### Jesus' Passion, Death, and Resurrection

# He was wounded for our transgression, He was crushed for our iniquities... with His stripes we are healed. Isaiah 53:5

As every book has a beginning, a middle, and an end, so also every book that is a mystery has often some great conflict, the main character or characters must make decisions that will determine the outcome of the plot. In the Bible, the true account of God and His love for you, you learn that God made the decision to send a Savior to redeem (to buy back) His creation from slavery to sin. In many Bible stories, you have read about how God redeemed people: God sent a ram for Abraham to sacrifice instead of Isaac. God brought the children of Israel out of Egypt. God sent judges and kings and prophets to


call the Israelites back from worshipping other gods. Always, God reminded His people that a Savior was coming. Finally, when the time was right, God sent Jesus to earth.

Will Jesus be separated from His Father and die alone?

The answer is YES. Jesus came to earth and was born in a stable FOR US. He grew to be a man and traveled without a home, teaching and preaching and healing FOR US. He loves us so much and wanted to end this conflict with Satan and sin and make us part of God's family forever.

But Jesus' suffering and death isn't the end. Jesus came back to life FOR US. His resurrection proved that God accepted Jesus' sacrifice for our sin and the sin of the whole world. When you were baptized, you were "buried with [Christ] in baptism, in which you were raised with Him through faith in the powerful working of God, who raised Him from the dead" (Colossians 2:12).

On Easter Sunday, April 17, we will once again celebrate God's great mystery of His Son, Jesus Christ, who conquered Satan, sin, death, and redeemed us from the grave to be His forever.



Blessings as we spring into this new season with thanksgiving of new life and the promise of everlasting life in the life that is ours and is to come.

Christ is risen, He has risen indeed! Alleluia! ~Pastor Steve Wilson







Beginning on Palm Sunday (April 10) we will observe the culmination of Christ's journey to the cross. The week leading up to Easter Sunday is called the "Holy Week". **Holy Week** is a time when we take part in the Passion of Christ in a special way worshipping the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. We remember his actions, reflect on his messages, and recommit to living as his disciples in the world today. Holy week is the final week of Lent, Holy Week begins with **Palm Sunday** of the Passion of the Lord and concludes with the **Triduum.** 

"Tridum" comes from two Latin words – tres and dies – that means "a space of three days". Easter Triduum begins at sundown on Holy Thursday or Maundy Thursday, so the three days are Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday. During the Triduum we celebrate the core mystery of our Christian faith: we view Jesus' transition from life to death to risen life and our own participation in those observances. Holy week begins with the waving of palms! and singing praises to the lord! Both of which will be celebrated and led by our Sunday school children and teachers on Palm Sunday during our 10:30am worship service. Christians around the world observe the Holy Week in penance, fasting, prayer, and sending good wishes to loved ones.

Holy Week liturgies generally attract the largest crowds of the year. Many Christian cultures have different traditions such as special liturgies or services, floats, sculptures or live reenactments of Christ's life, his arrest and crucifixion (also called the Lord's passion, the Passion of Christ or Passion of Jesus).

Holy Week is celebrated in many ways around the world. In Caracas, Venezuela, residents re-enact Jesus Christ's crucifixion on a hilltop in the Petare, which is a shanty town, during Holy Week, on Good Friday. Christian Orthodox pilgrims carry wooden crosses during a Good Friday procession through the city of Jerusalem. Penitents, surrounded by several thousand people in Cuenca, Spain, carry a statue of Our Father Nazarene during the Good Friday procession "Way of Calvary." People walk with crosses as the Northern Cross pilgrimage makes the final leg of its journey to Holy Island, England every Good Friday. Penitents in San Fernando, Philippines, hang from wooden crosses on Good Friday as they take part in a re-enactment of Jesus Christ's crucifixion. Catholic worshippers perform a sea procession to transfer a statue of Jesus Christ from one church to another during Holy Week in Larantuka, Indonesia. People take part in a Stations of the Cross re-enactment at the Raja Agung church in Bintan Island, Indonesia, on Good Friday. Christian believers take part in the ribbons procession as part of the Holy Week before Easter, in Cot, Cartago province, Costa Rica. Egyptian Christians celebrate Palm Sunday during a service in the Samaan el-Kharaz Church in the Mokattam district of Cairo, Egypt. And many other celebrations of Holy Week take place around the world each year.

Some Lutheran Churches hold an Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday or some refer to it as Black Saturday, the day before Easter, in the evening. The Easter Vigil, one of the longest and most solemn of liturgical liturgies, lasts up to three or four hours, consists of four parts:

The Service of Light

The Liturgy of the Word

The Liturgy of Baptism: The sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation for new members of the Church and the Renewal of Baptismal Promises by the entire congregation.

**Holy Eucharist** 

Here at St. John's Lutheran Church, in observance of the Triduum, we will have worship services with Holy Communion on Maundy Thursday evening, April 14 at 6pm, worship on Good Friday Evening, April 15<sup>th</sup> at 6pm and Easter Sunday worship, April 17 at 7:00 and 9:30am.

May God bless you, watch over you, protect you, and guide you as we come together in our church home to worship, celebrate Christ's death and resurrection, and receive God's gifts from our Lord Jesus Christ.

# God's ultimate gift Of redemption

"But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: 'Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine'" (Is 43:1)

Let's start with a question: Of what will you be more likely to take greater care? Something you own? Or something that isn't yours?

This might be a slippery slope question for a devotion during a stewardship series based on God's simple gifts. However, as one hears the words of our Lord through the prophet Isaiah, it is a question that does bring a great deal of comfort.

As God plainly states through Isaiah, stewards that have been created and are being sustained by God have no reason to fear. Why? Because they belong to God! They are owned fully by Him. With His mighty power the Lord created them. By His amazing grace, He has redeemed them in the innocent suffering and death of His beloved Son Jesus! You, my friend in Christ, are doubly owned!

God, as the Owner of all things by virtue of creation, sees you as a treasured possession He promises never to hold out on you. He may not make you stupendously wealthy, incredibly intelligent or dashingly beautiful. But you do have the sure and certain promise that God IS with you. In Word, and Sacrament, our Lord dwells with you giving you His gifts of life and salvation!

As one contemplates the simple gifts our Lord gives and how we might be called to share them with the Church for the Gospel and our neighbors for God's glory, we need not fear. We have His promise that He will be with us. For this reason, we can indeed be extravagantly generous! We have the Lord's promise! He will not abandon us.

The faithful stewardship and generosity to which we are called is to be a confession of our trust in His promise. It isn't always easy. But this is the stewardship to which we have been called.

### **Prayer**

Lord as Your stewards, we work in fear of our shortcomings and sin, in faith in Christ's redemption and restoration and eager desire to serve as faithful stewards of Your simple gifts. Lead us by grace through faith to see, rejoice and serve in this faithful stewardship! As You have blessed us with Your work in Jesus, may our work as stewards be a blessing to others. Amen.
