Messenger of Peace

Dear Members and Friends,

This month we celebrate the primary festival of the Christian faith. Easter is the highest of high days in the church calendar. Easter is the queen of feasts. True Christians everywhere celebrate the Resurrection. On Easter morning it is an ancient tradition for Christians to greet each other as follows: "Christ has risen!" and is answered "He is risen indeed!"

<u>Joy</u>. Easter is prime time for rejoicing. It is the church's happy day. The "Alleluia" dropped for Lent is now heard once more. The Lenten fast is ended, and there is rejoicing not only for a return to normal eating but for the fact that now there is no reason to fast. This joy is expressed in a 14th century hymn:

Jesus Christ is ris'n today Alleluia! Our triumphant holy day Alleluia! Who did once upon the cross Alleluia! Suffer to redeem our loss Alleluia!

Hymns of praise then let us sing, Alleluia! Unto Christ, our heav'nly king, Alleluia! Who endured the cross and grave Alleluia! Sinners to redeem and save Alleluia!

<u>Life</u>. Easter means eternal life for the believer in Christ. This is symbolized by the abundance of flowers used on Easter.

<u>Newness</u>. The risen Christ is a "new" being with a glorified body. He is now the exalted Christ, the eternal Christ not touched by death. This newness for a Christian through dying and rising with Christ is expressed in the custom of wearing new clothes on Easter.

<u>Hope</u>. Easter brings hope to those who have dead loved ones and to the dying. The Resurrection brings assurance that we too shall live with Christ forever. Death has been conquered by the Resurrection.

<u>Victory</u>. Jesus is delivered from the worst of man and the worst of Satan – the power of death. Like a mighty warrior, Christ comes forth from the grave as victor. Christians express their joy over this victory of Christ and participate in his victory by faith. This note of victory is expressed in the 17th century Latin Hymn:

The strife is o'er, the battle done; Now is the victor's triumph won Now be the song of praise begun. Alleluia!

The pow'rs of death have done their worst, But Christ their legions hath dispersed, Let shouts of holy joy outburst, Alleluia

The three sad days have quickly sped, He rises glorious from the dead. All glory to our risen Head! Alleluia!

Be broke the age bound chains of hell; The bars from heav'n's high portals fell Let hymns of praise His triumph tell. Alleluia.

The mood of Easter is reflected and expressed in the liturgical color. It is white because it expresses celebration, festivity, joy, and victory. Gold may be used as an alternate color for Easter Day to express the special prominence of the greatest day of the church year.

May God richly bless your Easter Celebration!

Helga was born in Berlin, Germany, in 1937. During the early years of WWII she and her older brother were separated from their mother and sent along with many other children in a train boxcar to Austria. Her mother and younger siblings were sent north of Berlin while her



father was serving in the German Army. It was a frightening experience being separated from her mother and father.

She went back and forth to Berlin a couple of times, but the bombing became so bad that they then stayed in Austria till the end of the war. After being reunited with her mother they got two horses and a wagon to try to return to Berlin, but were discouraged as Berlin was a shambles. They then settled in southern Germany in a Rhoen mountain village.

While working at a small restaurant after growing up, she met a U.S. Army soldier who volunteered to take her home after work. That's when love sparked and they soon got married.

Once their first son was born they got transferred back to the States. Helga came to the U. S. on March of 1959 (60 years ago), and she became a proud citizen on February 26, 1964. Her husband was then stationed in Omaha, NE. While in Omaha she was named "Miss Budweiser" for the Omaha area.

After she divorced she remarried and she and her husband moved to Whidbey Island, WA. Her husband worked on the ferry system of Puget Sound. Helga was a real estate broker for 26 years. She also did volunteer work at hospitals and adult care facilities which she still does today in the Yakima area.

Helga later moved to Hayden Lake, ID, before finally moving to Cle Elum, WA. She started a "Free Library" in S. Cle Elum and also spearheaded getting a large mural put onto the bridge heading into S.
