On the first Monday in September, we annually celebrate Labor Day, which is dedicated to the social and economic achievement of American workers. Since 1884, workers enjoy a holiday from their work. As Christians, we know that work is a blessing from God. In the very beginning, God put Adam and Eve to work in the garden (Genesis 2:15).

Our work and labor enable us to earn money. Even though Scripture is clear that God owns all things, we may say, "This isn't God's money in my wallet. It's my money. I worked for it. I deserve it." God has heard this over and over again. God addresses this attitude in the eighth chapter in Deuteronomy. God had brought His people out of slavery and was taking care of their every need. He was providing food each morning. He was protecting them and blessing them in battle. In spite of His gracious provision for them, the nation continued to gripe and complain all the time. Even though God provided for their needs, they ignored Him.

In our own lives, when our stomachs are full and we have success, we have a tendency to forget all that God has done for us. We take credit for our success, forgetting that God has made it happen, and then we blame Him for our failures! God's people stopped thanking and praising Him for all their blessings. They had forgotten that He had given them the ability to work so they could earn the money needed to provide for their blessings. Moses wrote, "Beware lest you say in your heart, 'My power and the might of my hand have gotten me this wealth.' You shall remember the Lord your God, for it is He who gives you power to get wealth..." (Deuteronomy 8:17-18).

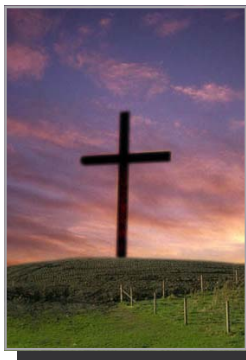
As God's laborers, we are mindful that God gives us the ability to work and gain wealth. To enable us to work, God does the following:

- God gives us talents, abilities, and skills.
- God gives us bodies, strength, and energy to work.
- God gives us ideas and creativity.
- God gives us dedication, ingenuity, and initiative.
- God gives us opportunities to work.
- God gives us employers who pay us for our work.



When we understand God's role in making it possible to work and earn money, we will acknowledge His ownership of our money. Accepting that God is the source and owner of what we have, we begin to manage our money in ways that give Him glory. We use our money in ways that serve God's purposes.

## Lift High the Cross



There are many symbols throughout the Church, many that we can point to and be reminded of God's work in our lives. During the month of September the Church sets aside the 14th as a day to recall the Holy Cross of Jesus, that great symbol of His death and resurrection. The cross is simple and easy to recognize: two beams, boards, or poles, (you name the material, I have one made of nails in my office.) one shorter than the other, crossing one another to make the form of a small "t". Most people in the world are able to recognize a cross and tell you that it stands for Christianity, or something like that; and to most of them, it seems pretty foolish. Why would a cross be something of value? When you regard what it actually is, it seems rather gruesome. How different is a cross than an electric chair or guillotine? They are all instruments of death used by governments over the years to carry out punishments on those breaking the law. You don't see Muslims with swords dangling on their necklaces. Why wouldn't the world think the cross odd?

But to us Christians the cross is different. It isn't just an instrument of torture, punishment and death, but a receipt, or a reminder, that the justice carried out for our law-breaking is done, taken out on Jesus. Jesus blood was shed, not ours; which covered our sins, appeasing God our Father, delivering us from damnation. Here we can call the cross a place of mercy, for we do not receive what we deserve; Jesus has taken our place, dying in our stead. After this sinks in, we are lead to see the cross as a reminder of promise. God once gave a rainbow as a sign of promise in the heavens to stay destruction by water, and therefore hope in the midst of life's many storms. Baptism brings us fully into that reality. And now the cross stands as a promise of our eternal justification before God, mercy lived out. From this it becomes a reminder of grace, our receiving what we don't deserve in eternal life and bliss as heirs of Christ's Kingdom, the hope we have because Christ took our place.

This month, as we lift high the cross together, please keep the words of St. Paul in mind from 1 Corinthians 1:18-25:

*For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written,*

*"I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,*

*and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."*

*Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men.*



Thank God for the cross and for it being a simple symbol that we can cling to as a place of mercy, promise and grace.

Innovative as these systems of thought may be, they offer no solace against the perfect judgment of an omniscient and righteous God. *That* relief is available only through Jesus' redemptive work on the cross. In Him all the speculations of religious thought and baffling intricacies of philosophical inquiry come crumbling down. As God's creatures -- *as sinners* -- the end of our days is entirely in His hands. In this fact neither our clever wordplay nor our comedic explanations will do us any good, but only faith in Jesus Christ and Him crucified.

## SOP Youth battle at Paint Ball Arkansas



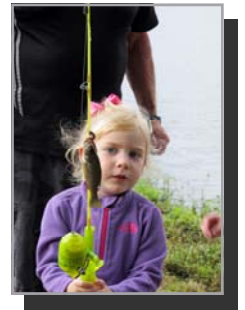

## More than just a Fish Tale

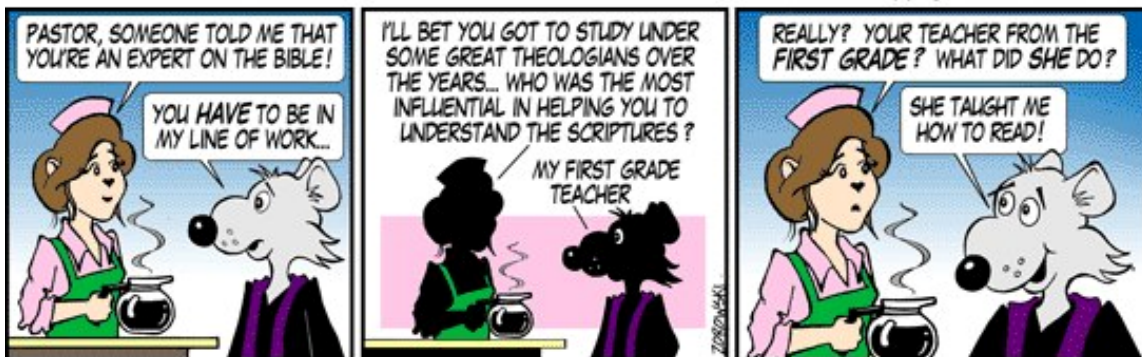

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## The Shepherd's Flock (Getting to know His sheep): The Cates'

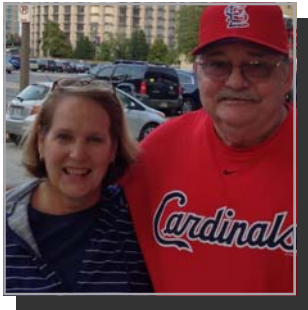

## Shepherd's Care Mothers' Day Out News

The first weeks at Mother's Day Out/Preschool were great. There were no tears in the 3 & 4 year old "big kid's" class, and not too many in the 1 & 2 year old class. Everyone was anxious to get started playing and making new friends. We spent a lot of the time learning procedures for everything. Walking in a line was a big step, as was waiting our turn, and washing up in the bathrooms. We learned where all the toys went and how to put them away when Mrs. Carol sings the clean up song. We learned prayers for snack time, lunch time, and rest time. We are working on sharing skills and using words to ask for what we need. We did our best at following directions and enjoyed pom-poms in our sensory table as well as "painting" with wheels of cars and trucks. Some students were on vacation each week, so we'll continue to welcome new friends in the weeks to come.

Our first Bible story during circle time was the story of Jesus telling his friends to, "Let the little children come to me." We used costumes and props to pretend to be parents with children and we took them to Jesus and his "grouchy" disciples. :) Next we heard about Abraham having to move to a new land. We picked up our circle time activities, packed a box, and moved our class over to a new spot in the church building. We even had to make camp and "sleep" on the way to our new spot like Abraham did. We made a bulletin board that shows places we went this summer and how God was with us everywhere we went just like he was with Abraham. We sang songs in music to reinforce truths from these Bible stories like, "Absolutely Nothin'," "When I Wiggle," and "Father Abraham."

We began alphabet work with the sound of letter Jj, because we talked about Jesus' love. One day we made jellyfish because that starts with Jj, and we made them swim high, low, up, down and in circles to work on position words. Mrs. Carol will be assessing the older students in September to record what letters, shapes, colors, and numbers they already know. Results of the assessments will be sent home with children in the 3 & 4 year old class.

We increased the number of teachers on staff this year and that allowed us to enroll a few more children. We are delighted to have Mrs. Lucy as a helper for Mrs. Carol in the 3-4 year old class and Mrs. Renee and Mrs. Liz are continuing to teach the 1 - 2 year olds. Currently we have 16 in the older class and 8 in the younger class. Thanks to Mrs. Jerri for being our greeter, to Miss Abby for subbing in the first week, and to Mrs. Carol Smith for just "pitching in" when we needed her. It's going to be a super year.

MDO is off to a great start with 24 eager kids and 4 wonderful teachers!
