Where do we get our ashes from: On Ash Wednesday the ashes are a very important part of this service. But where do we actually get these ashes from? Well that is the interesting part.... We actually save the palm branches that we use on Palm Sunday that the people of Jerusalem laid on the ground as Jesus walked into Jerusalem. Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week. So we will save the Palm Branches and burn them and use them as the ashes for next years Ash Wednesday Service.

The Lent Season resembles the 40 days that Jesus fasted in the desert. The ashes not only help us remember that we are all dust and that when our time on Earth is done that we will ultimately return to dust, but the ashes also symbolize grief, the grief that we have that we are not able to resist temptation as Jesus did.

Tonight we hear the words:

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

In our confessions. we usually receive the absolution of forgiveness, but tonight we hear these words and are marked with the dust of ashes.

Absolution does not come tonight, our whole season of Lent will be one of repentance. Absolution will come with the Maundy Thursday supper of love. And yet, God would not leave us without an encouraging word, "the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ does not desire the death of sinners..."

We ask for the guidance of the Holy Spirit for true repentance.

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
