Newsletter August 2021

For the most part, when we hear the words work or job, we have a bit of a heavy sigh attached to them. That sigh may be either kept internal in order that no one else may see how we really feel, or we may openly verbalize how we really feel about the chores that are before us. But are there any jobs that do not bring that soul-crushing sigh to your day... those chores that you actually find yourself enjoy doing? A proverb-like statement declares that if you find something you enjoy doing, you will never work a day in your life.

Sadly, not everyone can make a living out of watching sports or movies, let alone be a professional athlete or Hollywood star. Most folks have to roll up their sleeves, buck-up, take a deep breath, and get to work doing the jobs that need to get done. As a result we look forward to the day when we can go on vacation, retire, or pay somebody else to do the job for us. And as Christians, the thought of an eternity in heaven without having to do any actual "work" is a great bonus (next to being with and seeing Jesus and no sin, death, or the power of the devil, of course).

But what if there is work that needs to be done in heaven? Are the angels going to be the hired work force? What would it be like if our condemned enemies would be the ones doing all the nasty jobs for us? Is our eternity only going to be standing around the Lord's throne and singing about how great He is?

Scripture does not go into great detail as to what each day will look like for us in the new heaven and earth. But what we do know is that sin and its effects will be no more (Rev 21:4, 27). And although we are told that those who die in the Lord will rest from their labors (Rev. 14:13), that passage is used prior to the resurrection of the dead when Jesus returns. Is it possible that we will have to actually (gasp!) work in heaven?

There are passages that would suggest that you will not spend eternity sitting on a cloud and playing a harp. In the closing chapter of Isaiah 65 we hear of the Lord's plan for His new heaven and earth, where there will be the building of homes and planting of vineyards where the labors of God's redeemed will not be in vain (21-23). Prior to the fall, we learned that Adam and Eve were to tend to the garden and the animals in Paradise (Genesis 1:28-30). It was only after the fall that their work would be difficult and painful (Genesis 3:17-19).

Yet through Jesus' death and resurrection we know that sin and death is conquered. Jesus has opened to all who cling to Him, the doors to Paradise once again, where the devil, his temptations, death, and sin can NOT exist. When Christ returns to bring us to that happy place beyond all tears and sinning (LSB 395 v.6), our sinful desires and wants will be burned away (1 Corinthians 3:12-15), and we will be changed to be like Christ (1 Cor. 15:51-57). I do not think that change will come with superpowers to snap our fingers and make a room clean itself like a Disney cartoon, but it will change our attitude towards whatever job or work God has in store for us.

We have a God who changes our attitudes about the tasks that are set before us... and it is not reserved for when we get to heaven. That change can take place with each day! The hymn "With the Lord Begin Your Task" (LSB 869) reminds us of the blessings of our labors and why we do them. They are not for self-serving purposes in order that we can have nice things for ourselves and our family, but the task is for the good of our neighbor. We are called to use the gifts and the talents God gives us, in order that we can provide a blessing and a benefit to the people in our community and world. When God opens our hearts and eyes to see this, a change takes place. That which is tedious, labor intensive, boring, and even dangerous can be a joy-filled experience, when God shows us the benefits our labors provide for others.

So when those tasks and jobs come your way, maybe giving thanks to God for the opportunity is a good place to start. Who knows what work He may be doing through you!

God Calls Us to be His Workers

In spite of our foolish and sinful ways, God calls us to be His workers. Scripture tells us that Jesus did not pick people from society's elite when He chose his workers. Jesus' disciples were peasants, fishermen, and even a tax collector. Paul wrote, "Brothers, think of what you when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. He chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things . . ." (1 Corinthians 1:26-28). The majority of God's work was done and continues to be done by the lowly and oppressed people.

Certainly, God can use celebrities and very successful people in His work. However, we need to remember that, even though we may not have accomplished anything of worldly significance, broken any records, or won any awards, God can use and transform us into effective workers in His kingdom. "I can do everything through Him Who gives me strength" (Philippians 4:13). Society gives many accolades to those who succeed, but there is no greater honor or privilege than to be chosen as God's vehicle to spread the Gospel. As John states in his Gospel, it is Jesus Who does the choosing. "You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit" (John 15:16).

So why does God elevate the foolish and the lowly to be His workers? A reason may be found in 1 Corinthians 1:29: "so that no one may boast before Him." It is only by God's grace that we are saved, called, and equipped to be in His service. If we come into God's work with impressive credentials, we risk taking the glory and credit for ourselves. God desires the weak and the lowly. As Paul said, "Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:9-10). God uses ordinary people to do extra-ordinary things. Are you ready for duty?
