Projects completed:

- •Manse sale completed! A young family is renovating the house and will move in starting Oct. Say hello to the O'Neil family.
- •Solar electricity system permits approved by APS. Last step is City of Phoenix approval. Our solar contractor continues to pay all our electric bills while we wait.
- •Monsoon winds damaged our Page Hall roof; it was repaired.
- •New door in Page Hall replaced and painted, led by Bob Jensen.
- •New rolling security shutters have been installed in north and south education buildings paid by Creative Bridges Preschool.
- •Security video system was repaired and expanded to cover more areas. Lead: Bob Wells.
- •Termites detected in south ed building, exterminator treated the portion of the building attic where they were found. Thanks Kristi!
- •Insurance board has started to provide discounted water detectors that alert us to a water leak. Will be buying the sensors to better protect our church.

Orangewood has continued to support our community by hosting non-profit groups like Boy Scouts, choral groups, Bible Study fellowship, support groups etc. We do charge rent to groups to help support our campus. Total income from our lease with Creative Bridges, the Manse and community groups totaled \$85k from rents this year.

Honduras Update

Orangewood is now working with 3 other churches on projects in Honduras – Orangewood in Arizona; First Presbyterian in Sioux Falls, South Dakota; Unity Presbyterian in South Carolina; a UCC church near Minneapolis. We are collaborating on projects in the municipalities of Trinidad and Dulce Nombre. Here's an update based on a recent teleconference of the churches.

- 10 houses were completed in San Juan Planes (Trinidad) in July 2023. The community wants to build 10 more houses and our team agreed to request a proposal from them.
- In 2023, the team participated in a 10-home project in Dulce Nombre. This project has now reached 7-9 courses of block in all homes and is fully funded. Dulce Nombre would like to start a follow-on project for 10 more families. Orangewood agreed to provide funding for a group liaison to work with the municipal government. She will discuss accommodations for a 2024 trip.
- Orangewood's 2024 trip is planned for July 5-16. We are already checking on airline reservations and will start building our team soon. We plan to take on both house building and medical clinics as usual.

From The Peace and Justice Network South Sudan, September 2023



The Peace and Justice Network believes we can build community by learning about our sisters and brothers around the world. The other day I was talking with my good friend Gach Kur who is a leader in the South Sudanese New Life Presbyterian Fellowship that worships on the campus of Orangewood Presbyterian Church. He was telling me about the heartbreaking situation in South Sudan. He told me about a mother and her and two children who died of starvation in their own home. This

situation is very personal to Gach because he has many family members still in Africa. But I started thinking – it should be personal to all of us. We are all one family. So I did a little research at the United Nations website and gathered some information to share with you. Click on the link below to read what I found out about what's going on and how we can help.

Multiple issues cause hardship and death among the people of South Sudan. First, there is ongoing brutal armed conflict. Since 2013 this conflict has claimed thousands of lives and driven millions of people from their homes. Currently there are two million people internally displaced within their own country. An additional two million have fled to reach safety in refugee camps in neighboring countries such as Ethiopia and Kenya. South Sudan hosts some 330,000 refugees and asylum-seekers from other countries (mainly from Sudan). In addition, over 500,000 South Sudanese refugees have returned to the country since the signing of the Revitalized Peace Agreement in 2018.

Given all these factors, South Sudan's refugee crisis remains the largest in Africa but that is not the only problem for the people. South Sudan continues to be on the frontline of today's climate crisis and has been heavily impacted by flooding and insecurity.

The United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) is able to get needed support to the people, both within the country and in the refugee camps in Ethiopia and Kenya. Under the Refugee Coordination Model, UNHCR has built partnerships with governmental, humanitarian, development and peacebuilding actors to provide multisectoral assistance. This includes protection, education and livelihood support to refugees, Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs), returnees and their hosting communities in seven states in South Sudan.
