Session Notes

Session held a called meeting on December 2, 2023, for the purpose of approving the appointment of an Interim Pastor and to set specific goals for planning the future of OPC.

- Session had approved an email motion recommending Addi Case to attend general Assembly in July 204. The approval was forwarded to Presbytery who voted to approve the OPC recommendation on December 6th.
- Session approved the appointment of reverend Dr. Sue Marie Baskette to be interim pastor of OPC for a period of 2 years beginning February 1, 2024. The annual salary will be \$75,000 per year plus Board of Pensions benefits not to exceed \$33,000, a flex vouchered expense account of \$3,500 and relocation allowance of \$3,500 vouchered expenses, four weeks' vacation time and continuing education leave of seven days. The duties and responsibilities of the interim pastor include working with the session and the congregation to build trust and confidence in communications, assist in establishing plans for the future and focus of the OAF, as well as administrative duties and participation with OPC committees.
- Session thanked the Interim Pastor Nominating Committee for its work and requested that the committee invite the candidate to get acquainted.
- Session discussed goals and proposals for the future of OPC and established groups to work on specific areas. Reports to be given at the January session meeting.
 - Group 1: work on a proposal for a contemporary service that is a combination of OPC and OAF with focus on music; Jackson Nduwimama, Phebe Packer, Brent Upson, Christina Suarez
 - Group 2: meet with preschool to uncover needs of young families; Pam Watts, Louise Sedgewick, Pastor (Gap Interim, Interim), and preschool parents.
 - Group 3: work on a proposal for parish nurse function/counseling function for the elderly; Christina Suarez, Becky Cederquist, Ron Carmichael, Phebe Packer, Joseph Lavi.

The next Stated Session Meeting will be on Saturday, January 20th 2024, at 1 pm by Zoom meeting and/or in person, Choir Room.

The video was taken in the summer of 2023 in San Juan Planes, a small town in the municipality of Trinidad in the western mountains of the country. Now the community has come together to start a music school. The current array of instruments includes keyboards, guitars, drums and violins. Mission Committee

As we conclude another successful year of ministering to those in need, your Mission Committee extends its sincere gratitude to the congregation for your support. Following are just a few of the many projects and programs your financial and in-kind donations, and equally important your volunteer efforts, have made possible over the last twelve months:

- Nourish Phoenix In addition to the weekly donations of clothing and other items on their wish list deposited in the blue bins outside Page Hall, you contributed 395 pounds of nonperishable food and other essential items to the Spring food drive, brought men's crew socks and other items to the Undie Sunday drive over Labor Day weekend, and supported their clients throughout the year with your volunteer efforts.
- Honduras Two successful fundraising efforts in the spring made it possible for us to embark on a new community housing project in Dulce Nombre in July, and you also supported our efforts with purchases of supplies for our medical clinic during the trip.
- Angel Tree This program of Prison Fellowship is an opportunity to provide children of incarcerated parents with Christmas gifts on behalf of the parent. With your purchases this year, we were able to make Christmas a little merrier for nearly fifty children. Again, this year, a huge thank you to Addi Case for coordinating this program for OPC!
- Using the supplies you purchased, our volunteers assembled 200 care kits for the Unsheltered at one of our Advent Worship Service Events in December. Each kit included a blanket, a pair of warm socks, toothbrush, toothpaste and other essential hygiene items, and a granola bar. Many of the kits were distributed to clients at Grace Lutheran's pancake breakfast the following Sunday, and others were made available to OPC members to give to the unsheltered we see on the streets as we are driving around.
- Alternative Giving As the Plumbline goes to press, \$4,405 has been donated for this year's Alternative Giving options, including \$2,520 for scholarships to help students in Honduras continue their education, \$1,270 for Heifer International, and \$615 from the Presbyterian Giving Catalog.

Again, a big thank you to everyone who supported Orangewood's mission efforts over the past year, whether it was with your volunteer efforts, financial support, or both. A reminder that each Sunday morning, the Mission Table on the Patio has information on many of the projects OPC participates in and includes sign-up sheets for volunteers to participate in our various activities. We are always looking for more volunteers!

Immerse Bible Study

The Immerse Bible Study will resume meeting on Sunday, January 7th at 10:45 am in Room 11. We will begin our study of the second volume of the Immerse series, "Kingdoms". At the conclusion of our first 8-week study we arrived at the point when God's people had been freed from slavery in Egypt and were about to enter the land promised to their ancestor Abraham.

In the next segment (Joshua, Judges, Ruth, and Samuel-Kings) we will read about Israel entering the land and being commissioned to be God's light to the nations. As these books begin, God's people are living under God's three earlier covenants made

with Noah, Abraham and Moses. The story moves ahead with a description of the events surrounding the fourth covenant, made with David. By the end of this book, God's plan for the people of Israel appears to be greatly threatened, but God promises not to abandon David's family and kingdom. Whatever work God will yet do through Israel for the sake of the world, God will do through the royal line of David.

Recently the Spotlight page has focused on Orangewood folks. . This time, however, we're sharing the story of an inanimate object, a large rock. HUH, you say. Read on to learn why this isn't just any ol' rock......Many thanks to Bob Wells for his discovery, research, and writing of this article.

The Rock

In the initial days of construction on the new Simis School, a contractor dragged a large rock from the Simis campus across 10th street and deposited it in the entry way to Orangewood's parking lot. The Orangewood facilities group was not happy about this incursion, but "what the heck" it was a nice rock and it looked good there. Orangewood guessed it was only temporary and at the end of construction it would be returned to Simis. Well, that was not the case, and the rock has remained there for several years.



Recently Orangewood has undertaken some enhancement and beautification activities on our campus one of which is the cleanup of our parking lot entry way. During these activities our contractor, who had instructions to remove the rock, flipped it over. Much to all's surprise there was

a plaque on the underside. It was initially not clear what the plaque said or was about but after careful inspection the words became clearer as shown in the insert.



It was obvious that this stone had meaning to the Simis School. This author decided to visit the school office and inquire if they were interested in having the stone returned. The principal responded, yes indeed. Later

when asked where they would like it placed they responded in the "garden". The bobcat loader needed to move the

stone cannot get into the enclosed garden, do you have a second desire. It has been placed outside the fence at the garden on the 10th street walkway.

It appears this plaque was to memorialize the setup of the Simis Garden for student learning program.
