From Pastor Kevin McReynolds



As I write this article, I am sitting in the calm before the storm. It is the week before Holy Week and the busy-ness and business of the biggest week in the Church calendar lies ahead of me. I still have services to prepare, sermons to write, meetings to hold, and visits to be made. I know that I stand at the precipice of what is the peak of my annual schedule. It's daunting to me in the fact that I know what I need to do and yet, I haven't had the time to fully prepare yet. At this stage of the game, I'm empty.

I mean that on several levels: First is that I don't have the things prepared yet for the coming Holy Week and Easter. This is a matter of simple pragmatics: I have to prepare them and there's only so much time before they are upon me. The work will be done. On another level, there must be some fountain of creativity to draw from to prepare these materials. But mine feels empty at the moment. Which leads to a third form of emptiness: the feeling of failure that comes from not "having it all together." There is no shortage of other various ways the feeling of emptiness manifests itself that I won't go into in this article, either.

Am I alone in this? By even asking that question, it reveals still more emptiness within me!

This is why I *need* what is around the corner waiting for me in Holy Week. If you can relate (*even only a little bit*), you *need* Holy Week, too! Because it's all too easy to be overwhelmed, to feel as if your well has run dry, or to feel as if you are the only one.

But by the time this article goes to print, Holy Week will be over, our Easter celebration will have happened, and it will all be another Holy Holiday behind us. I suppose this sounds a little, well, *empty*. But not if you are paying attention. That emptying out happened in Christ. St. Paul puts it this way:

⁵ Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, ⁶ who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, ⁷ but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. ⁸ And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. ⁹ Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. (Philippians 2:5–11)

Jesus emptied Himself – He gave all that He was and all that He had – as a living sacrifice for people who are empty like you and me. When we feel like we have nothing left to give, we can trust that Jesus was sent to fill us up. He fills us with hope in a future that is secure, a future that has only eternal bliss and joy in the company of our master. Salvation is the gift and a reunion with our Creator is the goal of our faith. The feeling of emptiness and separation has been defeated by Christ and we can trust in what it means for us: life everlasting in the company of our God. Who could call themselves empty with this kind of a future in store? St. John reveals it to us this way in

Revelation 21:1-4:

¹ Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. ² And I saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. ³ And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. ⁴ He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away."

As I finish preparations for Holy Week (*and know that you won't see this until after Holy Week*), I am praying that the feast of God's Word I am preparing will fill you and me up so that we would no longer be empty – to the Glory of God the Father.

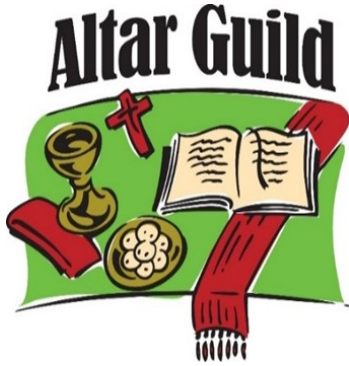

Monthly Update for February 2024

We served 82 families in February of which 22 were new families. There were 35 children under the age of 18; 103 adults from the age of 19 to 64; and 16 senior citizens for a total of 154 individuals.

Total expenses for January were \$1,112.70.

The donations for January were \$1,530.00.

We continue to need paper sacks. Thank you to those who have brought us paper sacks this last month. It is very helpful. We are still collecting plastic bags.

If you should shop at Harp's or Town and Country, you can ask them to bag your groceries in a paper sack. You can drop them off in the box in the narthex.

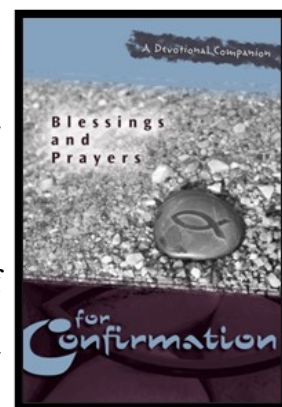
God's WORD reminds us that we are anchored and held in Him. God is always looking to find us. He comes to us in many ways.

Hymn of the Month

He is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Our hymn of the month for April is “He’s Risen, He’s Risen” by C. F. W. Walther (1811–87). Walther is well-known for serving as the first president of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and as first president of Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. He also wrote several theological works, including “The Proper Distinction Between Law and Gospel.”

In 1860, shortly before becoming president of Concordia Seminary, Walther was sent to Europe to visit relatives, friends, teachers, and colleagues. On this trip, he wrote about the growth of Lutheranism in America and focused on keeping the synod rooted in the Lutheran confessions. On Easter Sunday of the same year, he wrote this resurrection hymn. In a nod towards the 16th century tradition, he wrote this hymn in the form of a *Leise*, a style used by Luther and others as they developed Lutheran congregational singing in the 1500s. The chief characteristic of this style was the *Kyrieleis* (short for Kyrie Eleison—Lord, have mercy) at the end of each verse (see LSB 768 for an example). However, this element of the song was removed in *The Lutheran Hymnal (1941)*, leaving us with the hymn that we find in our hymnals today.

Throughout the hymn, Walther tells the story of Christ’s descent into hell and ultimate victory over sin, death, and the devil. In stanza 1, we lift our voices in praise for Jesus’ resurrection and destruction of evil. Stanza 2 reminds us that “the foe was triumphant when on Calvary.” While the “hosts shout and jeer” in Satan’s dominion, their victory is short lived. In Stanza 3, Christ reigns victorious over His foes, risen from the dead. “He lives, yes, He lives, and will nevermore die.” Stanza 4 begins by taking a stand against death and the devil and finishes by proclaiming that we are redeemed and forgiven children of God. Walther ends this hymn with a doxological stanza that praises Father, Son and Holy Spirit in a similar style as the first stanza. Throughout the Easter season and throughout our lives, we continue this proclamation: He is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

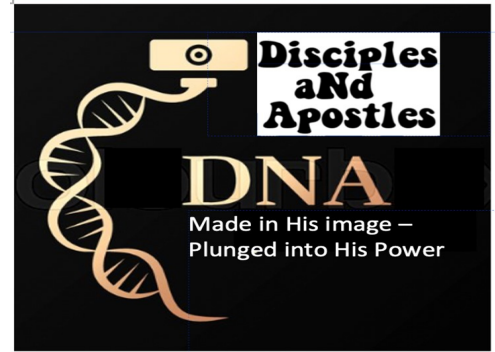


Odyssey Children's Sunday School

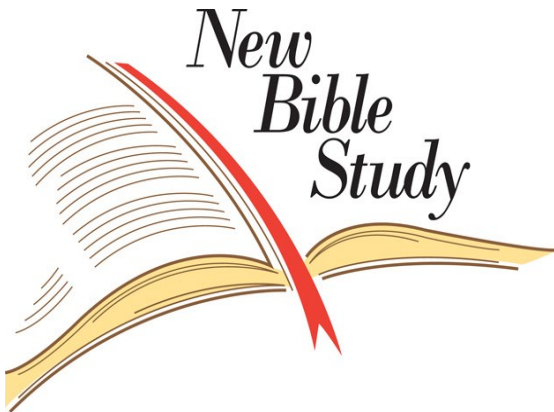

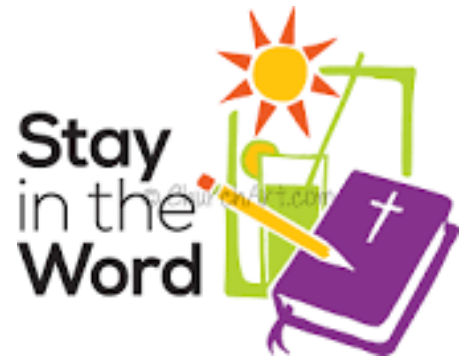
Sunday Morning Bible Study

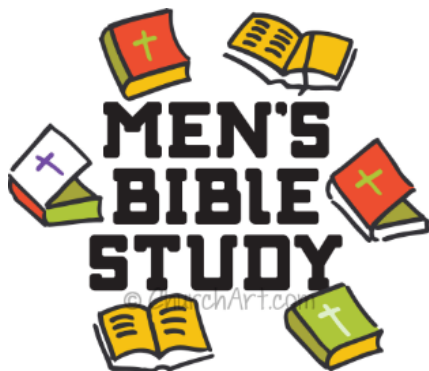
Youth Handbells

Dear Redeemer Family

Jan and I are so blessed to be a member of Redeemer Lutheran Church. We received a multitude of cards that we know also included prayers which lifted our spirit and helped us get through my hospital stay. As some of you may remember I was having heart issues in my last few years of full time ministry. I had two heart ablations in 2014, and a stent in 2015. In other words I had a misbehaving heart. Since then it was tolerable until the Fall of 2023. I started having thousands of irregular beats per day with occasional dizziness. The doctor tried adjusting my medications and that didn't work, so she scheduled a heart cath for me on Thursday February 29 of this year, here at Baxter hospital. The doctor found a 90% blockage in the heart artery called the "widow maker". Dr James Munns, our new heart surgeon, came in the room and said "you can't leave the hospital because your chance of a heart attack is too great!". So I waited in the hospital until Monday, March 4th to get a triple by-pass surgery. It will be a year before my chest fully recovers from the surgery, but I have already been back in church, and I look forward to starting up my Bible Studies the week of April 14th .

2024 FLOWER CHART



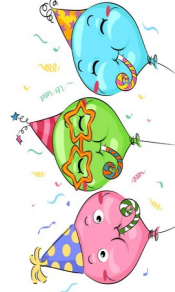
