Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. (Hebrews 12:1-2)

As I write this newsletter another school shooting and loss of lives has been reported at a high school in St. Louis, Missouri. This is sadly to say one of many school shootings that have taken place in the last years along with high crime rates and people dying from drug overdose across our nation. There is so much tragedy and chaos in our world today that brings about a sense of fear, anxiety, depression, and hopelessness into our lives. **This seems like a hopeless story.**

With this being said, each of us must cope with the reality of grief and sorrow that comes to our doorsteps with sickness and death of our dear loved ones. The death of a loved one is a terrible reality in our lives and also brings about fear, anxiety, depression, and a sense of hopelessness. We ask ourselves the question how can we face the future without them in our lives? **This is our story.**

But we know a better story. Even in our grief and sorrow brought about by death and the grave we are comforted with the hope that there is a blessed resurrection reunion that awaits us in heaven. Jesus came into the world to overcome death and the grave for us by the way of a cross and the empty tomb. Jesus said: **“I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die.”** (John 11:25 -26) Jesus also went on to say, **“Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God; trust also in me. In my Father’s house are many rooms; if it were no so, I would have told you. With the closing words of the Common Preface we hear the pastor say: “Therefore with angels and archangels and with all the company (our loved ones) of heaven we laud and magnify your glorious name, evermore praising you and saying ...” As Christ comes to meet us and feed us with His body and blood they surround us. They are like the crowds at a finish line of a race they encourage us to keep our eyes fixed and focused on what is ahead. The Lord Of The Harvest

"Then he [Jesus] said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest.'"
Matthew 9:37-38

Since I have returned home following my accident I have had a lot of time to read, reflect and look out the living room window to watch the harvest. Ever since I was a little kid I have always enjoyed this time of year. The harvest of the labors in the farm fields and in the gardens, the smell of freshly turned soil after it is tilled, the landscape of the horizon reappearing after being hidden through the summer by the tall fields of corn. All of this has kept me as a "farmer at heart". This fall I had to watch the harvest looking out the windows of my home – watching Darren combine my neighbor's cornfield, seeing the semis full of corn going by our place on their way to being stored in bins and seeing the co-ops applying the fall fertilizer. We all know the importance of bringing in the harvest for the benefit of our local economy and the livelihood of farm families. As Christians we know of the importance of a much larger harvest and the laborers of the fields.

The word "harvest" appears more than 80 times in the Bible. In the text from Matthew that I started this article with Jesus himself speaks of the harvest, but more importantly tells us of the Lord of the harvest and the need for laborers for this harvest. During the time of this portion of scripture Jesus was always on the move during His ministry here on earth. He went from village, to town, to city, teaching in synagogues, preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing every sickness and disease.

But there was so much to do. So many people to reach with his message. He needed help. So Jesus implored His disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." Jesus is right. The harvest is plentiful. His words are as true today as they were when he first uttered them. The world is desperately calling out for help. Do we even hear those cries for help, cries that the world's material ways and means can never supply? There are so many people in the world who need to know God loves them.

There are lots prodigal sons and daughters, chasing after the glitter of the world. They're allured by the dazzle of immediate, self-gratification. Others are victims of abuse, or mired in the quicksand of misery. Or they're caught up in their mistakes. They and don't know how to escape or have given up even trying. Some people are engulfed by an egotistical approach to life. And some people are just looking for honest answers. They're searching for what is true and good. There's a lot of unease and uncertainty in people's hearts these days.

Most of us hardly notice them even though they're right under our noses. We pass them on the sidewalk. We sit next to them at school. They're on our team at work. They're in front of us in the grocery store check-out line. But we usually don't hear their silent cries for help. And if we do, we don't want to get involved in someone's problems and have to deal with their drama. But Jesus always heard their cried for help. And he responded. Jesus often went specifically to minister to folks who needed help the most, the ones you and I might avoid.

Part of Jesus' mission on earth was to empower his followers to share his message and to give them opportunities to do so. This includes you and me today. It's more than one person can do. Or 12. Or 70. Or 120. Or 5,000. We need help. Jesus knew this was true for his disciples and that it would be true for us today. So, Christ instructed his disciples, not only the 12 but also the 70, to pray earnestly for the Lord of the harvest to send more harvest workers into the field.

God is the Lord of the harvest and decides who will work, where to put them, and what they'll do. Don't be surprised if it's someone you might not have chosen. We can make mistakes in judgment. When you pray to God for more workers in the harvest, you can trust God to send the people who are "perfect" for the job. God can use anyone, flaws, imperfections, and all, to accomplish His will. This happens in the Bible all the time, when God chooses all types of people, who were far from perfect, to accomplish the divine purpose and help bring in "the harvest."

Do you hear the voice of Jesus echoing down the centuries asking you to pray to the Lord of the harvest for more workers? Will you answer that call? God will send you to do His work in the harvest field. God will empower you to preach the gospel and heal the sick. It may not look just like the way Jesus or his disciples did it. That's okay. When you have the compassion for mankind that Jesus had, you will be a blessing, and a witness to the power and presence of God's kingdom. And you will have a healing effect. And as you continue to pray to the Lord of the harvest, God will bring you together with others to work with. The world is calling out for help. How will you respond?

May God bless you, watch over you, protect you, and guide you as we come together in our church home to worship, pray confidently, and know that God will hear you and bless you through our Lord Jesus Christ.






The month of November has two of my favorite holidays. I have always loved Thanksgiving. Family, food, football, and thankfulness are things I can get behind. On November 6, we will observe All Saints Day here at St. John's. This holiday has become more meaningful to me as more of the saints who have impacted my life have been called home. I am thankful for those who have impacted my life and more importantly, have affected my faith.

Have you ever thought of the impact you can have on the youth and children in our congregation? Parents, you are the people who have the biggest impact on your child's faith. Part of my calling here at St. John's is to help equip you to share your faith with your children. While you are the biggest impact, you are NOT alone – or rather, you should not be alone.

Research has shown the importance of youth being connected to at least 5 engaged Christian adults. Who are these supportive adults? "The role of supportive adult doesn't need to be complex or time consuming. Any number of adults can serve as supportive adults including parents and guardians, extended family, church workers, and older members of the congregation. Their connection to young people can come from deliberate program or develop organically. It is simple to gauge how many adults a young person is connected to by simply asking who they would feel safe turning to if they had a question, doubt or crisis ([Healthy Congregations have Supportive Adults | youthESource](#))."

Who are the saints that impacted your faith? I remember Mrs. Abraham. She cut out every article in the Madison paper that featured my name. I remember conversations and games with Fern. I remember countless saints as a child at St. John's in Madison who knew me...who supported me. I remember Ernie and Darlene, Vivian and Henry, and so many more at Eternal Hope who connected with me during high school and college. I remember conversations with my father, grandparents, and other family members. All these saints have gone home, but their legacy of caring lives on through the lives they touched.



Which youth can you have an impact on? Which youth will carry on your legacy? They may be in your home. They may be in your family. They may be in your pew. Learn their names. Spend some time talking to them. Be part of their faith story.








Board of Education is planning to meet on Wednesday, November 2 at 7:00 pm.
