MIDWEEK LENT WORSHIP


On Lent & Christian Freedom: Easter celebrates the chief event in the life of Christ and was the major celebration among early Christians. However, Easter required a season of preparation. The 40-day preparation prescribed for Baptismal candidates into the Church became known as "Lent" from the Latin word for "Spring." In AD 329, Bishop Athanasius asked his congregations to observe a 40-day fast, and in the 5th Century, Pope Leo the Great explained that "Lent was appointed to prepare souls for a fruitful commemoration of the mystery of Easter, as a time of purification and sanctification, of penance for sins past, of breaking off of sinful habits, the exercise of virtues, almsgiving, reconciliation, and the laying aside of enmity and hatred." As a penitential and reverent season, the use of praise hymns and phrases are withheld from our worship, preferring instead to especially focus on our fall from God's favor.

As much as we focus on our fall from God, we should focus even more on the Freedom God has won for us in Christ.

During Lent, we will focus our attention on Martin Luther's meditations on the Freedom of a Christian written during his lifetime. Dr. Martin Luther and Philip Melancthon's writings collected in the book <u>Christian Freedom: Faith Working Through Love</u> (Saint Louis, Missouri, CPH, 2011) will serve as the basis for our Lenten series.

We worship using the order of Vespers in Lutheran Service Book (p. 229). ("Vespers" is from the Latin word "Evening" coincided with the Roman division of the four watches of the night.) St. Benedict of Nursia (AD 480-583) determined his monks should practice a daily routine of "ora et labora" ("pray and work"). Between the hours of 6PM and 9PM we celebrate the service of Vespers, then, with a nod to history. Vespers was faithfully attended by the laity of many communities as a part of their devotional piety and Spiritual nurture into Luther's day and even down to today.¹




Collect of the Day
