




From Pastor Kevin McReynolds



(John 1:1, 14) ¹In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ¹⁴And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth.

The Christmas celebrations are behind us, the New Year has been celebrated, everyone has returned to life as "normal" before the holy days of the holidays. But something is different. Or at least, it should be. The Word was made flesh. Baby Jesus was born. And He dwells among us.

Note how I wrote that? "He <u>dwells</u> among us." I didn't say "dwelt" as in past tense. This is what is such a big deal about God's promise. The promise of **Isaiah 7:14** and **Matthew 1:23** is fulfilled: The virgin has conceived and bore a Son whose name is Immanuel ("God with us" from the Hebrew language). God is STILL with us. God STILL talks to us. God is STILL present with us – and Yes, Virginia, God is STILL Immanuel.

God speaks to us through His Word and through His servants like me. In fact, my whole Calling into the Office of Holy Ministry is for the purpose of making you aware that God is still Immanuel, God is still with us. Through me, God still speaks to you His Word of Law & Gospel. Through me, God still gives to you all of Himself – through the preached Word and in the Sacraments, God still comes to be with you. In a

pastor's sermon, the very Word of God is delivered to you from a pulpit. In a Liturgy, in songs and Psalmody, and through literally all the elements of Divine Worship, God comes to you – on the regular (if you are regularly participating in Worship). In Holy Baptism, God gives you His Holy Spirit who works faith in Him. But you don't get baptized unless God's servant does the baptizing. Similarly, you get to eat and drink the very Body and Blood of Jesus in the Lord's Supper unless God's servant is delivering those gifts to you. And in and through it all? God is here – dwelling with you, present with you, *Immanuel-ing* with you.


Yet, like Santa Claus, some would question the very existence of God. Some would wonder if God has gone silent on us, no longer speaking to us as He did of old. Some, nowadays, would deny that God uses the ordinary means of His Church to speak His Words of Law & Gospel. Those who think this way would do well to hear God speak to them right out of His Word in (Hebrews 13:7–8) ⁷ Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith.
⁸ Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.

Nothing has changed. Jesus – Immanuel – hasn't changed. And the means by which Jesus comes to you hasn't changed. I hope to see you in this new year receiving all the gifts our God gives through His Church – especially His Immanuel.

Monthly Update for November 2023

We served 134 families in November of which 35 were new families. There were 72 children under the age of 18; 182 adults from the age of 19 to 64; and 19 senior citizens for a total of 273 individuals.

Total expenses for November were \$4,809.42.

The donations for November were \$1,977.25.

We continue to need paper sacks. Thank you to those who have brought us paper sacks this last month. It is very helpful. We are still collecting plastic bags.

If you should shop at Harp's or Town and Country, you can ask them to bag your groceries in a paper sack. You can drop them off in the box in the narthex.

Hymn of the Month

Our January Hymn of the Month is "As with Gladness Men of Old." The text for this hymn was written by William C. Dix (1837–98) in either 1858 or 1859 when he was 20-21 years old. Dix was recovering from a fairly serious illness and on the day of the Epiphany, he read the Gospel for the festival day (Matthew 2:1-12) which tells the story of the visit of the Magi. He then sat down and wrote the this hymn, finishing it by evening.

Dix, a layman and the son of an English surgeon, was well-educated and a marine insurance agent by profession. Due to his sickness, he knew well of the possibility of human tragedy, loss, and now his own mortality. Just as the Wise Men were led by a star to Jesus, Dix was led in illness to his Lord by the Epiphany Gospel. This hymn speaks of the hope we have both here and hereafter.

The first three stanzas are carefully constructed with the poetic balance of "as" and "so". This relationship mirrors past scriptural events with the present desired result. In stanza 1, Dix writes: "As with Gladness men of old...As with joy they hailed its light...So, most gracious Lord, may we evermore be led by Thee." Stanzas 4 and 5 are petitions which pray that all Christians be kept on life's journey in "the narrow way" (stanza 4), the way that leads to eternal life. Stanza 5 rejoices in praise and adoration in the light of the King, just as John writes in the book of Revelation 21:23: "And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and its lamp is the Lamb."

- 1 As with gladness men of old Did the guiding star behold; As with joy they hailed its light, Leading onward, beaming bright; So, most gracious Lord, may we Evermore be led by Thee.
- 2 As with joyful steps they sped, Savior, to Thy lowly bed, There to bend the knee before Thee, whom heav'n and earth adore; So may we with willing feet Ever seek Thy mercy seat.
- 3 As they offered gifts most rare
 At Thy cradle, rude and bare,
 So may we with holy joy,
 Pure and free from sin's alloy,
 All our costliest treasures bring,
 Christ, to Thee, our heav'nly King.
- 4 Holy Jesus, ev'ry day
 Keep us in the narrow way;
 And when earthly things are past,
 Bring our ransomed souls at last
 Where they need no star to guide,
 Where no clouds Thy glory hide.
- 5 In the heav'nly country bright
 Need they no created light;
 Thou its light, its joy, its crown,
 Thou its sun which goes not down;
 There forever may we sing
 Alleluias to our King.






Odyssey Children's Sunday School




Monday Morning Bible Study
