- Return the bottle to church by February 16.


The money we raise together will be given to Life Choices to help them continue their life-saving, life-changing work.

Greetings Sponsors and Donors:

God's blessings to the friends of Nord Est Haiti Lutheran Mission (NEHLM). This year marks the 10th Anniversary of our involvement with Reverend Daniel Paul in Nord Est Haiti. In 2003, the initial mission team from Lamb of God Lutheran Church, Lake Stevens, Washington, visited and began the groundbreaking of what is now the girls' complex of MADO (The House of the Lambs of God). As the board reflects upon these past 10 years, we are humbled by God's continual hand and providence for the needs of this ministry. This past year marked the groundbreaking work for the primary school. We are thankful for the support and prayers through the years.

Through gifts from supporters many projects were accomplished along with continual maintenance. This past year, our sponsorship program supported about 70 orphans, and 35 of the approximate 200 students were sponsored as well as the missionary nurse. Thank you, sponsors, for your prayers and provision for these children. Through the financial support of allocated and unallocated gifts, construction is an ongoing task at MADO, in order to accommodate the growing ministry. Construction began on two additional rooms added on the roof of the girls' orphanage. With the support of our mission teams, groundbreaking for the school wall started. This summer following the mission teamwork, NEHLM received notice that MADO was selected as a grant recipient through the National LWML (Lutheran Women's Missionary League) for Phase One construction on the school. This school will be able to accommodate 200+ children without impeding on the everyday function of the girls' complex (where school is currently located). We are very grateful to the LWML ministry walking along side us, through the past grants from WA-AK and Oregon districts, but now also from the national body. Thank you. In addition, donors supplied funds and supplies for the school. Along with construction, agriculture is another focus to provide food and provide labor and skills for the boys. We appreciate donations for the purchase of additional prime agriculture land. Thanks for your prayers and financial support.

Through your gifts other expenses for maintenance and repair for the buildings and the vehicles were made available. This included some needed electrical repairs for the girls' orphanage complex. Repairs to the truck were made following an accident. We are very thankful Rev. Daniel Paul was not seriously injured and thankful for the unallocated funds which allowed for vehicle repairs to be done in a timely manner. Rev. Daniel Paul's computer and other items were stolen while he was in the Dominican Republic. Likewise, donations given to the ministry were available to assist in the

replacement of items stolen and new support systems for proper backup.

We thank the short-term mission teams that went to serve this year. One medical mission team with members from three Michigan churches (Trinity Lutheran from Utica, Faith Lutheran from Troy, and Shepherd's Gate Lutheran from Shelby Township) were at MADO providing health services for the orphanages and the community. It is wonderful to see the way people keep selflessly providing both money and time to support this mission. A special thanks to the churches that have supported this mission since 2003 and 2005 - Faith LCMS, La Grande, Oregon, and Lamb of God LCMS, Lake Stevens, Washington. Thanks to each of the members of the traveling teams, as well as the members of the churches that support the teams. We are thankful for the expanding number of churches throughout the United States who continue to support this ministry in a variety of means. These relationships are crucial to the ministry and a valuable support to Reverend Paul and his family. If you are led to serve in Haiti, we encourage you to consider joining a mission team. We are sad that we no longer have Emily, our resident nurse at MADO. However, we all are extremely joyful on her marriage to Cheyenne Yancey and her continual involvement as a volunteer with our Board.

We are looking forward to the New Year and God's plans for the support of this ministry, its orphanages and its school. As board members, we are continually humbled to follow God's direction to support this ministry in Nord Est Haiti. We are thankful for our prayer warriors who remember Reverend Paul, the ministry, and the Board in their prayers.

A note of explaination: Rev. Ngare is a Lutheran pastor in Kenya, Africa. He is a superintendent for the Lutheran schools in that that area as well as a pastor of a Lutheran Church with the ELCK, the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Kenya. The ELCK is in partnership with the LCMS with us. Rev. Ngare assisted a medical team that I was on several years ago in Kenya and provided some of the daily devotions as well as helped to be an interpreter with natives who did not speak English.

Rev. Ngare was recently in the Atlanta, GA area visiting our Lutheran churches to also raise funds for a church building in the small village that he is the pastor. In his role as superintendent of the Lutheran schools in western Kenya, Rev. Ngare oversees 32 elementary schools, 4 high school age schools and one school for mentally handicapped children. He also is associated with the Diakonia Compassionate Ministry located in Kisumu where a grant from the LCMS World Relief and Human Care helped construct a medical clinic recently. Some of us held our medical team clinics on this facility prior to final construction while in Kenya.
