Lenten Worship

Imagine that a friend or family member who is unfamiliar with your Christian faith asks you to summarize the gospel. She isn't looking for a laundry list of doctrines. She has no interest in hearing you recite the Apostles' Creed. She wants to get to the heart of the matter. "In seven words or less," she says, "tell me what you believe as a Christian." What would you say? How would you put it? Are you prepared to confess your faith in Jesus? To be a Christian is to "believe with your heart" and "confess with your mouth" the good news of God's love for us in Christ (Romans 10:9–10). Peter calls us to be prepared always to give a reason for the hope we have as Christians (1 Peter 3:15). Christians have the best news in the world to share. But are we prepared to share it? During this season of Lent, we're going to prepare to celebrate Holy Week by sharing why Holy Week is so important. The sermons in our midweek worship services will resemble workshops as we work together to formulate faithful Christian confessions. Come prepared to contribute to the conversation!

"In God, my faithful God, I trust when dark my road." Today's prelude (8:00) is a choral partita, a set of dance variations on the chorale "Auf meinen Lieben Gott" by Dietrich Buxtehude (1637-1707). In the late seventeenth century in North Germany, variation suites with the same harmonic progression for the Allemande, Courante, Sarabande, and Gigue were somewhat common. This piece by Buxtehude not only utilizes the same harmonic progression, but the same basic melody in the soprano range for each dance of the partita. The dances included in this partita are: Allemande, Double, Sarabande, Courante, Gigue, and this morning will be prefaced with a harmonization by J.S. Bach. The allemande is an old-fashioned allemande, expressive and without continuous moving notes. The double is more like the eighteenth-century allemande with continuous moving sixteenth notes. The sarabande and courante are much like those found in Buxtehude's harpsichord suites.

This sort of piece was most likely intended for home devotional purposes, and could have been played on any common keyboard instrument such as the harpsichord and clavichord; however it may also have been played on the organ at church. The chorale deals with the subject of placing hope and trust in God. The first verse translates to, "Upon my dear God I trust in times of fear and pain, He can save me any time from sorrow, fear and trouble, He can change my bad fortune, everything is in his hands." Another interpretation of this hymn by Paul Bouman (b. 1918) will be played during the offering, and we also will sing this hymn of placing our trust in God during Communion. ~From the organ bench~
