What Have I Done for Him?

Lent is a season in the church year during which we particularly focus on the sacrifice Jesus made for us to pay the debt we owed for our sin. We know there is no way we can pay the debt ourselves. Only the sinless Son of God could do that. We have access to heaven only by grace through faith in Christ Jesus.

While we cannot repay Jesus for what He has done for us, His love does require a response. Paul, speaking of our ministry of reconciliation, wrote, *"For Christ's love compels us..."* (2 Corinthians 5:14). We remain on earth to carry out the tasks which Christ left for us to do: to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit the prisoner, (Matthew 25:31-46). James admonished us that *"So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead"* (James 2:17). We provide the funds that support our pastors, teachers, and missionaries. Again, we can quote Paul writing in 1 Corinthians 9:11-12. *"If we have sown spiritual seed among you, is it too much if we reap a material harvest from you? If others have this right of support from you, shouldn't we have it all the more?"* Certainly each of us is addressed by the Great Commission: *"Go and make disciples of all nations..."* (Matthew 28:19). The following words from Frances Ridley Havergal are a poignant reminder that Christ's love and sacrifice for us require a response:

Thy life was given for me, Thy Blood, O Lord, was shed
That I might ransomed be, and quickened from the dead.
Thy life was given for me, What have I given for Thee?

And Thou hast brought to me Down from Thy home above
Salvation full and free, Thy pardon and Thy love.
Great gifts Thou broughtest me, What have I brought to Thee?

We are saved by grace through faith for works. Let us pray for the desire to be good stewards of the gifts of salvation, health and wealth, and time and opportunity which God has given us that we might have a part in the furthering of God's kingdom.

The Stones of The Passion ... *from the vacancy pastor*

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, a day traditionally set aside for Christians to receive a cross of ashes on their foreheads, as a sign of their human mortality. Not only will we remember that we are dust and to dust we shall return, but we will also remember our baptism into Christ! In Christ our sins are forgiven and we have the sure and certain hope of everlasting life. In baptism, we received a cross marked on our foreheads and on our hearts, as those belonging to Christ Crucified!

During this Lenten season, join your fellow members and friends of Shepherd of Peace in worship at 7:00 p.m. preceded by a congregational meal and fellowship beginning at 6:00 p.m.! On our Lenten journey together we will encounter, the Stones of the Passion!

Stones and rocks are prevalent throughout the Scriptures. The Ten Commandments were written on stone tablets. On the breastplate of the High Priest, were engrafted twelve precious stones. Stones were used in stoning one to death—the woman caught in adultery, Jesus, St. Paul, and Stephen. Altars where sacrifices were offered to God were built and made of stone. The devil tempted Jesus to change stones to bread, but Jesus reminds all of us that man doesn't live on bread alone but on every Word which comes from the mouth of God. It was on a rocky hill called Golgotha where Jesus was crucified and died. In His death, tombstones were destroyed when the graves were opened and many holy people were raised to life. Buildings are made of stone. St. Matthew writes,

“And Jesus went out, and departed from the temple: and His disciples came to Him for to show Him the buildings of the temple. And Jesus said unto them, “See ye not all these things? Verily I say unto you, there shall not be left here one stone upon another, that shall not be thrown down.”” (Matthew 24:1-2) When Jesus said, “Destroy this temple, and three days I will raise it up” (John 2:19), He wasn't talking about any lithos or petra, but His soma, His body! We understand now what the Psalmist is talking about, “The stone which the builders refused is become the head of the corner. This is the LORD'S doing, it is marvelous in our eyes. This is the day which the Lord has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it.” (Psalm 118:22-24)

The Stones of the Passion: stones of Jubilation, anger, self-righteousness, betrayal and denial, anguish, rejection, palms, remembrance, death and burial, resurrection, and living stones, will remind us of our own shortcomings, our sin, our guilt. The Stones of the Passion will remind us of Jesus, the Chief Cornerstone on which is built His Church! The stone which was rolled in front of the sepulchur is now rolled away! This Stone lives and because He lives, we too are living stones!



The Stones of the Passion have a message for us as we travel again with Jesus to Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, to the upper room, to Gethsemane, to His trials, to Golgotha, to His rest in the tomb, to His resurrection! These stones remind us of the ongoing task of proclaiming Christ Crucified and Risen to all people! This is the message of the cross! This message we have the privilege to share with our neighbors, co-workers, those living in our communities! Come and invite a friend to hear the Stones of the Passion! A Blessed Lenten journey to you!

Heart Cleaning

I know who I am *supposed* to be as a member of the body of Christ—really, I do.

My heart is *supposed to be* filled with God's love for all people, consumed with the grace Christ gave me through His death on the cross. I *should be* eager to share that grace with patience and forgiveness toward everyone I meet each day. And my heart is exactly like that, brimming with God's love and mercy, ready to spread His grace...until I have to get out of bed and face the world.



Honestly, my heart can be a pretty unclean place at times. It shames me to admit it, but there it is. (Praise God thought bubbles don't appear over my head as I go about my day!) Now, I've been a Christian long enough to know *that* is a bad thing. "*Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it.*" (Prov. 4:23 NIV) Jeremiah warns us too, "*The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately sick...*" (17:9). Gulp! We can't do good works according to His purpose if we've got a bunch of ugly going on inside, and sometimes we don't even realize what an unclean place inside is.

Can you relate?

King David had a similar problem. He lusted for Bathsheba. That lust flowed from his heart causing him to commit adultery, murder, and a whole host of other sins. He was able to deny the conditions of his heart and all that flowed from it, until his friend, Nathan, a prophet of God, exposed David's "deceitful, desperately sick, in need of a good cleaning" heart to him. That is right where we find David at the beginning of Psalm 51. It's also right where we find ourselves at the beginning of Lent.


I can just picture David falling on his knees, head down, "*Have mercy on me, O God... Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin!*" (Ps. 51:1-2) The truth is: I can picture David there so vividly, because I so often find myself in that very place—in need of a good heart cleaning. I cannot begin to count the number of times I've prayed, "*Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.*" (Ps.51:10)



I see the dirt of my sin, now what!

We are born in sin. It's our condition, but like David, we can get so caught up in our dirty hearts, we forget how deceitful and sick they are. We start to *justify* our thoughts and our actions until we stop seeing the dirt. That is where the law comes in; that's when God uses His Word and the "Nathans" in our lives to show us the uncleanness of our hearts and the brokenness of our spirits. This realization isn't a bad thing though. Rather it brings us to repentance—to the revelation that "*The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.*" (Ps 51:17). It brings us to Easter.

As we approach Lent let us begin to open our eyes to the condition of our hearts; let us make ourselves aware of the brokenness of our spirits; and let us present these to God as sacrifices to Him in repentance. That is what Lent is about—recalling how much we need a Savior and praising God we have that Savior in Jesus who can make our hearts clean and heal our broken spirits.


has been a surprise ever since!

Just the Numbers, Please

Actual income for the month of January was reported at just under 70% of projections with only \$18,402.76 out of an expected \$26,433.98. For the same period, expenses were also reported at 47% of projections with only \$12,119.72 in actual vs \$25,486.73 projected.

While actual numbers for February will be available in March, projected expenses for March are \$25,261.35.



Stewardship

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Shepherd's Care Mothers' Day Out



It was a short month anyway, so a snow day, the Valentines Party, and Dr. Seuss celebrations made February fly by at Preschool. Bible stories focused on Jesus' miraculous care for those around Him. We heard how He fed 5,000 people and healed a deaf man. The man who was deaf even came to school one day to tell us all about what Jesus had done for him. (We noticed how all of Mrs. Carol's Bible friends seem to wear shoes just like hers. J) We talked about the wonderful gift of sound and thanked God for our ears as we played musical instruments and attempted to identify items inside our sound eggs. When we learned about Dr. Seuss we talked about fiction and non-fiction as we compared his fun, fanciful stories with the true stories we learn in the Bible. We added the first vowel to our letter wall with the letter Aa. We learned that vowels have one name, but can make two sounds when we read them. In math we counted pebbles to put in our musical shakers, chose the right number of loaves and fishes to put in our lunches, and worked on the concept of $\frac{1}{2}$ when we made a shape sailboat. We enjoyed delivering mail as we placed Valentines in our beautifully decorated mailboxes. At the end of the month, we celebrated Dr. Seuss' birthday with special dress up days, making Oobleck, guest readers, Lorax hats, and eating Green Eggs and Ham. When we thought about Jesus feeding so many people, we watched loaves of bread rise, baked, and then ate them for snack. We also used food to paint with that week. Peppers, carrots and potatoes make good stamps. We also painted with sponges and marbles this month.

In music, besides learning to pass and play our instruments, we sang songs about God's love for us. We marveled at how "God is Good, All the Time", and exclaimed, "Can You Believe it, 5,000 Fed." We also learned a couple of silly songs to help us move our bodies and subtract. "Mr. Knickerbocker" and "Five Green Speckled Frogs" quickly became favorites.

March brings Mardi Gras on March 4th and Spring Break March 25th and 27th. I'm also told that Shepherd of Peace is planning to have a team in the Relay for Life and it is open to preschool friends as well.
