From Pastor Kevin McReynolds



John 13:34 [Jesus said]: A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another.

John 15:12 [Jesus said]: This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you.

John 15:17 [Jesus said]: These things I command you, so that you will love one another.

Romans 12:10 Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor.

- 1 Thessalonians 4:9 Now concerning brotherly love you have no need for anyone to write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another...
- 1 Peter 1:22 Having purified your souls by your obedience to the truth for a sincere brotherly love, love one another earnestly from a pure heart...

1 John 3:11 For this is the message that you have heard from the beginning, that we should love one another.

1 John 3:23 And this is his commandment, that we believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us.

Well, it couldn't be clearer as we examine the New Testament. This isn't even an exhaustive list of the passages where Christians are exhorted to "love one another." Jesus, Paul, Peter, and John all concur that the primary way we show forth that we are Christians is by the way we love one another. (They will know we are Christians by our love, by our love... you remember the song sung around the campfire like I do, don't you?)

It's really the perfect month *to be reminded* of this truth, but also *to live in* this truth. After all, we celebrate love on Valentine's Day in February on the 14th! The words from Scripture printed above remind us of the teachings from the Bible, and my part as your pastor is to encourage you all to *live* in this truth!

But how? How do you *live* love? Let me begin with a simple reminder, and then I'll follow that up with a simple rule of thumb. First, the reminder: Jesus taught (*by means of a parable*) what it means to belong to the Kingdom of God in **Matthew 25:40** [Jesus said]: ...Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me. In other words, we need to be reminded that the measure we use with others is akin to the measure we use with Jesus Himself. Thus, if I show love to my neighbor in some way, it is as if I have shown love to Jesus Himself. You say you're a follower of Christ? Then it will naturally follow that you will be a servant of your neighbor! Loving Christ = loving your neighbor. They are the same thing.

This opens the door for all kinds of acts of love and service towards our neighbor: e.g. sharing from your abundance (see Matt. 3:4 and note: Jesus said "WHEN you give..."), helping them during a time of need (see Acts 20:35, Titus 3:14), forgiving them when they sin against you (see Matt. 6:14, Col. 3:13), speaking truthfully with them (see Eph. 4:15, 25), or ministering to them in any way (see Matt. 25:31-46).

With all of that in mind, here is my rule of thumb: do *the OPPOSITE* of what you want to do. St. Paul teaches us in **Rom. 7:15-20** that, while this all may sound good to us, our spirit is willing, but our flesh is weak. By teaching you to do the opposite of what you want to do, we only acknowledge the weakness of our sinful flesh.

Let's use the examples I listed above as a test case: How many of you really WANT to share from your abundance? Isn't it hard enough to take care of yourself, let alone care for someone else during their time of need? And why should you forgive that person after what they did to you first? You know, sometimes, things are better left unsaid (like the truth)! And finally, when it comes to ministering to the needs of others, isn't that why we have a MINISTER?! From these examples, you can understand the exhortation: Do the OPPOSITE of what your inclination is and you're more likely to do as God has taught!

All of this can serve to set the stage for a potential opportunity that exists for Redeemer Lutheran at this time. As we seek to answer the question, "How can we live lives of love towards our neighbor?" we must look at the present circumstances of our congregation (and possibly seek to do the opposite of what we are presently doing!). One issue that seems to be continually presenting itself is needs connected to the aging of our members. Recognizing that many have moved to Mountain Home for retirement, it is true that many next of kin live elsewhere around the country. In my few years here at Redeemer, we have had several elderly members move away to be nearer to their children. Often times, they end up living in places where they don't know anyone apart from their own family and they find themselves "starting over" as they adjust to their new communities. Others, who have elected to stay here, have struggled with making decisions regarding their wills, planning for their healthcare future, or finding a local personal contact in case they need help. What if our older members had someone local who could assist them if they were to stay here? What if someone could give oversight, be in contact, or give of their time as they served and loved those members of our church? Wouldn't it be nice if there was someone who could offer regular contact to those members who are suffering – sometimes in silence?

While I have observed the members of Redeemer have been particularly good about caring for one another, I have been considering the addition of a new called staff position at Redeemer: A Deaconess for Human Care. LCMS deaconesses are women who are professional church-workers, trained to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through works of mercy, spiritual care, and teaching the Christian faith. "Deaconess," from the Greek word *diakonos*, means "servant."

This is not a new consideration. Only a little over a year ago, we considered the possibility of seeking a Deaconess with specialized training in Counseling. While we came up short on that search, the more recent needs of the members of Redeemer have caused me to re-consider, along with the Mission & Ministry Council, the possibility of examining this position once again.

If a Called Deaconess were on staff, she could serve human care needs for our members like homebound visitation ministry and Bible study, she could serve as a local personal contact for our members (so that when family members call, they have someone who is personally aware of their parent / grandparent's needs). She could provide transportation for single and widowed members to doctor and hospital visits, or even act (if asked to do so) as medical Power of Attorney. If we could find a candidate who also came with the counseling licensure component, that would only serve to strengthen the potential loving service this Deaconess could provide. These are just a few of the many possibilities this role could fill in showing love to our members as well as our community!

I would love (!) to have some feedback from you as members of Redeemer. Is this a way that we, as a congregation, could love and serve our neighbor? By putting value on carrying a full-time called staff position responsible for human care? I think it is! Please don't hesitate to contact me to share your thoughts. I'd relish the opportunity to visit with you!



FOOD PANTRY REPORT FOR NEWSLETTER

Monthly Update for December 2023

We served 101 families in December of which 22 were new families. There were 55 children under the age of 18; 141 adults from the age of 19 to 64; and 26 senior citizens for a total of 222 individuals.

Total expenses for December were \$3,880.78.

The donations for December were \$3,394.34.

We made 175 Holiday Bags to be given either for Thanksgiving or Christmas, but not both. We handed out 168 bags between the two months and had 7 bags left over. The holiday bag consisted of everything to make a holiday meal. (Mashed potatoes, candied yams, stuffing mix, cranberry sauce, items to make green bean casserole and a pumpkin pie. Gave out 81 whole chickens that we received free from the Realtors Association in November. When chickens were gone we gave out 87 vouchers for \$9 at Town and Country towards a turkey, chicken, or ham. Each holiday bag was valued at \$11.33 with 87 of them valued at \$20.33 (with the \$9 voucher). This is the explanation for the increase in spending these past two months, other than the increase of clients each month.

Here is a summary of the year 2023:

The total expenses for the year are \$31,203.27. The total monetary donations for 2023 are \$18,427.84. We saw a total of 1,168 families with 248 of these being new families. Individual breakdown is 660 children under the age of 18; 1,510 adults between the ages of 19 to 64 and 253 senior citizens over the age of 65 for a total of 2,423 individuals served in the year 2023. We continue to need paper sacks.

Thank you to those who have brought us paper sacks this last month. It is very helpful. We are still collecting plastic bags.

If you should shop at Harp's or Town and Country, you can ask them to bag your groceries in a paper sack. You can drop them off in the box in the narthex.

If anyone is interested in volunteering to help distribute or shop for our Food Pantry, please contact me, Linda Templeton at 870-421-3503.

Thank you all for the monetary donations and/or all the food donations. I hope the chart with the items we hand out helps those that would like to donate food items. The past eight months were great with the congregation's donations of food. Please continue with these donations, as it is greatly needed and appreciated.

Hymn of the Month

Our February Hymn of the Month is "My Song is Love Unknown." This text originates from 17th-century English poet Samuel Crossman, a priest in the Anglican church. He was inspired to pen this text by the great poet George Herbert, specifically his works Love Unknown and The Sacrifice. While Herbert focused more on the Gospel message in his poems, Crossman chose to explore the "love unknown" that Christ portrayed for us on the cross.

Why is this love unknown? While Christ's love can be unknown to those who do not know Him, it is precisely His love that we do know that Crossman writes about. It is unknown because we cannot begin to comprehend this love that God has for the very people that crucified Him. He shows "love to the loveless" so that they might be lovely. He came to bestow salvation, yet people were "made strange" and "none the longed-for Christ would know." Sometimes they would welcome Him with loud hosannas and palms, other times they rejected Christ, ultimately crucifying Him on a cross. Jesus knows what pain and suffering is before him, yet he *cheerfully* goes forth in order that his foes might be saved from their own sinful actions. "Never was love, dear King, never was grief like Thine."

This love, unknown and unfathomable, is not just for sinners then, but for us today. Crossman writes from the position of the "loveless" sinner so that all who read and sing this text see Christ's love from a first-person perspective. "Oh, who am I, that for my sake my Lord should take frail flesh and die?" Christ died *your* death and was buried in *your* tomb so that *your* sins would be forgiven in full. Knowing this loving sacrifice, we respond: "This is my friend, in whose sweet praise I all my days could gladly spend!"





LUTHER'S SMALL CATECHISM

Martin Luther had this to say about "The Small Catechism", a book that he wrote, "But for myself I say this: I am also a doctor and preacher, yes, as learned and experienced as all the people who have such assumptions and contentment. Yet I act as a child who is being taught the catechism. Every morning — and whenever I have time — I read and say, word for word, the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, the Psalms, and such. I must still read and study them daily. Yet I cannot master the catechism as I wish. But I must remain a child and pupil of the catechism, and am glad to remain so" (Large Catechism, Longer Preface, 7–8). The president of the LCMS, Dr. Matthew Harrison, wrote this new



year's resolution in the January 2024 Reporter, "Let this be the year we all return to being pupils of the catechism. Let us commit to learning the text of the Six Chief Parts by heart, to pray them and confess them to one another. Let us spend time daily in study of the explanation questions and answers. Let us ground and root ourselves, our families and our congregations deeply in the boundless treasures in these simple, foundational truths." To help you in your study of the six chief parts of Luther's Small Catechism I am teaching a ten week class on the catechism on Sunday mornings from 9:45 – 10:45. This class will be offered three times throughout the year. Therefore you can join at any time. You can attend whatever class session you want in the next series of classes to make up the class sessions that you missed. I invite you to join us and experience the joy of learning these foundational truths. In our church office we have the 2017 version of Luther's Small Catechism available for sale for the same price as you can find it on cph.org which is \$20. We also have a devotion guide available to help you in using the small catechism as a daily tool.


Odyssey Children's Sunday School


New Sunday Morning Bible Study
