Newsletter August 2020

Earlier this spring I took an introductory course with the National Weather Service in Green Bay. Due to the covid lockdown we were not able to meet in person, but rather watched a presentation online. At one point in the class we began to discuss the phenomenon of straight-line winds. To support the discussion, the meteorologist walked us through the atmospheric conditions that led up to the July 19-20, 2019 storms that went through northern Wisconsin, specifically around the Pelican Lake area in Oneida County. The damage left hundreds of thousands of trees snapped or uprooted with a path about 60 miles long and up to 10 miles wide with winds in excess of 100 mph (stats taken from the National Weather Service website). Before and after aerial photos showed the devastation of all these fallen trees amid a green forest. Thanks be to God no lives were lost in the storm.

When we see such devastation occur, how does one respond? When you are not directly impacted by such destruction, you may only find some fascination by it. If your friend's or family member's home was destroyed, you may have a bit more at stake as you may feel a need to lend a hand in the cleanup efforts. But if it was your property that was lost, now you are directly involved with clean-up, finding a new place to live, insurance claims, and working with contractors.

Covid-19 has been quite a storm for our world. As its winds blow far and wide, we still are unsure when it will be done, if it will be done, and who will be left standing, but one thing we know for sure: all of us are impacted by it whether we agree with everything taking place or not. There are many who do not have a very positive outlook for what life will look like once the dust settles of this storm. Businesses will close. People will be forced to find new avenues of employment. Families will lose their homes. And the downward spiral will only continue.

So what about the church as we know it? As congregations have closed their doors in fear of the virus spreading in gatherings (with singing of all things!), members have been forced to watch from home. Prayerfully, they will take the time to watch the service of their home congregation (if their congregation is able to provide online services). But there are other services and resources that may be far more entertaining than your home church. Other things may come up where you tell yourself you will watch it later, but never do. Statistics are showing that at the beginning of the lock-down, viewership was extremely high! But as the weeks went on, the drop has been drastic. With such winds blowing against God's people, who will stand and who will fall? Will some congregations survive?

The newly retired president of Concordia Seminary loved and still loves to tell pastors and church members alike, "It is a great time to be the church." He even declared it at the virtual Call Day service for men receiving their first pastoral calls. Amid a pandemic and such bleak numbers, how can he make such a bold claim? There is a ton of work ahead for the church if she wants to remain viable in a covid society! Yet what is the goal of the church?

In small towns and metropolis cities, the goal remains the same: to share the hope that is ours in Jesus Christ. As people see a lot of economically and physically downed lives because of this virus, through the eyes of this world there will not be a lot of hope. But in Jesus' resurrection, that is what you have! HOPE!

In 2 Corinthians, we hear these words, So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. ¹⁷ For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, ¹⁸ as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal. **2 Corinthians 4:16-18**

In Jesus' resurrection, we have a sure and certain hope of that which has been won for us through the forgiveness of our sins. Heaven IS ours where sin and pain shall be no more. In a world where devastation and things not going right is all around us, the devil cries out "Despair! Destruction! Depression! Death! Look at it! What future is there?" But Jesus calls you to see His cross and an open tomb. That where death was to dwell is empty! Jesus lives with the promise that a new life will be for you and all believers (John 5:28-29).

How are we going to share this hope in a covid and post-covid world? Nobody but our Father in heaven knows. But one thing is certain; the opportunities WILL be there for you. May He who has begun this good work in you, strengthen you in the certainty of Jesus' resurrection from the grave. May He who nurtures you with good soil and seed, feed you mightily with His Word that you grow strong and produce fruit for the kingdom. And may you stand tall and strong with your roots planted deep and secure in the faith you have been given, as the winds that look to take the church down blow hard. Your Savior lives, and they can never take Him away from you.

Worship in a Covid-19 World

Amid all that is going on, thanks be to God that we have been able to gather over the past few weeks, and thanks be to God that thus far the virus has not spread among us! It has been a great joy to once again have members, guests, and visitors of our church family sitting in our pews for worship, and it is a great comfort to know that those who are not able to join us yet, are able to join us through a variety of means.

With more testing taking place, the numbers are rising of those infected. By God's good grace, our county has a relatively low infection count... yet there is fear of the unknown as to who may be carrying the virus. Sadly, there are other regions where the virus has exploded, and congregations were once again forced to close their doors.

A request had been made to our Board of Elders on behalf of those who desire a worship service where masks are required to be worn. Although the wearing of a mask is strongly recommended at all services, not everyone is comfortable wearing one. After a great deal of conversation at our July Elders meeting, it was decided that for the immediate future beginning-in-August, the Saturday night service would be a mandatory mask worn service. For those who do not wish to wear a mask and still desire to attend the Saturday evening service, the fellowship hall will be made available. For days when the Lord's Supper is offered, the elders and I will bring the Sacrament to the fellowship hall.

In these days, there is a great deal of working to accommodate people where they are at in terms of the virus. While some may have no fear of the virus, others have a great deal of fear. Yet no matter where you or your neighbor's fear level may be, we all have the one constant need: we all need Jesus and the gifts He brings in Word and Sacrament.

If you are not comfortable in attending, please let the church office know. We encourage you to set up an appointment to come in for a time when you can receive the Lord's Supper privately.

There are no easy answers to any of this as we await the virus to run its course. As there are many who are working on vaccines and safety measures to slow the spread, we know that in His timing the Lord our God will bring an end to this pandemic. May it happen so fast, that all will know it was His mighty hand!

God Calls Us to be His Workers

In spite of our foolish and sinful ways, God calls us to be His workers. Scripture tells us that Jesus did not pick people from society's elite when He chose his workers. Jesus' disciples were peasants, fishermen, and even a tax collector. Paul wrote, "Brothers, think of what you when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. He chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things..." (1 Corinthians 1:26-28). The majority of God's work was done and continues to be done by the lowly and oppressed people.

Certainly, God can use celebrities and very successful people in His work. However, we need to remember that, even though we may not have accomplished anything of worldly significance, broken any records, or won any awards, God can use and transform us into effective workers in His kingdom. "I can do everything through Him Who gives me strength" (Philippians 4:13). Society gives many accolades to those who succeed, but there is no greater honor or privilege than to be chosen as God's vehicle to spread the Gospel. As John states in his Gospel, it is Jesus Who does the choosing. "You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit" (John 15:16).

So why does God elevate the foolish and the lowly to be His workers? A reason may be found in 1 Corinthians 1:29: "so that no one may boast before Him." It is only by God's grace that we are saved, called, and equipped to be in His service. If we come into God's work with impressive credentials, we risk taking the glory and credit for ourselves. God desires the weak and the lowly. As Paul said, "Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:9-10). God uses ordinary people to do extra-ordinary things. Are you ready for duty?
