From the Gap Interim Pastor

Once again the calendar brings us to November and November brings us to Thanksgiving. "What shall I render to the Lord for all his bounty to me?" asks the psalmist. And then he answers his own question: "I will offer a sacrifice of thanksgiving." On almost every page of the Scriptures we are told to give thanks. God's people are to be thanks-giving people.

Think of the gifts we have received. Our life is a gift from God. Salvation through Jesus Christ is a gift from God. The presence of the Spirit is a gift from God. Whatever talents, ability, or achievements we have are gifts from God. Everyone and everything that makes our lives richer are gifts from God. In times of disappointment or loss or grief, we know the gift of God's presence. Our Presbyterian forebear John Calvin said, "Gratitude is the chief exercise of godliness." Thanksgiving should be a habit so deeply rooted in our lives that it comes naturally to us to be grateful and to express our gratitude to God.

When we lived in New England, someone told me this story. There was once a Vermont farmer, a quiet man, not given to much conversation. One evening as he and his wife sat on the front porch, it occurred to him how very much his wife meant to him. For forty-four years they had lived together. She was a kind person, cheerful, a hard worker, a loving mother and grandmother, a shrewd businesswoman, and a pretty good cook. As they sat there together in the silence the farmer was strangely overcome with gratitude. "Wife," he said, "You are such a good woman that sometimes I can hardly keep from telling you so."

As we come to Thanksgiving 2023 we have yet another opportunity to reflect on how grateful we are, and to tell God so. Even in these perilous times when the future seems uncertain, our faith calls us to give thanks. So what shall we return to the Lord for all the bounty we have received? "In all things give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you."

SPOTLIGHT


In the beginning there were three.....Three what??? Three Orangewood Geezers. These were the guys, mostly retired, who took care of small but important handyman tasks around the Orangewood campus. Bill Baker, Terry Frost, and Dave Harms were dubbed The Geezers by office Administrator Peggy Hagan. Peggy even got them t-shirts, lettered with *Geezer, Formerly a Stud Muffin*. Sadly, only Terry Frost survives to tell of the Geezers' many accomplishments.

Initially, the Geezers showed up at Orangewood just to putter around or perhaps to escape the Honey-Do list that awaited them at home. However, it wasn't long before some real projects were taken on—one of these was the Columbarium/Memorial Garden. Bob Page, patriarch of the Pages of Page Hall, wanted a suitable final resting place for his wife Joyce. The Geezers were joined by others in creating the Columbarium—Lyle Six did the engineering, Jim Digges installed the electrical, and Terry handled the plumbing. The cross was created and added by Bill Burke, while Terry and Sandy Frost constructed the fountain and tended the plants for many years.

Other Geezer projects including building cabinets and painting the interior of Page Hall, trimming the Lady Banks roses and vines around the perimeter of the property, the annual putting up of Christmas "attire" in the sanctuary, creating special effects for the Fall Festival, and building the sets that Bernale designed for Vacation Bible School. Cleaning leaves and debris from the buildings' gutters was a seasonal task each year. In fact, Terry continued to take care of this chore until last year when he was banned from climbing a ladder or going on the roof.

Two of Terry's most admired projects are several stained glass windows for Page Hall and the two rolling wooden cabinets for the handbells. The bell cabinets are lined in velveteen and there's a unique indented, labeled, precisely sized oval for each bell. Thus you can walk over to the cabinet and immediately pick up C#5, without having to hunt for it.

Now, it must be clear that there were and continue to be many others who have contributed their time and talents to creating, repairing, maintaining, and doing what needs to be done around the OPC campus on a daily basis----Dave Haskins, Bob Jenson, Joe and Edna Miller, Dan Sherwood, Brent Upson, and Bob Wells immediately come to mind. However, these folks are not officially Geezers, I'm told. Perhaps we should we come up with a name for them???

- Joseph Lavi reported the OAF has welcomed a new family from Zimbabwe. An upcoming baptism will utilize Bob Wells’ swimming pool.
- Session is considering new electronic signage for the 10th Street side of the church.
- Personnel is working on the job description for a youth leader for Grade 6 – College, as well as a plan for a youth program. Brent Upson is consulting with parents and will meet with youth.
- Session approved a request to hold a brunch fundraiser for Honduras in spring 2024.
- Session received a report from Christina Suarez about communication with members interested in contemporary service.
