Peace Lutheran Church

"The Life of Christ" is the theme of the first "half" of the Church Year. It begins with the Season of Advent, and concludes with the Season of Advent. beginning of the Church Year, with the Season of Advent, and concludes with the Season of Easter. All of the Lessons celebrate the Life of Christ, the Head of the Church.

Over my many years of ministry as a pastor, I have relished our liturgical calendar and its related practices. Though a man-made tool, it guides us on a journey that is both purposeful and meaningful. It serves as an outline for the sake of celebration and instruction.

Last month, we looked at the season of Epiphany. This month, we look at the Season of Lent.

From my grade school days, the Lenten season made a major impact on me. Midweek Lenten services were very special for me. Not for the reason you may think. Especially impressed on me was COOKIES! There were always two services on Wednesday night. In between the services was COOKIES! We also were able to goof around in the gym, but all play needed to come to an end at 6:55 P.M. Because the noise would travel into the sanctuary, we were barred from any play.

As I grew older, the worship services and sermon series became more important to me. But there was still COOKIES! Over my many years of serving in the pastoral ministry, I have observed not only the decline of COOKIES, being replaced by fellowship meals, and the saddest, fewer families and, worse yet, fewer children in worship. This will have a major impact in the future, and I fear that Midweek Lenten services may simply just disappear. Children learn patterns in their formative years and carry them through as the grow older.

So much for an editorial.

Lent is a 40-day season and does not include Sundays. It is a somber season, and until most recent of times, the Hymn of Praise and Alleluia were omitted in the Sunday services.

Three major themes are a part of this season. Remembrance, Repentance, and Renewal. Each service incorporates these themes. We are called to ponder on the Lord's Passion as we remember the purpose for which Jesus came. The angels announced to the shepherds.. "Born to you this day in the City of David is the Savior, Christ the Lord."

The Season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, which sets the mood for the season. Being reminded of the fact that from "dust we came, and to dust we shall return." The balance of the season continues with lessons that address the reality of the need for Jesus' ministry and obedience.

The Lenten Season comes to an end with Palm Sunday, which is then followed by the shortest season – the Season of Holy Week.

The Lenten Season, for me, is no longer about COOKIES. It is about Jesus and His redemptive work that was lived out as a substitute for me. It is about being rescued from the wilderness of sin. It is about God's love and His plan of salvation being played out.

Consider attending the Midweek Lenten services, as well as the Sundays in Lent. Most importantly, bring the whole family! Finally, consider joining in the fellowship suppers. Most of the time, there are even COOKIES!

WHY Do We Exist?



Proverbs 3:5-6 reminds us to: "Trust in the LORD with all your heart and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways, acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths."

Tradition, for tradition's sake, is worthless. "Progress" for the sake of progress is madness. Everybody wants to have a healthy church, and virtually no one is walking around saying, "I hope my church dies a long, slow death due to inaction and ineffectiveness!" Yet, many churches today find themselves in decline. They see their numbers dwindling, and they hope that this exciting new thing, or that new program or ______, will be just what they need to get them going again. But then you ask people to serve or about the work of their Boards, and you hear crickets. You ask them about the last time any of them has invited someone to church, and you hear crickets. So how do so many churches find themselves in a position that none of them wants to be in? When is "who we are" as a church healthy, or when is "what we do" as a church healthy? What do you think is the #1 cause of healthy churches becoming unhealthy churches? (I'll give you a hint: it's not a lack of programs or church signs or screens or a praise band.) It's when there is a disconnect/separation between the "why?" of who we are and the "why?" of what we do.

St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 2:1-5: "And I, when I came to you, brothers, did not come proclaiming to you the testimony of God with lofty speech or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. And I was with you in weakness and in fear and much trembling, and my speech and my message were not in plausible words of wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power, that your faith might not rest in the wisdom of men but in the power of God."

The fact of the matter is the issues we face today are not so different from those of Luther's day, of St. Paul's Day, or of King Solomon's day. The issue of Christian complacency is *still* at large in the church, and ministry gets messy & tangled up when we pull away from one another rather than moving together in unity. Yet, we have no reason to worry or fear. We must look to Christ for our way forward. WHY does Peace Lutheran exist? Who are we? For the sake of the saving Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ! We at Peace Lutheran Church are to be focused primarily on spreading the saving Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ here in Neenah, WI. If you look at our website (*or our entry sign*, *bulletin cover*, *business cards*, *etc...*) under the "About Us" section – "Mission and Vision," you would see that the mission of Peace Lutheran Church is 3-fold: "Reaching Out, Serving Jesus, Celebrating His Love." We 'Reach Out' as our Lord has called each and every one of us to do in our Lord's Great Commission given in Matthew 28:19-20. We 'Serve Jesus' as we provide opportunities for members and visitors to study God's eternal Word and grow spiritually in their relationship with Jesus Christ, and we 'Celebrate His Love' as we come together for the fellowship and care of one another and our neighbor.

When you really think about it, these 3-focal points are <u>outward</u> reaching, yet if we look around today, we seem to be reaching more inward than outward. Does this mean that our Mission statement is in need of change? By No Means! Our mission as a church is in this 3-fold Ministry focus. What we seem to get hung up on is the fact that we do not begin with the question of 'why.' Instead, we easily get stuck on the 'What' of ministry, doing the same things but expecting different results.

There is one of two possible drivers for any given congregation: Vision or Structure. Vision is clear goals for the future, whereby we become intentional in our ministry by being reminded of 'why' we exist, with a plan for moving forward. Structure is not the church building but the bodies that oversee the ministry and programs within the church. When Vision is the driver, intentionality and relationships give purpose to the work of the church, and we become proactive in ministry. When Structure is the driver, we become preoccupied with programming and the question of 'what' we do, becoming reactive and slow to move forward as we await *the next crisis* to happen, and in turn, slow the movement of the church.

There are 3-questions every organization <u>must</u> answer to be able to grow dedicated members: <u>Why do we</u>

exist? How will we accomplish our mission?; What will we do to accomplish our mission? In this order, we focus on what is most important 1st and then how we accomplish our mission, rather than just doing what we've always done because I like it that way. Because in the 'Why' is the Gospel. In the 'Why' is Jesus. To not ask the question of 'Why' is to lose the very reason we exist in the 1st place, Jesus! This also leads to disunity, decreased effectiveness, undermines discipleship, and did I mention we lose Jesus! When the 'why?' of Jesus and His mission here at Peace is always at the center, we, in turn, become Christ-centered! This leads to increased unity, increased effectiveness, decreased fear, increased intentionality, increased coherence, and less individually driven.

So, we intentionally ask the question of 'why?' so that together, as a church family we move toward a deeper relationship with Jesus! But we must always be clear about *where* you & I encounter Jesus in a very real way: God's Word & Sacraments. Worship is to be the center, the 'hub' of who we are & what we do. Everything we do together in ministry flows from the sanctuary outward to the rest of the church, continuing into the community surrounding us.

To revitalize our congregation, we must be intentional about "who we are" & "what we do" as the hands & feet, as the very body of Christ. Let us walk together as a congregation that looks to Christ in all things, and let Him lead us to love one another as we seek the lost outside our walls, with Mission & Ministry as our focus. We are here to reach people with the Gospel, inviting and providing members and visitors alike with opportunities to grow in their relationship with their Savior. We, as the body of Christ, are focused on sharing His Word, Worshiping Him together, teaching the Faith through catechesis and Bible Study, and being good Stewards of the talents & treasures our Lord has given us. This is who Christ has created us to be! In Jesus' Holy Name. Amen.

Fellow Workers on God's Team



Our stewardship emphasis for this year is **Fellow Workers on God's Team**, which will start on the weekend of February 24 & 25 . The Apostle Paul wrote, "We are God's fellow workers" (1 Corinthians 3:9). Through Paul, God was telling the people in Corinth that they had the honor and privilege to work with Him as important participants in His mission. In the same way, God makes us His fellow workers on His team. Even though we are undeserving and have nothing to offer, God, in His sovereignty, chooses us to be His vessels through

which He will accomplish His purposes. As God's fellow workers, we become His hands, feet, and mouth to the world.

God does not schedule tryouts for those He selects to be on His team. He isn't seeking the most talented, the most powerful, or the most attractive. He invites and encourages everyone to be part of His team. The people who become part of God's team vary in appearance, in gifts, in stations of life, and other ways. Although God's team is made up of people who are different in some ways, the one common factor is that they are all new creations with transformed hearts (2 Corinthians 5:17). Through the work of the Holy Spirit, they have become people of faith who see God as their greatest treasure. Faithfulness is a top priority as a fellow worker with God. Through faith, we commit and are energized to serve God by serving others. What we do with our time, talents, and money gives evidence to which team we belong.

In God's Word, we find examples of people who were not eager always to be fellow workers on God's team. Moses gave numerous excuses that God shouldn't use him to lead the Israelites out of the Egyptian captivity. Saul hid! David felt unqualified to be king. God caused Jonah to be swallowed by a fish in order to get him on His team. God didn't give up on these people. He chose and equipped each of them to be a fellow worker on His team.

God blesses each of us with the privilege to be a fellow worker on His team. Whether we willingly join or are at first resistant, we are now participants in God's mission to help others "to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Timothy 2:4). God uses ordinary people like us to do extraordinary things. We pray that this emphasis will encourage us all to be **Fellow Workers on God's Team.**

The Chief Stewards of Humanity: Mom and Dad

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39). The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin that stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?

The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life.

Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this, because everything we have — whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time — is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes.¹

MIDWEEK LENTEN, HOLY WEEK, AND EASTER SERVICES 2024 OVERALL THEME: The Book of Exodus: "Let My People Go!"

This year, Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 14th, and so does our emphasis on the Book of Moses called Exodus. In it, Moses asks Pharaoh to let God's people go seven times (Exodus 5:1; 7:16; 8:1, 20; 9:1, 13; 10:3) and Pharaoh finally does it! When He does, God's salvation is so amazing that the event becomes the Gospel of the Old Testament. Israel's Scriptures mention the exodus 125 times!

Throughout the book of Exodus, God reveals who He is through His absence and His presence, through His silence and His speech, through His wrath and His mercy, and through His judgment and His amazing grace. 
