adapted from the Bible

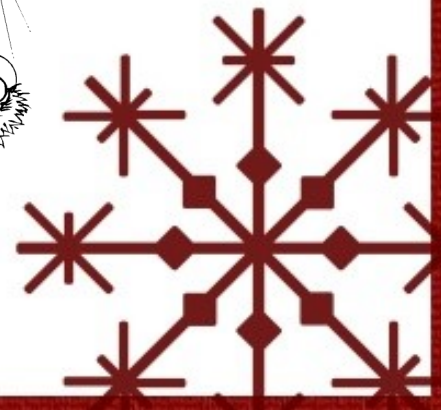
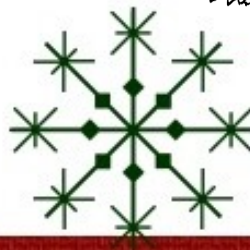

One-Year Lectionary - What does that mean?

As we enter into a new Church Year, a very subtle change has happened in our worship services. I dare say that it probably was not noticed at all this past Sunday (the First Sunday in Advent). We are now using the One-Year Lectionary.

First off, it's probably important to understand what the lectionary is and why we use it. The lectionary is simply the system of readings for scripture that we use in our worship services. There are three readings each Sunday: the Old Testament Reading, the Epistle, and the Holy Gospel. These readings are appointed for each Sunday of the Church Year as well as festivals that occur throughout the year. While it may seem restrictive to be tied to specific readings each week, there are a couple of huge benefits to using a lectionary. One is that I don't have to figure out what section of scripture we're going to use for every service. All I have to do is look at the date on the calendar and find the readings that match that day. Another is that it protects you from me. Hopefully you don't need protection from your pastor, but the truth is that if I were allowed to pick the readings out of thin air each week, you'd probably see some troubling patterns develop. I would pick my favorite topics to talk about and then choose Bible passages to back me up. It's far better--not to mention more faithful--to work things the other way around.

Since about the 5th Century, the Church has made use of such a list of readings. This system of readings became pretty well normalized over the years to the point that the lectionary that was used in the 13th Century is pretty much the same one we are using now at Shepherd of Peace. This means that I can go to the bookshelf in my office and look up a sermon from Luther, C. F. Walther, Johann Gerhard, or any number of other Lutheran Church fathers and see how they approached a given text for any Sunday in the Church Year as I prepare to preach the same text here in 21st Century.

So what's different now as opposed to two weeks ago? We were using the Three-Year Lectionary. This means that instead of using the same list of readings for each year, we were using three sets of readings. We would use Year A one year, Year B the next, and Year C after that. Then we would repeat the cycle again. The Three-Year Lectionary was developed in the 1960s in an effort to expose people to a greater number of scripture readings. Year A focused on the Gospel of Matthew, Year B on Mark, and Year C on Luke. John was sprinkled throughout--especially during the season of Easter. Instead of that, we will be using the same set of readings each Church Year. The Gospel readings are taken from all four Gospels somewhat equally. One major difference you'll notice early next calendar year is that Transfiguration will move up a few weeks. The One-Year Lectionary includes a "Pre-Lent" season. I'll write more about that in the months to come.

So why switch to the One-Year? Isn't more scripture better? On the surface, perhaps. But in reality, I would much rather you know the story of Christ and his redemption for all sinners well than that you know a huge body of scripture. There is a Latin phrase that says "*repetitio mater memoriae*," that is, "Repetition is the mother of memorization (or learning)." If you want to learn a thing well, repeat it over and over again. Repeating the readings from the lectionary each year will hopefully have that effect on us. As I mentioned before, the One-Year Lectionary has been used for centuries. This means that other liturgical resources were developed over the years to go with the readings for the lectionary. In particular, the early Lutherans wrote hymns that summarized the Gospel reading for each date of the Church Year were written. Add that to the afore-mentioned sermons of the Lutheran Church fathers and there is a vast treasury of resources available to us to say the least.

And so there is something new at Shepherd of Peace to go with the new Church Year, but that something new is something that's actually really, really old! Have more questions about this or anything else? I'd love to talk more about it!

2017 - Reaching out to our neighbors.

Recently a fellow member of SOP made a reference to 'needs' at Audubon Pointe. I asked for a list of items. I had no idea about the depth of needs just outside our doors.

Residents of Audubon Pointe are 62 years of age or older, handicapped or disabled. It's considered affordable Senior, independent living, with over 200 either 1 or 2 bedroom apartments and cottages. When exiting SOP parking lot, go left and it's the large multiple story building just ahead of you.

When I went to visit, I learned that some residents are moved in with nothing! Whatever the situation is or was, they don't have kitchen items, no furniture, no towels, no dresser, no TV, no radio, the list goes on and on. Think about it, no basics. Many residents have NO one who comes to visit, holidays are just another day.

This is where I would like Shepherd of Peace to 'REACH' out to help these neighbors in 2017 and before.

Maintenance can change light bulbs (if the resident buys them) but there's no one to hang a curtain (if they even have a curtain or rod), repair or glue something, flip a mattress, move furniture, etc. I'd like us to put together a group (men/women/both) that works on a list supplied by the Coordinator at Audubon.

There are approx. 50 residents that will receive nothing for Christmas. A Senior Support group does supply over 20 gifts but they don't or can't supply enough for everyone. I would like us to supply for the others will be acknowledged with a gift & receive something.

They have a wonderful baby grand piano in the lobby. Let's take a group, (choir or other groups) to go sing or just go play music.

Some because of disabilities can't get out to get groceries. Some don't even get out of their room.

I'm supplying you with 2 lists for donations to the shopping cart. One is specifically marked for Audubon but the other can be used in a multitude of ways. It's a list of items to make a 'Love Box'. The items are shelf stable and can be given to families in need.

Please, let's get our heads together and support our neighbors in need. To think of no visitors, no family to come, nothing to make their days special or important, breaks my heart. We can do better for them!!

Please print off this list and pick up items as you can or maybe they're in your cupboard. Let's get started!!!
