THE LIFE OF CHRIST: EPIPHANY

"The Life of Christ" is the theme of the first "half" of the Church Year. It begins with the Season of Advent, and concludes with the Season beginning of the Church Year, with the Season of Advent, and concludes with the Season of Easter. All of the Lessons celebrate the Life of Christ, the Head of the Church.

Over my many years of ministry as a pastor, I have relished our liturgical calendar and its related practices. Though a man-made tool, it guides us on a journey that is both purposeful and meaningful. It serves as an outline for the sake of celebration and instruction.

Last month, we looked at the seasons of Advent and Christmas. This month, we look at the Epiphany Season.

Epiphany is one of the three oldest celebrations of the Christian Church. It is celebrated as the Gospel being proclaimed to the Gentiles. The Epiphany Season begins on January 6th and is celebrated through Transfiguration Sunday, the last Sunday of Epiphany. It is of varying lengths due to the onset of the Lenten Season.

The Epiphany of Our Lord begins with the visit of the Magi or Wise Men. Read Matthew 2:1-12. The Star that was witnessed in the East announced the birth of the One born King of the Jews. It may have taken at least a year for the Wise Men to complete their journey and witness the baby boy, Jesus. They left behind their treasures – treasures fit for a King – and went home. Nowhere in the Bible, is there an exact testimony as to how old Jesus was when He and His custodial parents were visited.

The balance of the season bears witness to how Jesus revealed Himself as the promised Messiah, as the Son of Man and Son of God. It is bookended with the Baptism of our Lord and the Transfiguration of Our Lord. At both events, a declaration from heaven is made – "This is My Son....". The Gospel Lessons for the season relate to Jesus revealing Himself in His teachings and His ministry of healing. Miracles and other such "signs" attested to the truth of His claims as to who He was. John reminds us that though Jesus performed many signs, etc., those that are recorded were for the purpose of bringing people to know that He was the Son of God in their midst and believing they would be saved. (cf. John 20:30-32)

Still to this day Jesus is revealed in the Holy Bible. Still, to this day, the Holy Spirit opens hearts and causes us to believe the testimony of God's Word. As we continue to, Reach Out, Serve Jesus and Celebrate His Love", may many more be brought into a relationship with Jesus – Son of Man, Son of God.

My Father's House - Luke 2:41-52



It's Epiphany 2024, Our Christmas Worship Celebration is over. Wait! That's not right... Our Christmas Celebration has begun! We have now come into another calendar year of celebrating & worshipping Christ's Incarnation! We have just shy of a whole year of celebration left, before we begin our rejoicing again! That is, unless Christ returns first. Either way, we've now begun the part of the church year where

we look deeply at Jesus own life here on earth, from His meager beginning to His Glorious Resurrection & Ascension, including that time Mary & Joseph lost Him for a few days.

Time & time again I've heard a story told by many parents: How they lost their child! Almost every parent has had the experience of losing track of *at least* one child. You take your eye off them for a second at the mall or in the grocery store, suddenly *poof!* they're gone. The panic a parent feels when a child goes missing even for a few seconds is real. I've experienced this myself with Kessidy, my own parental instinct kicking into overdrive as I franticly searched for her. Each time I've heard such a story, at the point when the child is finally found, the parents often said they didn't know whether to hug them or scold them, and they often did both! They do it out of their great love for their child. As parents, we are overjoyed & relieved to know everything is okay. Whether you've been in the situation before or not, I bet you can imagine the fright & feeling of your son or daughter vanishing.

With this in mind *Please read Luke 2:41-52...*

Now, having imagined such an experience in your mind, you can imagine how Mary & Joseph felt when they lost track of the very Son of God, not for just a few minutes, but for 3-days! They had journeyed to Passover Feast in Jerusalem with 12-year-old Jesus, and were on their journey home, yet without them knowing, Jesus remained in Jerusalem. Now, they would have traveled in large groups of many relatives, and they most likely expected Jesus must be walking along with His cousins or other relatives, so they probably wouldn't have seen the need to check on him until they had gone a day's journey. 3-days later, they find Jesus back in Jerusalem. Of all the things to wonder had happened to him, where he was, what he was doing... He was in His temple, among the teachers, amazing them with His wisdom. Their 12-yearold son was in the temple, sitting among the teachers, and HE was amazing them with his wisdom. Mary's reaction is understandable, given the circumstances. "Son, why have you treated us so? Behold, your father and I have been searching for you in great distress." And here is where we want to pay very close attention: Jesus answers her, respectfully saying: "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" These are Jesus' first words as recorded in the Gospel of Luke, and they are bursting with meaning. They tell us about who Jesus is, as well as the work that He came to do. Mary had said, perhaps without realizing it, that she & his father had been looking for him. Jesus gently reminds Mary, and the readers of Luke's Gospel, that His true Father is His heavenly Father.

These words reinforce what was taught earlier in Luke's Gospel, that the child born to Mary is the "Son of the Most High," who "increased in wisdom and stature." As true God, Jesus certainly is all-knowing, yet this was not true of His human nature by itself. As true Man, our Lord Jesus Christ could grow, increasing in wisdom even as He could feel heat & cold, hunger & thirst, even sleep, just like every one of us. He was "made like his brothers in every respect, so that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest."

Not only do we learn something about Jesus' Divine Nature, but we also learn from these words something about the work He came to do for us as the Christ. "I must be in my Father's house." Already at the age of 12, Jesus understood His role & purpose in this world: He has come to do the will of His Father, to be about His Father's business. And that means being in Jerusalem, being in the Temple, and eventually returning to Jerusalem to become the true Passover Lamb for us, to die on the cross to save us from our sins, to become a sacrifice for the sins of the whole world, and then rise again from the dead. He became man in order that He might suffer His Father's wrath in our place. His purpose in coming was not to be served but to serve up His life as a ransom for many. His words, "I must be in his Father's house," are packed with meaning. Mary & Joseph didn't yet understand what Jesus meant by being in His Father's house. But one day, they &

Jesus' Disciples would understand, and their testimony would change the world. At age 12, Jesus was already moving toward saving us. Christ's words & deeds were constantly met with misunderstanding. Yet there is a lot of confusion & misunderstanding about Jesus today, even among Christians, even with us! Are we any different than Mary & Joseph or Jesus' disciples?

Our misunderstanding of Christ's words comes not because His Word is unclear but one of the many effects of sin. We tend to think of sin only as a moral blot on our souls, yet sin has also darkened our minds & our ability to perceive & comprehend spiritual things. St. Paul alludes to this when he says that sinful man cannot perceive the things of the Spirit of God. The entire world suffers from this malady. For this reason, it is necessary for Christ to open our eyes & enlighten our minds. It is necessary for Christ to give us what we are lacking by nature: the wisdom of His cross, a stumbling block to the Jews, foolishness to the Gentiles. This wisdom shows the wise as fools, teaching that man is counted righteous before God, not because of himself, but righteousness attained only through faith in Christ Jesus, won for us on Calvary.

To use St. John's language, in our baptism, we have been "born not by the will of man, nor of the will of the flesh, but of God." Only when God grants us this wisdom of the cross can we find joy amidst suffering, strength in times of weakness, and life even in the face of death. If anyone is baptized, he has been given the Holy Spirit and is made an heir with Christ of the Kingdom of God. Like the disciples who were gathered in Emmaus on the evening of Christ's resurrection, your eyes have been opened by the Spirit of Christ. He whom the world knows not has been made known to you! To know Christ as your Redeemer & Savior from sins is to have wisdom beyond worldly comprehension, for it came not from man or from flesh, but from God. This wisdom equips you to face the challenges & difficulties that come your way this new year and always as you grasp hold of the gifts God has given and continues to give to you. And much like a garden, our souls need constantly to be nourished by the spiritual dew that is God's Word. We are wise to take every opportunity to study & hear God's Word.


Our Church offers many opportunities to grow in the knowledge of Christ. Remember, Christ Himself "grew in wisdom and stature!" I've been an LCMS Lutheran for over 38 years; I had 4 years of Seminary, including Vicarage, and I have now been a pastor for almost 8 years! Does that make me Learn-ed enough? Not by a long shot! And I should hope not. I pray that I am always growing in the Lord's knowledge & wisdom. Even Jesus went to His Father's house, listened to the teachers & discussed God's Word with them.

We don't need to ask, "Where is Jesus today?" or wonder if we must search for Him far and wide. We need not live in fear and distress like a parent who has lost their child. He is with us always, each & every day, strengthening us in Himself, reminding us through our Baptism & the Lord's Supper that we are His. Without Him, we are truly helpless, troubled & turmoiled until we find Him where He *always* promises to be present among us: in His Word, on His altar & in His Font. He is the Gift that continues to be given to us all year round. Jesus, Immanuel, is with us each & every day! Merry Christmas AND Happy New Year! Prayer: Heavenly Father, our souls are truly restless until they rest in Jesus. Our minds are darkened until they are enlightened & renewed by His Spirit. Our consciences & hearts are troubled until they are absolved & forgiven in His blood. We pray for your peace that passes all understanding. We pray that you would grant us your wisdom, wisdom not of this world but that only comes down from above. Heavenly Father, grant us these in the name of and for the sake of your Son Jesus. Amen.

Stewards of Humanity

Parents, and at times grandparents, are to be good stewards of the children God has placed in their care. **Katy Faust,** founder and director of the children's rights organization *Them Before Us* and author of <u>Raising Conservative Kids</u> in a <u>Woke City</u>, available from Issues Etc., carefully expresses how to carry out this responsibility.

Visit helping-children-resist-progressive-indoctrination-katy-faust-9-21-23/ to gain insight in a down-to-earth, informative podcast. Parents and guardians must live out the values they wish to instill in the young, being mirrors that reflect God-revering habits, providing the support system that youth can rely on to listen when they question what the world around them conspires in contradicting their conservative thinking and training.

The Rev. Dr. Espinosa, author of <u>Faith That Shines in the Culture</u>, conveys this thought by writing, "As Christians, we understand this truism demonstrating that what we receive will lead to the reflection of what is now ours. We are like that stone splashing in the middle of a pond, causing the radiation of concentric circles upon the water. The pond that receives the stone must reflect what has entered it. Similarly, Christians have received Christ, so we don't go out into the world, only representing ourselves. Because we have received Christ, we now represent and reflect His entire Church and, more importantly, the fact that Christ is not just for Christians but for all people in the entire world. This pattern is inevitable, whether we like it or not. Indeed, there really isn't anyone who is an island unto themselves. What we are, impacts other people—either positively or negatively."

". . . parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life. Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this because everything we have — whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time — is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes." \(^1\)

As members of the Church, may the ripples we send out in our lives, positively impact all who are observing as we represent not only ourselves but Christ to our families, friends, and fellow workers.

We Are God's Fellow Workers

In the next couple of months, we will begin our stewardship emphasis titled **Fellow Workers on God's Team**. The theme verse is found in the Apostle Paul's first letter to the Corinthians when he speaks about the division in the church regarding whose style of leadership the people would follow. The people were arguing over whom they would follow. Paul used an agricultural metaphor to exhort the church to unity. In this metaphor, some were choosing to follow Paul, who planted, and some Apollos, who watered. Paul tells them that only God makes things grow, so only He should be glorified and worshipped, not mere men. Paul goes on to say, "For we are God's fellow workers. You are God's field, God's building" (1 Corinthians 3:9).

Just as Paul and Apollos were God's fellow workers, He wants us to be His fellow workers. God uses trustworthy, faithful people who are willing to commit their time, talents, and money to participate in His eternal plan. As God's fellow workers, our lives rise to a whole new level of significance.

Through our own initiatives, we are not able to become God's fellow workers. It is the work of the Holy Spirit Who sanctifies us so we might lead Godly lives as His workers. In the words of the Apostle Paul, "You were washed, you were sanctified, you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and by the Spirit of our God" (1 Corinthians 6:11). Our spiritual lives depend entirely on the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit comes to us through God's Word and Sacraments. By abiding in Christ's Word and receiving His Sacraments, we abide in Him and He abides in us. His abiding in us empowers us to bear fruit as God's fellow workers.

After Jesus had miraculously fed the 5,000 with five loaves of bread and two small fish, the people who had eaten asked how they could do the work or be God's fellow workers for the Lord. They were surprised by the answer Jesus gave them which is found in John 6:29: "This is the work of the Lord, that you believe in Him Whom He has sent." God is at work within us. As long as we remain connected to Jesus through faith, we receive God's power. By grace, we understand that it is power given to us. Through our borrowed power, we are strong in Jesus.

May God use and empower us to be His fellow workers.

Re: VITALITY TASK FORCE: AN UPDATE

Our last meeting was composed of two sessions. Each building upon the other. After working through some "unfinished business" of Session 4: Core Values, the Task Force embarked on Sessions 5 & 6.

In Session 5, the Task Force fashioned a Purpose Statement based on what was uncovered in their work of identifying Active Core Values and Aspirational Core Values. You might recall that I had written last month that the Task Force evaluated 15 Core Values found in Lutheran congregations.

Of the 15, the Task Force identified Active Core Values. These are those that were easily identified in the current ministries of our congregation. Identified were the following:

Youth Ministry and Education, Outreach, Human Care / Mercy Work, Active Royal Priesthood, Christ-centered worship, Missions, Lutheran Doctrine, Christian Growth (Catechesis), Christian Marriage and Family, Church Worker Wellness, and Sanctity of Human Life

Interestingly enough, these are all represented in the Values Statement that was adopted by the congregation in 2011/2012.

After identifying the Active Core Values, the Task Force identified Aspirational Core Values. These are those that were desired but not readily identified in the ministries of our congregation. Identified were the following:

Christian Growth (Catechesis), Witness / Evangelism, Prayer, Sanctity of Human Life, Christian Marriage and Family, Whole-Life Stewardship, Active Royal Priesthood, Human Care / Mercy Work, Youth Ministry and Education

Note that there is some overlap. Even these Core Values are incorporated in the Values Statement of 2011/2012.

It is from this that a Purpose Statement was drafted. It reads as follows:

Peace Lutheran Church exists to make disciples of Jesus Christ by **reaching out**, **serving Jesus**, and **celebrating His love** to the Fox Valley and surrounding community through His Word and sacrament. Using God's gifts, we serve His Kingdom by **engaging our community** through outreach activities that include consistent Biblical worship experience, fellowship, and education.

It was suggested that this might become the new Purpose Statement in our Constitution and Bylaws, pending approval of the Voters Assembly at some time in the future.

After completing Session 5 and having drafted the Purpose Statement, the Task Force moved to evaluating/crafting a Mission Statement. This was the essence of Session 6. The Mission Statement was to summarize the Purpose Statement in as few words as possible: 7-10 words.

It was agreed that there was no need to propose a new Mission Statement. Therefore, our current Mission Statement will remain, "Reaching Out, Serving Jesus, Celebrating His Love".

At the next meeting, having completed many tasks already, the work will focus on drafting the Strategic Plan. Pray that the Lord will guide and give discernment for the advancement of His kingdom and the future ministry of our congregation. Pastor Schroeder



BEGINNING IN JANUARY 2024 - RE:VITALITY BIBLE STUDY This study will be offered beginning the week of Sunday, January 7. This will allow the mem-

A year that whispers Jesus

For author Nancy Tichy, a small holiday gift once sparked big-picture thoughts about Christian living. One December she received a kitchen towel with the message "I want a Christmas that whispers JESUS." That prompted thoughts of what it's like to have an entire year that whispers Jesus.

For starters, that involves daily quiet time, devotion and prayer. "Sometimes I wake with the thought of a person on my mind," writes Tichy. "I'm quiet with this impression, interceding for the family member or friend until it has lifted. Could this be a whisper from our Savior?"

Many other daily occurrences are "worthy of [Jesus'] whispered response of love," Tichy points out. That's true whether we're distracted by tasks and troubling thoughts or buoyed by encounters with contentment and joy. "For me," she writes, "whispering is part of intimacy, and that is what I want to make a hallmark of the coming year. I want closeness with our Savior that enables me to hear from him, even when he whispers."
