

February 2023-Recreational Outrage

While the month of February is traditionally reserved for Valentine's Day, chocolate hearts & kisses, flowers, or... snow (I'm learning that here in AR, snowfall tends to happen around this time of year), I'm going to spend a moment with you on a topic that seems to be more and more prevalent (And not just at this time of year): Anger. I have my own term for the kind of anger I am talking about — I call it "Recreational Outrage." I'll define it thus: When you derive enjoyment in being angry about or complaining about something.

How does this "Recreational Outrage" (as I have called it) find its way into our daily lives? It's simple if you start to pay attention to the seemingly mundane acts of your typical day: E.g. I get impatient with the car in front of me who is driving too slow when I am late, so I mutter under my breath at their "incompetence" and their lack of driving prowess (forgetting my lateness is the true cause of my impatience). Or maybe I hear a story on the news detailing something that has happened in a far-off somewhere. It

may not directly affect me, nor can I do anything about it, but I carry it with me and even tell others about how it upsets me. Or I look for mistakes that other people make, either sharing them directly with the person or telling others about it. While it may not look "enjoyable" on the outside, somewhere deep down inside, you derive a twisted "recreation" or "joy" from this type of anger.

Now, I realize that for every finger pointing at someone else, there are at least three pointing back at you – and this is one of the reasons why I think it is an appropriate topic. I struggle with my own anger. That might surprise you to know, and sometimes I do my best to keep it to myself. But other times I cannot hide it and it rears its ugly head. The sad truth is that it is a part of me because I am a sinner.

Equally and even more true are the words of Jesus in Matthew 5:21–22 ²¹ You have heard that it was said to those of old, "You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment." ²² But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, "You fool!" will be liable to the hell of fire. Do you realize the depth of what Jesus is saying here? Jesus is equating our anger to murder, which means we are liable to His end-time judgement! This is serious business, folks!

Luther took up this issue in The Large Catechism: Fifth Commandment (You Shall Not Kill) when he penned these appropriate words: "The cause and need of this commandment is that God well knows that the world is evil (Galatians 1:4), and that this life has much unhappiness... For example, when your neighbor sees that you have a better house and home, a larger family and more fertile fields, greater possessions and fortune from God that he does, he gets in a bad mood, envies you, and speaks no good of you. So by the devil's encouragement you will get many enemies who cannot bear to see you have any good, either bodily or spiritual. When we see such people, our hearts also would like to rage and bleed and take vengeance. Then there arise cursing and blows. From them misery and murder finally come."

You see where the anger comes from, don't you? It happens out of envy, misery, and jealousy. It comes from within our fallen, sinful nature and ultimately it comes because YOU want to be the God and if it isn't YOUR way, it's wrong. This, then, is a violation of the First Commandment, and shows us quickly of how far we have fallen from our God and His righteous expectations of us. God expects us to **Be kind**

to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you (Ephesians 4:32). He even goes so far as to tell a parable about what happens when you fail to forgive as you have been forgiven (see Matthew 18:23-34). [Hint]: You don't have a part in the kingdom and you are delivered over to the jailers!

In his Bible Study The Myth of Righteous Anger: What the Bible Says About Human Anger, Rev. Dr. Jeffrey Gibbs summarizes this problem when he writes: "The Bible, and especially the New Testament, teaches straightforwardly that human anger is a common and dangerous reality in our lives. That is the dominant message, and it should be the dominant way that Christians think about their anger. This means that, if American society currently extols 'outrage' and admires those who speak out of anger and who speak with angry words and insults, then believers must reject that cultural value. responsibility to stand out and be different, as salt and light." And that is my encouragement to you: Stand out. Be different. Be salt & light. Refuse to be tempted to find your "joy" in another person's fault or in your own personal outrage. Imagine how pleasant that would be!

Stories behind Our Favorite Hymns

The author of Praise the Almighty, our Hymn of the Month, is Johann Daniel Hernschmidt. He was born in 1675 in Germany. He went to the University and in the Spring of 1702 became assistant to his father, a Town preacher. In 1712 he obtained a divinity degree and became a superintendent and court preacher. Later, he was appointed as a Professor of Theology at the University. Johann died in 1723 at only 48 years old. Most of Johann's hymns were written during his first residence at the University.

Praise the Almighty was translated into English by Alfred Brauer, a Concordia Theological Seminary (Springfield, IL) graduate (1890).

Johann's hymns are Scriptural and mirror his inner life. This hymn is described as a 'psalm paraphrase". You will note how the verses of this hymn parallel the verses of Psalm 146.


Praise the Almighty

FOOD PANTRY REPORT FOR FEBRUARY NEWSLETTER



Monthly Update for December 2022

We served 48 families in two weeks in December of which 13 were new families. There were 34 children under the age of 18; 59 adults from the age of 19 to 64; and 12 senior citizens for a total of 105 individuals.

Total expenses for December were \$1,278.85.

We continue to need paper sacks more than the plastic bags right now. If you should shop at Harp's or Town and Country, you can ask them to bag your groceries in a paper sack. You can drop them off in the box in the narthex.

We handed out 36 holiday bags which included the fixings for a holiday meal to our clients in December. A total of 127 holiday bags were handed out in November and December.

Our YTD totals for 2022: 808 families were served with 250 being new clients to us last year. Total individuals served were 1,813. There were 526 children; 1,113 adults (19-64); and 60 senior citizens.

Our YTD expense total: \$19,186.68.

We handed out 1,813 bags to clients roughly valued at \$22,645.82 and 127 holiday bags totaling \$2,371.09 for a total of \$25,016.91.

Thank you all for the monetary donations and/or all the food donations. Please continue with these donations, as it is greatly needed and appreciated.




All of these elements are presented to "remind you of God's love..., fill you with hope and increase your joy, knowing we are His baptized children." *


Our Garage Sale will be held on May 5th and 6th.


