I Corinthians 15 is known as the Resurrection *Chapter*. Paul writes in verses 3-4: "For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures..." Are these words new to you? Hardly. You've heard this message every Easter and probably several Sundays in between. As Paul says, it's the message of first importance. Unless Christ has died for our sins and unless He is risen from the dead, we have nothing on which to base our faith. Only the Christian religion has a God, Who out of love for us, has come down to be among His people in order to live the perfect life in our places and to pay the price for our failure to meet the mark.

Under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, Paul teaches us many things. His epistles are full of information, exhortation, encouragement, and edification. But he says that this message of what Christ has done for us in the one of first importance. As he writes in verse 14, "And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain."

Paul says, "For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received." Paul, like our Lord, no longer walks this earth, spreading this message. Of course, Paul passed on this message in written as well as in verbal form. We have God's Word and are privileged to read and study it whenever we want. Many people don't, however. Many don't even know that the Bible is Truth.

That's where we come in. We now walk the earth. Jesus said, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth" (Acts 1:8). As recipients of that power, we are enabled to be His witnesses. We now have the task of passing on what we've received, the beautiful Gospel message that Christ died for our sins and was raised again that we, too, may have eternal life. God grant that we might be eager stewards of His Gospel.





A Plastic Egg, a Piñata, & an Empty Tomb

When my kids were young, they loved Resurrection Eggs. They would dig through the box of Easter stuff to find the dark purple carton filled with plastic eggs. Each egg uncovered a part of the account of

Easter: a nail, a coin, a piece of cloth, all small reminders of the biblical telling. But my kids never spent much time on the trinkets; their favorite egg was the empty one. That egg was placed in the dozen to remind the children of the empty tomb, Christ's defeat over death for us all. They would open it, smile, and show it to me gleaming with excitement, "Mom, it's empty!" Imagine that! Finding comfort and joy in something empty. Empty.



Life leaves me feeling empty much of the time.


Each day I start out eager; ready to tackle all the stuff that I know will come at me. I start so full, so


strong. A sturdy, new piñata filled up and ready to go—God's girl with an action plan. It doesn't take long before the party is over, though, and I am swaying in the wind, beaten by life, covered in holes, and hollowed out. Empty.



I wonder if that is how the Marys felt when the Sabbath had passed after Jesus' death. Their rabbi had died. They had seen all that had gone on in the days before; watched in horror as the brutal events unfolded; stood there, helpless, as Jesus breathed his final breath on the cross. They had seen his lifeless body placed into the cold tomb.

The Marys woke up early the morning after Sabbath filled with grief and gathered what they needed to get through the task that lay ahead. "[they] bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him." Mark 16:1 I can imagine the deep sorrow as they walked toward the tomb that morning, choking back tears, but determined to honor their cherished rabbi with this final act of love, wondering out loud, "Who will roll away the stone from the entrance of the tomb?" Mark 16:3. They were women with a plan.





The next time we catch ourselves swaying and hollowed out from thwarted plans and hard hits, maybe we shouldn't feel despair, but instead remember the empty plastic egg, knowing that God fills the empty with far bigger things than we could ever imagine. 





Shepherd's Care Mother's Day Out News

March was a short month because of Spring Break, but was filled with special events. We celebrated Mardi Gras by decorating and eating our king cake while looking for the baby. We made jester hats, dressed up like kings and queens, and caught beads thrown by the teachers. We also learned about Lent and, a few days later, experienced those pesky Leprechauns at our St. Patrick's Day event. We worked again on the difference between real and fiction as we

talked about the <u>actual</u> St. Patrick as opposed to the <u>pretend Leprechauns</u>. We heard how St. Patrick taught about the Triune God with a shamrock. We made Leprechauns and

even had the tricky little creatures come for a visit while we were at recess. They made a topsy turvy mess in our room, put their tiny green footprints all over the tables, and even left "something" green in our toilets. At least they left us some yummy Leprechaun grapes for a snack and dropped a few of their gold coins for us.

We dealt with some Biblical concepts this month that fit with our weekly themes. We celebrated before starting the sad season of Lent. We learned how our Bible stories are <u>true</u> while sto-

ries about Leprechauns and lucky charms are just pretend. We also learned that our God is one God, yet three persons. We even sang about God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. 
